Dear friends,

My predecessor in Sheffield was fond of saying that the church was like a record shop that specialised in vinyl and in Bing Crosby and Nat King Cole!!! This just will not do in a multi-layered and diverse society. We need to think again of what we do.

We need fresh thinking and opportunities to discuss faith. We need to revisit the Bible and engage with the old, old story but in fresh and exciting ways. We need preaching and teaching that helps us grow and develop and not just stay where we currently are.

The churches face many challenges in a difficult world. Yet the alternative vision of the Kingdom of God is still needed. I hope that I shall play my part as we seek ways of sharing this alternative good news with the communities that we live alongside.

The Christmas Tree Festival at Pott Row

The tree decorated by the Beavers was different again, and there was another one with nineteen symbols and at the side of it was a guide explaining the meaning of each one.

The steps were covered with greenery and candles, the organ pipes lit with lights and there were three more nativity scenes on the stage. By the entrance was the usual scene with 'snow' with a lighted angel attracting me to come and look.

I was not disappointed, the praying hands are always a reminder of prayer, and there were various groups all telling the story in their own way; the china ones so traditional, the carved wood example from Ilorin (Nigeria) so good but different, a stone example of the nativity, the knitted figures so carefully made with such expressions and the sheep to keep them company, a nice set of Nativity figures in different wood and a lone donkey carrying a barrel (I felt sorry for him!), a porcelain crib which could be held in one's hand, a blue light representing the star and an angel looking down at the baby with Joseph and Mary on either side. Stepping back a bit the scene looked very like a Christmas card.

St Faith's

The latest in the popular regular coffee mornings in Gaywood Church Rooms is on Saturday 1st February starting at 10.30am. Both St Faith's Rector, Canon Beryl Wood and Methodist Minister, the Rev Andrew Maguire, are delighted at the success of the coffee mornings and the lunches.

"There is clearly a need for such a monthly informal get-togther over a cup of coffee or tea judging by the numbers of people attending. We are reaching out to the wider community as well as regular church members," said Canon Beryl.

St Faith's Team Vicar, the Rev Dale Gingrich, currently serves as the Norwich Diocesan Ecumenical Officer and so maintains a strong involvement with the development of LEPs.

The second session of the Spring course - designed as part of the new season of ACE talks - will be held at Gaywood Church Rooms on Tuesday, 11th February at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome to attend the free session which offers participants the opportunity to "listen, to share and to be refreshed". It will be led by the Rector of St Faith's, Canon Beryl Wood.

The first session of the Spring course, on January 14, was led by Methodist Minister, the Rev Andrew Maguire.
