Dear Friends,

By the time you read this summer edition of *"Rejoice"* Janet and I will have been with you 11 months. It has certainly been an interesting and eventful time. We are so grateful for the welcome we have received and the help and support we have had. We are now much more familiar with what is going on and are in a better place to play our part in church and circuit life.

Of course, I came to share the eight churches of the Downham section with my colleague, Marie Whitcombe, and that was going well until the end of 2013. But since then Marie has had a lung condition diagnosed and is just not well enough to work. I hope that you will continue to pray for her and her family. As I write Marie has become a grandmother (again) and she will be seeing a lot of baby Annabelle as her son Daniel and daughter-in-law Erica live with her at Lion House. I hope also that you will pray that we may discern the future shape of ministry for this section as it is not clear what will happen.

Being the sole Methodist Minister in Downham can be stretching at times and there are weeks when some things do not get done that ought to be done. In particular I am not sure how I can make an impact in the villages as I am there so infrequently. On the preaching plan I am just there once a quarter and I need to be there in midweek.

The other day I had a phone call asking me to call at the home of someone I did not know who is terminally ill. So I did. He said "I went to a relative's funeral which you took. You seem a straightforward person, what you said was helpful, I want you to take my funeral." I agreed and was able to pray with him and I will visit again. Here is opportunity, as I also met his wife and two daughters and they are not a church-going family.

Someone once said to me, there are no such things as problems but opportunities. I would not put it quite like that. People find themselves in the midst of deeply troubling and tragic situations which need to be taken seriously. In many there are no quick fixes or smooth words that can magic things right but there is the opportunity for others to stand alongside them and offer a listening ear, a supportive presence. When we go to someone we go in the name of Christ as he is part of our identity. We belong to Christ, we are his disciples. We also offer Christ in what we offer - love and care, empathy and compassion. Sometimes our hope in Christ can be put into words or it is appropriate to pray, on other occasions it is unspoken but still real. In each situation there is opportunity, for God is working in that situation and his love surrounds that person whether they recognise it or not.

Now this it seems to me is the work of the whole people of God. There has to be partnership, Minister and Lay People living alongside others and seeking to offer love and care. We sometimes get too focused on the inner workings of the church, its committees and processes that we are not out there in the communities where we live and work. My ministry has been too

church centred and not enough community centred. It is in the community that ordinary people struggle to make sense of their lives and society provides no real answers. But people won't hear the Christian message unless they meet real Christians in the communities where they live. This is the hope for the future that our churches, whether big or small, will experience God's opportunities and relate to the people in their midst and then there will be a new generation finding meaning and hope in the words of Jesus. Preaching houses all over Britain were built to include a stable in which the preacher's horse could be watered and groomed. It always added to the efficiency with which the work was carried out. John Wesley was aware that the horses would not understand theology but they could comprehend kindness and care!

At Terrington St. Clement in my day, there was indeed a stable round the back of the chapel, a mounting block and in the wall outside there were two rusty iron rings for the visiting preacher's horse to be tethered. There is now just a large car park!

Reminiscences of a Minister's wife in the 60s

We came to Terrington St. Clement Methodist Church as virtual newlyweds having married the previous April. The lovely manse was full of ladies arranging flowers, the kitchen cupboard full of provisions and a meal was on the table. We never had such a welcome again! Our five years were full of very unforgettable moments. My 21st birthday was celebrated at the Christmas Bazaar, but we did not let on! Jack Ward had arrived at the back door as I was opening my cards and presents and we hastily hid them from view.

We survived the exceptionally cold winter of 1962/3 when everything stopped and people (including David) skated on the flooded fens for weeks. Being in the early stages of pregnancy I didn't risk it. No vegetables could be dug up so Alan Jarvis, the grocer, did a marvellous trade in the canned variety and even those were in short supply eventually. Herbie Brown grew vegetables for us in the manse garden (there was no greengrocer's shop) and leeks and new potatoes have never since tasted as good. Everyone grew their own vegetables and often contributions arrived on the manse doorstep. At strawberry time we ate strawberries for breakfast, lunch and tea! Married daughters from away would arrive back to help pick the strawberries on their parents' smallholding next to their bungalow and to earn enough to buy themselves a washing machine or fridge.

One evening a mischievous Jack Ward dropped me off at the manse saying he had something for us in the boot of his car. He handed me, a towny from the suburbs of London, a complete dead hare by its feet! I tried not to show my utter horror and hung it in the outhouse! Next morning Herbie took pity on me and took it home to his wife to "jug". It arrived back in a brown pot and proved to be very tasty.

Our two sons were born in the front bedroom of the manse. Well, Andrew should have been, but an early morning dash in the ambulance on the coldest night of the year with Nurse Stevens in attendance meant that he actually arrived in the old King's Lynn hospital. Home births were the norm in those days, especially for second and subsequent babies. Mary, Betty, Frauke and I pushed our babies in their coach-built prams round the village, went to the baby clinic held in the Sunday School Hall for their monthly weigh-in, collected our orange juice and cod liver oil and met up at the newly formed Young Wives' Group. The Kerkhams were the Methodist farmers in the village and the Caves attended the Anglican church. Lucy Kerkham, home from her job in an Irish children's home to look after her ailing mother, was in charge of the Sunday School, trained the children for the Scripture Exam and dominated everyone with her piercing blue eyes. She then surprised us all when, on the death of her mother, she announced she was not going back to Ireland, but was marrying the family doctor and going to live at Ashwicken.

Mrs. Ritchie, a lay pastor's widow, lived with her sister in Rose Cottage, next door to the surgery handing out people's prescriptions and noting everyone's appearance at the surgery. The waiting room was their back room. Dr. Reeve, her nephew, tried to keep a modicum of privacy for us by suggesting we visited his Terrington St. John surgery! We remember garden parties held at Terrington Court by the Humes and the Lee Warners; the beginnings of the Skirmishers, a young people's music group led by Wendy Hume and later Charlie Bartrum: Miriam Reeve running the Beginners Department joined later by Mrs. Bartrum; the playgroup started by Mary Short; manse concerts and 'top' tables at harvest suppers (how I hated them!); the tragic deaths of Alan Houchen and David Williamson. A truly memorable five years and it was a privilege some 20 years later to come back to King's Lynn. I met Frauke in town just after we moved back, still pushing a pushchair only this time it contained a grandchild! The Young Wives' Group had lost the "young" from its title and the smallholdings had bungalows built on them. Times had changed!

Rosemary Caink **DANDELIONS DAISIES AND BUTTERCUPS**

In his pastoral letter for June Andrew confessed that he did not want them in his front lawn. "I certainly get a little anxious," he wrote "if I see too many weeds growing in our lawn. The sight of a dandelion may prompt me to venture out with a knife to cut it out, right down to the bottom of the root. The sight of daisies or clover may incite me to get out there with some of that clever selective weedkiller which causes the weeds to wither and perish, but not the grass."

Personally I really like them, so do the butterflies and bees and one of my simple pleasures is watching them fluttering from one flower to the next. In fact I plant wild flower seeds in my garden and have a space that I just

leave to nature, my wild garden, to encourage insects for the birds to feed on. They reward me with their singing, although I must admit the dawn chorus is a bit too early for me. And of course, the bees do a wonderful job in pollinating our crops. It is worrying that their numbers are declining, for one thing through loss of meadowland which is their preferred habitat. Friends of the Earth are running a campaign called Bee Cause. 25,000 of us signed a petition urging the government to save the bees.

I saw a lovely programme on television recently entitled "The Wonder of Weeds." The presenter was a top gardener at Kew and Westminster who had spent most of his working life trying to eliminate weeds but discovered that the more we struggle to keep them out the more they come back; they are engineered to be born survivors. In the end he came to realise that weeds are a vital resource in the natural order of things.

During the war I was stationed for a year in Cyprus. In summer the big central plain was quite bare and shrivelled up with the hot sun but when spring came it was a beautiful carpet of wild flowers. If you go there for a holiday the best month is April. I imagine it must have been like that out in the countryside around Nazareth, which is of course in that part of the world. I like to think of Jesus, in his early formative years, out on the hillsides near his home, taking in the sights and sounds of nature which would figure so prominently in his teaching"Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them....Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."

Everyone knows the quote from Dorothy Frances Gurney's poem:

"One is nearer God's heart in a garden Than anywhere else on earth"

Especially if we don't pull up all the dandelions daisies and buttercups.

Before the final hymn and blessing each other we together, speaking in unison, dedicated our gifts and those received previously from Circuit Churches, asking that they be used in the Lord's service and for grace and courage to risk the path he trod for us. the 'tea table' fellowship afterwards.

St Faith's

"We've been together now for forty years and it don't seem a day too much"so goes the words of the well-known song and it will be party time at St Faith's Church on 20th July when the fortieth anniversary of sharing the church for worship is celebrated.

A full programme of events has been arranged including special thanksgiving services in the morning and evening, a celebration Bring and Share lunch, screening of old films about parish life of yesteryear and a Bring and Share afternoon tea.

There is much to celebrate because the coming together of St Faith's at Gaywood and Gaywood Methodist Church (previously housed in a chapel on Gayton Road) was one of the first Local Ecumenical Projects in the region. Other LEPs have been established over the years and Gaywood has strong links with the LEP movement because St Faith's Team Vicar, the Rev Dale Gingrich, serves as the Norwich Diocesan Ecumenical Officer.

Former Gaywood Rector, the Venerable Gerald Phizackerley and Methodist Minister, the Rev Tony Windsor, will be returning to their old parish to preach at the morning and evening services. Other past clergy and ministers have been invited to attend the special day. It will be a day to give thanks to God for all that has been achieved over four decades.

During the lunch and tea people will be able to chat together and share their stories and memories of milestone events along the way. Sadly, some of those church members who witnessed the coming together of the two church communities are no longer with us but, no doubt, on the celebration day some of these people will be brought to mind. The Sunday morning service starts at 10.30 and will be followed at 12.30pm by the Bring and Share lunch. After lunch the old films of life in the parish over the years will be shown and then people will be invited to share afternoon tea before the Songs of Praise service at 4.30pm. Please note the service times and put a note to remind you in your diaries.

Everyone is welcome to share in all or part of the day's programme of events.

St Faith's, along with church communities, towns and villages all over the country, have been making plans to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War.

A small group of church members has been meeting together for many months to put together a number of events starting in August.

August 4th is the actual centenary day and, at St Faith's, there will be a vigil between 10am and 4pm. During those hours there will be readings of WW1 poems, prayers and readings of newspaper accounts of the early days of the conflict. Everyone is welcome to attend the vigil and come and go as they wish.

Members of the organising group have been busy carrying out detailed research into the names of some of those soldiers from Gaywood who served at The Front, many of them never to return. Neil Leggett and Barbara Wagstaff have been involved in this work which will form part of an exhibition telling the stories of some of these local enlisted men who made the ultimate sacrifice and whose names are inscribed on the Gaywood Clock Memorial Tower and on the Roll of Honour Boards inside St Faith's Church.

In November it is also planned to stage a First World War

commemorative evening featuring a programme of music and readings and more details of this event will be announced later.

The once popular Parish Outing is to be revived at St Faith's later this summer when it is proposed to have a day out to Ely.

Betty Guy suggested that church members might like the opportunity to spend a day out together when there would be a chance to get to know each other a little better.

The Outing is likely to be on a Saturday in late August or early September, Once in Ely people would be free to explore the town and have some lunch. Gone to Glory, 9th May 2014

Marit's funeral was held at her beloved St German's chapel on Ascension Day, 29th May 2014. By ten past one all the chairs were full. By quarter past one we had run out of orders of service. When the service began at 1.30 the chapel was full, with extra chairs brought in and many standing. This was a great tribute to the way Marit touched people's lives through who she was, and her ministry in preaching (on full plan since 1960) and Sunday school teaching.

Marit had chosen her hymns and readings and they communicated the faith in which she lived and died. We began with a hymn that she got to know when she came to a personal faith; *I am not skilled to understand*. Not, as she was keen to emphasise, to the hymn book tune which she considered dull, but the Sankey tune. Her other choices were *When I survey the wondrous cross* and *And can it be*?

The Bible reading was Psalm 103. Shortly before Marit died I visited and asked if he would like me to read it. Her eyes lit up: "my favourite Psalm" she said. After I finished reading we sat quietly together and agreed that nothing more needed to be said.

Tributes to Marit were given by her cousins, Terry and Berry, and friends from St Germans, Pearl and Pat. Marit's Norwegian relatives – including the 'other' Marit – were not able to attend, but were represented by a beautiful floral wreath.

The service was not without sadness as we mourned a dear friend and sister in Christ, but was also a joyful celebration of Marit's life and of the faith that was so central to it. Her call to proclaim the word continued in death. We ended, at her request, with the chapel doors opened wide so the village might hear us singing *And can it be*?

At the interment of Marit's ashes in St Germans churchyard we sang *This, this is the God we adore.* The closing lines were so fitting "we'll praise him for all that is past and trust him for all that's to come". Marit was full of praise and thanksgiving to God to the very end of her life and trusted absolutely in him. She was a real inspiration in faith, and a joy to know personally. Her simple memorial stone is engraved with her name and John 3:16. She leaves us with the most important message of all: *For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him my not perish but may have eternal life.*
