#### Dear Friends,

Easter is late this year, so as March arrives we have still not entered the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday falls on 5th March, preceded by the delights of Shrove Tuesday. Perhaps many of us are more enthusiastic about that last minute feast of pancakes than the season of fasting and penitence that follows. Lent, however, offers us a wonderful opportunity to 'put our house in order': not only to reflect on our lives but to refocus them, to ensure we are on the right road as we travel in faith towards the glorious celebration of Easter. Some choose to do this through the discipline of abstinence and giving up treats and luxuries. Others choose to take up a discipline, whether a programme of prayer or reading, joining a Lent group (see the notice in this issue of Rejoice! about a group in South Wootton) or by schemes such as Action for Children's 'Count Your Blessings'. If you have not had a 'Count Your Blessings' sheet, do ask your Action for Children rep or look on the website www.actionforchildren.org.uk. It is a simple but effective way of reflecting on our lives during Lent, and helping an excellent cause as we do. This Lent I will be reading Janet Morley's book "The heart's time" which has a poem for each day of Lent with a page or so of reflections on the poem and some questions to ponder. She begins with a poem by George Herbert which I would like to share with you:

**Trinity Sunday** 

Lord, who hast form'd me out of mud, And hast redeem'd me through thy blood, And sanctified me to do good;

Purge all my sins done heretofore; For I confess my heavy score, And I will strive to sin no more.

Enrich my heart, mouth, hands in me, With faith, with hope, with charity; That I may run, rise, rest with thee.

It may seem odd to begin Lent with a poem called 'Trinity Sunday', but as Janet Morley points out, the theme of this poem-prayer are central to the traditional observance of the Lenten season. The poem's narrator recalls his place in the story of creation and salvation, offers confession for sin, and dedicates himself to a life lived more closely with God. You might like to use the poem in your devotions as you enter Lent, and as you read the poem to place yourself in the story and respond in the same way.

However you choose to mark the season of Lent, I pray that God will bless you as you seek to walk with Him in desert places and on the way of the cross, so that you may better rejoice with Him in glory on Easter day.

### LIFE EXHIBITION

The Life Exhibition is a national resource and provides a multi-media experience aimed at Key Stage 2 children (7-11). Having visited King's Lynn in 2007, 2009 and 2012, the Exhibition was based for the first time at London Road this year. Over the course of a week at the end of January some 780 children from local primary schools visited London Road and were guided round the exhibition by an ecumenical team of volunteers from King's Lynn, Hunstanton and Downham Market.

The Life Exhibition is designed to explore what Christians believe about Jesus. It aims to

- Help visitors understand what Christians believe about Jesus.
- Enable questioning and exploration of the life of Jesus.
- Encourage visitors to consider His impact in today's world.
- Allow visitors to think for themselves about the teachings of Jesus.

Children have tablet computers to interact with as they go round the exhibition, as well as video presentations and talks from volunteers. The Exhibition has been called "God's gift to teachers" because it fulfils so many targets of the RE curriculum. From a church perspective, it was certainly thrilling to welcome so many children into church and to have the opportunity to teach and share about our faith and about Jesus. Many thanks to all who supported the Exhibition with practical help and with prayer, and to Churches Together and the CROWNS trust who met the £1250 cost.

### "WE'VE BEEN TOGETHER NOW FOR FORTY YEARS"

As the old song goes and yes, the 23<sup>rd</sup> of February marked the Ruby Anniversary of Anglicans and Methodists coming together in a Local Ecumenical Partnership. Fittingly on that Sunday we had a Methodist Local Preacher, Elizabeth MacLeod, preaching at an Anglican Service of Holy Communion. I understand that a special celebration is being arranged for Sunday July 20<sup>th</sup>. Watch this space!

I have told this story before but I thought it might be appropriate to remind you how this came about from a Methodist point of view

We have to go back to 1932 when the Wesleyan, Primitive and United Methodists came together to form the present Methodist Church. One of the results of this was that a number of buildings became redundant. In King`s Lynn we could not have two central churches and the main Tower Street Wesleyan Church was closed in favour of the Primitive Church, St James, popularly known as Chapel Clock (now London Road). Some of the members went to remaining ex-Wesleyan Churches, London Road South (near the South Gate) or Gaywood. Many sadly went nowhere. Tower Street was demolished and sold for its very valuable site, although the schoolroom was taken over by the Council for a Youth Club.

When I was minister in Lynn 1957-1963 we were still suffering from the aftermath of all this upheaval and with the proximity of my Church, London Road South, and St James we were considered to be over-churched. In addition the North Lynn Estate was then being developed and we started a thriving Sunday School in St Edmundsbury Primary. I was released from London Road South so that this church could be integrated with St James, while I was to work in the new area and eventually help to get our North Lynn Church built . Gaywood was bursting at the seams; I have seen a congregation of over a hundred crowding into the tiny building with only a very small schoolroom (now the Evangelical Church). The only solution seemed to be to rebuild. Not surprisingly they had their eye on money from Tower Street to build a new church. I went with Leonard Barrett and others to view a possible site in St Faith`s Drive and actually bought it. Who knows...we might have had a Methodist Church where Tesco is now.

However there was a change of plan. The ecumenical movement was gaining ground so the Methodists and Anglicans decided to go in together, with Methodist money from the sale of this site being provided for much needed Church Rooms, Phase 1. I would especially mention those whose hard work and vision made this possible, Methodist ministers Revs Alan

Bidnell and Tony Windsor, the Rector, Rev Gerald Phizackerley, and of the lay people the late Leonard Barrett and Vernon Price-Jones.

By now I was in Ely and had been appointed Synod Secretary when the scheme came before the District for approval so I had the great privilege of joining with the Chairman of the District, Rev G Thackray Eddy, on that great day to lead the Methodists across the road first for the opening ceremony of Phase I of the new Church Rooms, with the Bishop of Norwich, the Rt Rev Maurice Wood, for their first service in St Faith's. I am still in touch with Geoffrey Eddy. He is even older than I am but remembers this happy occasion well. He said he was pleased to hear the LEP is still going well and added that it was a model to us all.

I little dreamt that this would become my own spiritual home for the past 30 years. My Christian pilgrimage has been enriched by worshipping in such a beautiful church, the very walls of which are saturated by the prayers of God's people for 900 years and by learning and sharing in Anglican liturgy. I greatly appreciate the outreach of St Faith's....Messy Church, Open Door, a presence in schools and residential homes. We are there for all who need us. I love the quality of the music, both ancient and modern. What means a lot to me too is the warm fellowship I always feel in the services, our house group, ACE meetings and social events.

What of the future? So much depends upon what our church leaders are able to achieve as they discuss the Covenant. We must have women bishops. We must have interchangeability of ministries, with the historic episcopate and the fellowship of all believers side by side, equally valuable, equally valued. The recent report of the Joint Implementation Commission celebrating ten years of the Covenant stated: "The present method of seeking to combine elements of Anglican and Methodist polity and structures has exhausted the potential for convergence without any realistic prospect of achieving a complete integration." It suggests that "A new ecumenical method is required for the next stage of the Covenant."

That cannot come too soon for us at St Faith's.

Getting through the Winter with January over and no severe cold yet, but still it rains! One can only pray for those poor folk who are flooded; they must be living in a lengthy nightmare. We in this area have a lot to be grateful for.

I expect we shall get some colder weather before this Winter is over and in this connection it is good to report that finally our double glazing is in hand and should be installed soon so we will benefit from the tail end (hopefully) of the Winter. Having said that sometimes our Summers are pretty cold and necessitate some heating. We have practically paid for the double glazing with our Saturday coffee mornings, and once our total is reached we shall need to press on with fund raising to double glaze the actual Church, probably in about two years time.

Our coffee mornings continue to be very popular. We have raised over two thousand pounds since the Church year started in September and even in this off peak time we are still averaging over a hundred pounds a week thanks to our stalwart catering staff who provide delicious homemade cakes each week, all who man the bric a brac stall and book corner and those who donate items or buy them. Not the time of the year for gardening, but on occasion I have brought in some house plants and bulbs to help swell our coffers. On the non-financial side the friendships and fellowship engendered make this project so worthwhile.

Churches Together in Downham - The Foodbank goes from strength to strength (such a pity it is so desperately needed) with the two collections at Tesco producing 3/4 of a ton of food and there is a steady trickle from the Churches. Our new Downham branch has had 60 clients since it started, with 22 so far in February, some people coming more than once depending on the time taken to sort out benefits. The new shelving needed for storage has been bought

thanks to a donation from the local Lions Club and the freezer which our choir Christmas concert helped to fund is now storing bread. The food bank is open at the Sovereign Centre on Tuesdays from 12.30 to 2.30 and Fridays from 10.30 to 12.30. If you feel you could help at these times (especially the Fridays) please give Alex a ring on 01336 384474.

There are some Lent House Groups being organised but I have no details at the moment. Maurice has introduced us to John Pritchard's book "How to Pray", and we shall be meeting fortnightly on Mondays at 2.30pm in the Annexe at Downham Market or 7pm at 1 Camomile Close to read and discuss.

Our Sisterhood Group meetings start again on 5<sup>th</sup> March. We had no meetings in January or February to avoid the winter weather which has not yet appeared. We start our new session with Janet and John Roust and Meg and Rob Harrison giving us some drama and perhaps some comedy. On 19<sup>th</sup> the Mission Support service will take place and there will be a members' meeting on 2<sup>nd</sup> April for Easter thoughts. Both of my grandsons have been down with the sickness bug which has been going around in the schools so we wish everyone a healthy, bug free gentle Spring with no more rain.

### St Faith's

The first weekend in March will be a particularly busy one at St Faith's because the usual Coffee Morning in Gaywood Church Rooms, starting at 10.30am, will be followed by a lunch starting at 12 noon. The previous two sales have proved very popular, offering the opportunity to purchase good quality clothing and other goods, at low prices. The Coffee Mornings, Lunches and Clothes Sales have proved increasingly popular in recent months. As well as being a means of raising funds for the Church, they are seen as an important Outreach project through which contact can be made with people from the wider Gaywood community. Everyone is welcome, so do come along and meet friends or make new friends over a cup of tea or coffee or a simple lunch.

St Faith's Anglican and Methodist Church members will be welcoming their new curate, the Rev Zoe Ferguson, on Sunday, March 2, at the 9.45 am service. During the service, the Rev Ferguson will be licensed into her new role by the Bishop of Lynn, the Rt Rev Jonathan Meyrick. Everyone is welcome to attend this special service and meet Zoe and her family.

The Rev Ferguson will be joining the clergy team at St Faith's after two years as part of the Trunch Group of Parishes where she has been based at Mundesley. In February, the Rev Ferguson, together with her husband and two teenage children, moved into St Faith's clergy house on Jermyn Road, off Gayton Road.

One of St Faith's major fund-raising events will be held on Saturday, 15<sup>th</sup> March, when the popular Spring Fair will be staged in the Gaywood Church Rooms. The Fair attracts a large number of visitors, both church members and people from the wider Gaywood community and is seen as an important social outreach event.

Together with the Summer Grand Garden Fete and the Christmas Fair, the Spring Fair helps to raise some of the £5,000 funds raised annually by St Faith's from these events for the upkeep of the Church.

This year there will be a colourful assortment of stalls and sideshows all aimed at tempting visitors to part with their cash. The Fair opens at 2pm so do come along and meet up with friends and take advantage of the opportunity to pick up some Spring bargains. Refreshments are available, including delicious homemade cakes and filled rolls. Admission is free.

On 23<sup>rd</sup> February it was 40 years since Anglican and Methodist congregations came together to share the Church building for worship and the first phase of the newly constructed Gaywood Church Rooms for social activities. In those far off days, St Faith was one of the pioneering Local Ecumenical Projects (LEPs) in Norfolk. A special programme of celebrations is being planned for Sunday, 21<sup>st</sup> July when former Anglican and Methodist clergy will be there, including the Venerable Gerald Phizackeley and his wife, Annette and the Rev Tony Windsor and his wife, Maureen. More details about these celebrations will appear in future editions of Rejoice! magazine.

With the increasing demand for and necessity for Foodbanks, plans are at an advanced stage to establish such a Foodbank in Gaywood Church Rooms on Wednesday afternoons. This scheme is to be a joint venture with Gaywood Health Centre (opposite St Faith's Church).

### Action for Children Projects in King's Lynn

Our King's Lynn projects are based at the Fairstead Community Centre

### Vancouver Sure Start Children's Centre

#### What we do:

We support local families with at least one young child under five, in an area with one of the highest levels of deprivation. We also support teenage parents who live in our area, provide early education and a nursery for pre-school children, and offer more direct support for parents and their children facing particularly difficult problems.

Our staff includes health visitors, speech and language therapists and specialist midwives.

Our overall aim is to improve opportunities for the whole family and help them all work towards a brighter and healthier future.

### Challenges we face:

The level of education in our area is low and unemployment high, so we have to work hard to help all our families deal with the issues that come along with this.

### Norfolk Parenting Pathways (formally known as West Norfolk Young Carers)

#### What we do:

Young carers are children aged between 7 and 11 years old who provide care, assistance or support to a family member. They carry out significant or substantial caring tasks on a regular basis.

The person receiving care is either a parent or sibling who is disabled, suffers from a long term illness, mental health problems or substance misuse.

The aims of the groups are to help young carers to:

- Meet other young people with similar responsibilities and feel less isolated
- Have a break from their caring role and participate in age-appropriate activities
- Build up confidence and resilience

The weekly group sessions at our project give local young carers the chance to come to us for advice and support, and give them the chance to socialise with other young people in a similar situation.

### Fundraising:

We hold weekly respite groups for young carers in the local area and would love to be able to give them an evening meal at each session. The money we're fundraising for will enable us to give 12 young carers a meal per session for 48 weeks. We are £605 from our target of £1,264.


