#### Dear Friends,

May will be quite a big month for the Maguire family as our younger son, Edward is to be married on May 24<sup>th</sup>. The wedding is to take place in St Brendan's Church in Tirrane near Belmullet, right on the west coast of Ireland in county Mayo. Patrick, the father of Edward's fiancée Catherine, was born and brought up in this beautiful location. After working for many years near Watford he and his wife Margaret now live in Belmullet, right by the coast.

We visited last autumn and, of course, had a look in the church. My eye was caught by a beautiful stained glass window at the rear of the building, depicting in vivid colours the life of St. Brendan, a sixth century Irish Saint who is clearly honoured and held in great affection in County Mayo. I was interested to discover that Evie Hone, the creator of the window, was a very skilful 20th century Dublin born artist, who also created the East window in Eton College chapel.

Methodists will know that 24th May is the day when we remember the "conversion" or "heart-warming" of John Wesley. Although I don't think this has anything to do with the date chosen for the wedding I will be delighted, alongside a new daughter-in-law, to welcome and learn about a saint and hero of the faith who, for me, is new. Methodists generally don't know as much about Brendan as they do about John Wesley, though I have learned that he too is remembered in May as his Saint's day is on the 16<sup>th</sup>.

Brendan was born near Tralee on the West coast of Ireland, several miles south of Belmullet. As with many of the early saints much of his life is in the realm of legend rather than fact. He was brought up by a saintly nun called Ita who taught him three things that God truly loves: "the true faith of a pure heart; the simple religious life; and bountifulness inspired by Christian charity". It is also said that she added three things which God hates: "a scowling face; obstinate wrongdoing; and too much confidence in money". I suspect that John Wesley would have agreed. He would also, as one who travelled much, have approved of Brendan's travels, as Brendan is often known as "Brendan the Voyager". In spreading the Christian message he travelled by coracle from Ireland to England, Scotland and Wales. In one famous saga known as "The Navigation of Brendan" it is even suggested that he may have reached Greenland or North America on a seven year voyage to "A land of promise".

It is good to read of the colourful traditions about some of the early saints and to rejoice in the rich breadth and diversity of the Christian Church. As we celebrate

the joyful day of a wedding I will also think of how we are challenged and enriched by the life and adventures of Brendan who will be gazing down upon us from the window behind us.

#### **ALL WE CAN**

The end of World War II was only the beginning of the suffering for millions of people left homeless by the fighting, released from captivity or expelled as an act of vengeance. There were 12 million refugees in Europe alone. 100s of 1000s of Jews who had escaped the genocide sought secure homes beyond their native land. In Eastern Europe millions escaped from the newly installed Communist regimes. Visiting Italy some years after the war I saw families still living in caves. In the 1950s in Lynn I remember how the churches put up a shack and a few belongings on the pavement to show what life was like for displaced persons..

The Methodist Church was quick to meet this overwhelming humanitarian need and in 1945 founded the Methodist Refugee Fund, with its remit expanded soon to become the Methodist Relief Fund. We know it best as the Methodist Relief and Development Fund, committed to long-term development, emergency relief and campaigning against poverty and injustice, in response to the command of Jesus to love God and our neighbour.

We have only to switch on the news any day to remind us that the problem has not gone away. The Syrias, Sudans and Palestines of this world are always with us. Today there are 42 million displaced persons in the world. 4 out of 5 in the developing world.. At any moment catastrophes such as tsunamis, earthquakes, volcanoes may occur. We wonder what we can do. If we support MRDF we already have done something, for without waiting for an appeal to go out they will send practical and financial help straightaway.

My immediate reason for writing this is because the Methodist Relief and Development Fund has changed its name to All We Can (AWC) as part of a relaunch. I quote from the Methodist Recorder: "As part of the charity's plans to increase its impact...during the next five years, the Church Community Action for Neighbours (Church CAN) programme aims to reach 1 million people with sustainable long-term support. Focussed on Methodist church partners it will aim to work with 1000 churches in seven countries. It will be piloted in three countries, two of which have been confirmed as Haiti and Uganda."

But what about that name? Actually it is a very imaginative one and goes back go our Methodist roots. It echoes a famous saying of John Wesley`s:

Do all the good you can
By all the means you can
In all the places you can
At all the times you can
To all the people you can
As long as ever you can:
Not a bad rule for any of us to live by

## More on the BIG PRAY MAY 10<sup>TH</sup> at ST CHRISTOPHER'S SCHOOL, RED LODGE, 10.30AM – 3.30PM

In order to make the most of **BIG PRAY**, we hope that everyone will take part in two **Options** and take time to experience the **Market Place**. We invite each participant to select three of the following **Options** (register online: www.eamethodist.org.uk)

Two of the chosen **Options** will be assigned as we prepare for **BIG PRAY**.

- **1. Celtic Prayer** What did the Celtic peoples believe and practice in the way of prayer? We will be looking at examples and then writing our own.
- **2. Contemplative Prayer** We live in a very noisy world. Sometimes our prayer life can fall into the 'more words' category, as we tell God what we need him to do. Contemplative prayer seeks to abandon words and embrace silence for it is in that silence that we can often hear God's word to us.
- **3. Leading Creative Prayers** An opportunity to consider some of the ways in which prayers for small groups and congregations can be created and shared.
- **4. Lectio Divina** We often think of prayer as asking God for what we want. The practice of *Lectio Divina* encourages the other side to that, that of listening to God, using a Bible passage and allowing God to speak to us.
- **5. Option for Children** A special opportunity for children aged 3 to 12. We anticipate that most children will want to spend the day in this particular setting, with appropriate resources and personnel.
- **6. Photography and Prayer** Rather than taking photos, we will be exploring the spiritual potential of photography and looking at actual examples to lead us into prayer.
- **7. Prayer Through Art** Starting with passages of scripture, Jackie Smith will share how she designs her works of art (quilts) and writes prayers to accompany them. There will then be the opportunity to draw out your own designs and write prayers.
- **8. Praying the Labyrinth** Explore the journey to the centre of the labyrinth and back. Take off your shoes and slow down. This ancient

pathway, known for thousands of years, has been adapted to our Christian tradition. It leads us to the centre of our being and back again.

- **9. Praying through Singing the Faith** Many Methodists have viewed their hymnbooks as books of prayer. To hold a hymnbook and pray familiar words is part of our faith tradition and we shall explore this further together.
- **10. Prophetic Healing Prayer** By sharing personal testimony to the Lord's touch, we can move in the flow of the Spirit that is, 'in the spirit of prophecy' to re-release a healing touch for the blessing and healing to others.
- **11. Signing Prayer** Learn to 'sign' the Lord's Prayer using British Sign Language.
- **12. Soaking Prayer** Simply spending time in God's presence, resting rather than striving. Soaking can help us focus on God whilst sitting or lying comfortably, listening to worshipful music and opening our hearts to Him.
- **13. Walking Prayer** "God writes the Gospel, not in the Bible alone, but on the trees and flowers and clouds and stars. (Martin Luther 1483-1546) "God speaks to us through the 'little book' the Bible and the 'big book' of creation". (ancient Celtic Christian belief).

Using these two quotes as a reference point we will prayerfully explore the space around the school.

**Big Pray** will begin and end with worship, whilst the larger part of the day will be spent in workshops exploring different kinds of prayer and/or ways to pray.

<u>Note:</u> We require everyone attending *Big Pray* to book in advance. (I am sorry but we will **not** be able to take those who turn up on the day.) Bookings to be made via the *Big Pray* button on the District website - www.eamethodist.org.uk.
