Dear Friends,

In November we mark Remembrance Day on the 11th of the month.

For us humans, memory has a very distinctive importance and place. A dog may remember the place where he normally has his dinner and perhaps go there and whimper around dinner time. But I do not think that a pet remembers in the way that humans do. We humans have the ability to recall events, people and places from many years back. Time may rob us of companions and of places, but with memory we can, in a sense, have them for ever.

Memory, however, can be a strange thing. You can sometimes remember vividly an event from years back, but have to rack your brains to think what happened yesterday. Memory is a precious but puzzling thing.

God gives us memory for a purpose. At the simplest level it is very useful to be able to remember things - to be able to remember what level you left the car on in the multi-storey car park or to remember where you put a valuable document. These are all very necessary.

But there's more to memory than that. There are lessons we can learn as we recall things from the past. In November we also celebrate bonfire night and we will recall the little "ditty" - Remember, remember the fifth November, gunpowder, treason and plot. Guy Fawkes plotted to blow up parliament, but was discovered and came to a sticky end. The little ditty encourages us to remember what happened to Guy Fawkes and make sure we don't do the same. Learn the lessons of the past.

Christians especially remember our Lord Jesus Christ. What a valuable thing it is that, through the gospel stories, we are able to look back upon the life of our Lord and learn the great positive lessons set before us in his example and teaching.

Another kind of remembrance is remembrance with thanksgiving. This is the kind of memory we enjoy and celebrate on somebody's birthday. We remember the birth of the child and give thanks. That is what should lie at the heart of our Christmas celebrations, coming next month, as we remember the birth of Jesus.

Remembering with thanksgiving is tremendously important in the Christian tradition. The Communion Service is an act of remembrance. Jesus said: "This do in remembrance of me". In many traditions the service is called "the Eucharist", which means "thanksgiving". In the Communion service we remember with thanks all that the life, death and resurrection of Christ mean to us.

In what way do we remember around Remembrance Day in the middle of November? We look back on two world wars and also hold in mind more recent and current conflicts. We remember those who have died and their families. We are reminded of the cost and tragedy of war. As we move towards 2014 we will no doubt be reminded again of the massive loss of life in the First World War. We pray that we will not again have to fight in such a way and at such cost. As we look at current conflicts we pray all the more earnestly that we humans may remember and learn the lessons of the past and work for peace.

But we also look back in thanksgiving - thanking God for the freedom won for us by those who gave their lives. May we never treat lightly the sacrifice they made.

Memory is a precious thing. Let us learn from and give thanks for this special gift which God has given us.

The latest in the popular regular St Faith's Coffee Mornings will be held on Saturday, November 3rd, from 10.30am until 11.30am. The numbers attending these sessions, where people can meet together for a chat over a cup of coffee, tea or soft drink and enjoy a piece of lovely home-made cake or scones, are increasing and there is always a buzz in the Gaywood Church Rooms as those attending catch up on news from their friends. Everyone is welcome to attend.

People in the Gaywood area who have lost loved ones during the past year are invited to attend the special All Souls service of Resurrection Hope at St Faith's Church, Gaywood, on November 3rd at 6.30pm.

This is always a moving and poignant service but aims to have a positive message. During the service, the clergy say prayers for the departed and their families and friends. Names of all those people, from the parish and surrounding areas who have died during the past 12 months, are read out by the clergy and relatives are invited to light candles in their memories

Those from the Gaywood area who gave their lives in the First World War and in more recent conflicts are remembered during the annual Remembrance Sunday service at St Faith's Church which is being held on November 10th. The main service, which is attended by members of the Royal British Legion, members of Gaywood's uniformed groups (including Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies and Beavers) and civic representatives, is held at 10am and is followed by a parade to the Gaywood Clock War Memorial where the wreathlaying ceremony is held and the two-minute silence is observed.

Months of hard work behind-the-scenes will result in this year's St Faith's Christmas Fair which is being staged in the Gaywood Church Rooms on November 16th from 2pm until 4pm.

The Fair will be officially opened by Gaywood Methodist Minister, the Rev Andrew Maguire and his wife, Helen. Father Christmas has promised to make an early visit and he will take up residence in his specially-created Grotto where children can meet him and leave their Christmas-present "wish lists".

The Gaywood Church Rooms will be transformed into a colourful Christmas market with a wide selection of stalls offering visitors all kinds of goods, including delicious home- made cakes, the ever-popular bottle stall, Christmas gifts, the White Elephant stall, as well as a number of games of chance, including the popular tombola stall and the Grand Raffle offering a wide selection of prizes.

NORTH LYNN GOLDEN JUBILEE

Saturday 30 November 2013 will mark the 50th Anniversary of North Lynn Methodist Church with a Celebration at 2 pm and 3pm Social Event. I should like to put on record how it all began

Just a week before the opening the world was reeling from the assassination of President Kennedy. In America there had been the civil rights campaign led by Martin Luther King with his famous speech "I have a dream." The Profumo affair filled the papers and one of our preachers, a real character, Harry Cassell who would preach in wellingtons and braces, waved the Daily Mirror at the saints at West Lynn. Prime Minister Harold MacMillan, the one who spoke of winds of change sweeping over Africa, gave way to Sir Alex Douglas-Home. Harold Wilson was leader of the Labour Party. First woman into space was Valentura

Tereshcova. The University of East Anglia opened. The Great Train Robbery shocked the nation. You could buy a Mini for £500, a pint of milk for 4d (old money) Little girls screamed, they wept, they fainted for four boys who had funny haircuts, funny suits, John, Paul, George and Ringo. Bob Dylan was all the rage in the pop scene.

What were things like in King's Lynn? Very different as an old map shows. Railway lines fanned out in 5 directions. You could be sure of being held up by level crossings whichever way you went. The fire brigade, with clanging bells in those days, often had to rush out to Roydon Common to put out heath fires caused by sparks from engines, although diesel trains were just beginning to come in. Lines of redundant railway carriages queued upon the West Winch line to be set on fire and the metal saved for scrap

.

Traffic, including heavy lorries, rolled along the High Street before it was pedestrianised and it was often difficult to cross the road. A big Woolworths was a Mecca for young people coming out of school and Purdy's cafe was another favourite venue. The swimming pool was open air in the Walks. There was always a crowd of the hardy ones for the Lynn News photo call and first cold early morning dip when it opened in March. A huge variety of insects floated on it and in the summer frogs spawned. Before the by-pass was opened there were long traffic jams in summer months stretching as far as Terrington. No QE hospital and the Tech was only just being built, so was Campbell's soup factory. The only supermarket was a small ELMO in Norfolk St. Where Sainsbury's town store now is, was the cattle market. During the campaign, as it was called when the sugar beet factory was operating, you could forecast the weather by the direction from which the aroma was being wafted.

And Kings Lynn Methodism? You can tell a lot from looking at a Circuit Plan. We had 23 Churches, 719 members, now 672, even though Downham and Hunstanton have joined us. One of the most revealing things was that there were 672 children in Sunday Schools and 462 young people in clubs, including lots of teddy boys. There were many afternoon and evening services. It was no easy job making the plan. 33 preachers on the plan....some familiar names, Margaret Green, Harold Smith, Steven Watts, Marit Eide. We had half a dozen exhorters, which was the name given to preachers who didn't take the exams....popularly known as exhausters.

The North End fishing community was rapidly becoming a museum piece with the opening up of the North Lynn estate, the process accelerated by London overspill. Shops were built, schools starting with one for the youngest, the St Edmunds

Infants and a Community Centre. The Council allocated two sites for places of worship, Anglican and Free Church.

In 1953, through the inspiration of Mr. Walter Armstrong the Methodists started a Sunday School in the day school where one of our local preachers, Miss Oliver, was headmistress. He enlisted the help of Miss Green who a year or so later, with other helpers, took over when Mr. Armstrong moved away. When the Junior School was built they moved into that so that older boys and girls could come.

Then out of the blue came a letter to say that our North End Chapel was to be requisitioned to make way for a new road. We were advised that we could claim equivalent reinstatement, enough money to build elsewhere. We asked a gentleman from London, a Mr. Walmsley, who had a lot of experience in these matters, to come over and get the best possible price for us, and so he did, about £11,000. We were well away. But not everybody wanted us to build a chapel here. What if people on the estate didn't support a chapel, or if there were not enough people to work hard on it? Would it not be better to use the money in the centre of the town, or at Gaywood where the chapel was far too small for the expanding population? My main church was London Road South, near the South Gates (since pulled down) and we were having protracted discussions about joining with St James, popularly known as Chapel Clock (present London Road). To facilitate this both were placed under the pastoral care of the superintendent minister and I was to transfer to North Lynn.

Then came a bombshell. After endless discussions we agreed to build at North Lynn but it was vetoed by a District committee. Fortunately I was the District Chapel Secretary and so was quite "well in" in the District and was able to help get this decision overturned in the May Synod. So now we had the exciting job of getting it all under way. Plans were drawn up by a Methodist architect, Mr. Clifford Dann of Norwich. On a pouring wet day the stone laying ceremony was performed by Mr. Walter Hunter Rowe of Upwell.

In the meantime we had begun adult work on the estate, visiting every house. We also started a Sunday evening service in the Community Centre opposite where the new Church was being built. My mother had a small portable reed organ and brought it along to accompany the singing. When the church was opened she played the organ until she was 90. My parents became very devoted to North Lynn and the friends they met there and the Church has "Hymns and Psalms" and "Good News" Bibles in memory of them both.

Eventually all was completed and North Lynn was officially opened on St Andrews Day 30th November 1963. Margaret Green was the obvious choice to unlock the door and declare the new Church open. "This is a happy day for us all", she said, "We must congratulate Mr. Dann and Mr. Collison the builder, for making this building an attractive place. It is a shining light to the community around it." We had a capacity congregation of 250 and the sermon was preached by the Chairman of the District, Rev H J Martin, who hoped the children would love the new building as they loved their own homes. "Watch over it" he told the congregation, "it belongs to the people of this estate." After the buffet tea there were greetings from the Deputy Mayor (Mr. F R Barton), the Council of Churches (Rev E S Turnbull) and St Edmunds Church (Rev H Edgell). In the evening we had a concert given by the Lynn Male Voice Choir.

We give thanks for fifty years of happy fellowship and faithful service which has touched the lives of many people old and young. North Lynn Methodist Church stands at the entrance to the estate as a beacon of light and hope.
