Dear Friends,

As we approach July and August we come again to the summer "holidays". Children will be looking forward to a break from school – a time for leisure and relaxation, though it is not always so relaxing for parents! For my wife Helen and me this rhythm of life seems a little different this year. Helen has not been doing so much school teaching and so there has not been all the busyness of writing reports and there will not be all the activities leading up to the end of term. Schools these days are very busy places for pupils and teachers, with a full curriculum to be delivered and plenty of targets to reach. It is good that we encourage our children to aim high and are committed to giving them the best possible start in life. We don't want the school years to be wasted years with opportunities missed.

It is, however, interesting to reflect that our word for "school" goes back to a Greek word "schole" which means "leisure". The Romans took the Greek word and a "schola" was a place of learning – the idea being that at school there were not other distractions and business, so people had time to learn and contemplate the things which were really important in life.

Our schools and other places of learning may not, these days, seem to have many of the characteristics of leisure and it may well take teachers and pupils a few days to recover from the demands of the term. (Teachers, of course I hear Helen tell me, will no sooner have finished one term than they need to start making their plans and setting their targets for the next.)

There is something important, I think, in this link between leisure and learning. We can take in all kinds of information and master all kinds of skills in a hectic learning environment, but we perhaps need a slightly less pressured space in which to learn some of life's deepest and most important lessons and truths.

The Psalmist wrote in Psalm 46.10 of God saying to us: "Be still and know that I am God". Coming to a knowledge of God's nature, his love for us and his purposes for us, these are surely some of the most important lessons for all of us. So, during these summer months when, hopefully things will be a little less hectic for us, let us heed those words of the Psalmist and let us take time to be still and learn of God.

Hunstanton

From Norfolk to Nepal, with love.

On 17th May Hunstanton Methodist Church marked the 70th anniversary of Christian Aid in Sunday worship led by Joy Webb. She gave a talk whilst knitting using an anonymous quotation as inspiration: "We are all knit with the common thread of humanity; if one stitch is broken we are all undone." She reminded us of the desperate need for reconciliation after the Second World War that led to the setting up of Christian Reconstruction in Europe, which a decade later became Christian Aid, working around the world. It is a long way from the Himalayas to Hunstanton and thankfully the shock waves from the recent earthquakes did not reach here. However, the warm-hearted worshippers felt so much for the people thousands of miles away who had lost loved ones, homes and livelihoods that they dug deep for a retiring collection and together donated the magnificent total of £550 to the Nepal Earthquake Appeal organised by the DEC, of which Christian Aid is a founder member. Thank you all - members, local residents and holidaymakers - for your generous response.

We have just had two lovely days at our Church. First there was Pentecost Sunday, which as you know was May 24th. This is also our Birthday Sunday so the Church was decorated with flags and balloons. We also had the Boys' Brigade from Bradford, which was lovely. We had party poppers and Stephen came out with an umbrella up and a raincoat on. Someone let off a party popper above the umbrella, demonstrating that if you did that the Spirit would only land on the umbrella! Then he lit the candles on the cake, asking the boys to blow them out...but they couldn't! (Magic candles!) We sang "Teach me to Dance.... and the boys did.

Lunch was then served and in the afternoon we had our Annual Church Meeting. We all agreed it had been a lovely day.

St Faith's

As many of you reading this will already know, the Rector of St Faith's Church, Canon Beryl Wood, is retiring on ill-health grounds.

A farewell service for Canon Beryl is being held at St Faith's Church on July 26th at 9.45am. Everyone is warmly welcomed to attend this service when there will be an opportunity to give thanks to God for Canon Beryl's ministry among our Anglican and Methodist members.

During the special service, there will be prayers said for Canon Beryl's continued restoration to good health and for her new life in retirement. It will be a sad occasion for us at St Faith's because over the five years that she has been Rector we have come to know her well and to love her. We will give thanks for the many gifts she has brought to us, in the way she has led the clergy team at St Faith's and be reminded of the many aspects of worship and pastoral care with which she has been involved.

It will be the second time that we have said our farewells to Canon Beryl because, as many of you will recall, she first came to St Faith's more than 20 years ago when she served her curacy among us when the Rev Canon Dennis Rider was Rector.

Canon Beryl was one of the pioneers of women's ministry within the Church of England, and together with the Rev Kathleen Lees, also of St Faith's, was one of the first women to be ordained as priest in the Norwich diocese.

Canon Beryl says the period since February this year when she became unwell with a mini stroke has been a "huge challenge" for her.

She writes:" I had struggled at Christmas 2014 and, though I had a rest afterwards, when I came back within a month I was struggling again, this time with a couple of minor strokes. I had to stop and, in hindsight, I am pleased I did for what followed really knocked me for six".

Canon Beryl says she is now getting back to her old self and adjusting to the changes in her well-being.

She said: "It is never an easy decision to retire and I had put it off for two years, wanting to carry on. I persuaded myself that with careful management of my time, and creating more space for my wellbeing, I could keep going. Yet I never really acknowledged the seriousness of my illness until the added worry of another series of minor strokes."

Canon Beryl talks of her time as Rector of Gaywood as "challenging, enjoyable, surprising, rewarding and much, much more".

"I have enjoyed our Church family at St Faith's and valued their love and support. We have journeyed together through good times and tough times and, with God's help, we have come through to see another day and another challenge," she said

She added: "I want to say a big THANK YOU to everyone for sharing my five years among you and I hope and pray that you will stay together as the family of God in this place and prepare to welcome a new Rector."

Fortunately, we will still be seeing Canon Beryl in the area because she is to move from the Rectory at the end of August to live in retirement in South Wootton. She officially retires on 17^{th} August.

On Saturday, 25th July, there is to be a farewell afternoon tea party for Canon Beryl in the Rectory Gardens (if wet the party will be held in Phase One of the Church Rooms). The event starts at 2.30pm and continues until around 5pm. Everyone is invited to come along and wish Canon Beryl a happy retirement. We hope that we will send her off into retirement with a lovely, relaxed afternoon which is to be attended by people from her previous parishes in various parts of the country.

Mary-Rose explains about the concept of an Artist-in-Residence.

She says the aim is to offer artists a time and space away from their usual environments and obligations. Artists-in-Residence provide a time of reflection, research, presentation and /or production. She says they can also

allow an individual to explore his/her practice within a particular community and thereby meeting new people, using new materials, experiencing life in a new location.

In Mary-Rose's words "Art residences emphasise the importance of meaningful and multi-layered cultural exchange and immersion into a particular culture".
