Dear Friends,

As you read in the last issue of Rejoice! the District Probationers' Committee and Presbyteral Synod have, by the grace of God, recommended me to the Connexion for ordination this summer. By the time this issue of Rejoice! is published I hope that the last of my probationer's studies will be completed and submitted. With the formal assessment of my probation completed comes the opportunity for celebration, and it is a great joy for me (and hopefully for you all) that the District Testimony Service will be held in the Circuit, at London Road on May 23rd at 3pm. These services are held annually and are a chance for the probationers' Circuits and the District to share in the journey of their probationer ministers from stationing to ordination, to hear something of the work of God in their lives and to celebrate the ways God calls and enables us. This year I will be the only probationer sent from the East Anglia District for reception into full connexion and ordination at the Conference in Southport.

As Southport is such a distance from us, I am thankful for the opportunity to have an event locally to mark the occasion. The service will be led by our District Chair, the Rev. Julian Pursehouse, and I am thrilled that our preacher will be the Rev Dr Malcolm Guite. Malcolm was one of my tutors for my MA in Pastoral Theology and is a poet and priest in the Church of England, serving as chaplain of Girton College, Cambridge. Those of you who have been at services I have led will no doubt have heard me read from his *Sounding the Seasons: Seventy Sonnets for the Christian Year.* It will be a real privilege to hear Malcolm read his own poems and to preach.

For those who would like a weekend away, tickets are available for both the Conference Service at Southport on 28th June at 10.30am when I will be received into Full Connexion, and for the Wesley House ordination service at Chester Cathedral that evening at 6.30pm. Tickets are free. I have a supply of tickets for the ordination service which I shall be happy to distribute, or they can be obtained from www.methodistconference.org.uk.

May I take this opportunity to thank you as a circuit for your welcome, your support and encouragement, your love and prayers. Thank you for the ways you have helped me to grow as a person, as a disciple and as a minister. The work is far from over, and I look forward to continuing to learn and serve within the life of our Circuit.

THE ASCENSION

We have got a new cooker. This prompted Adrian to tell me the story of a paratrooper making his first jump. On leaving the plane he couldn't remember how to open the parachute. On the way down he met a man coming up sitting on a gas oven. "Do you know anything about parachutes?" he called out"..."No, do you know anything about ovens?" I am afraid it was very irreverent of me but it made me think of the Ascension. That too seems such an improbable story.

When Jesus led his disciples out to the Mount of Olives something mysterious and profound happened that they could only describe in the thought forms of the day, when they believed that the earth was flat and heaven up on the next story, the celestial geography we used to sing about in children's hymns that have long since been removed from our hymn books, such as "There's a Friend for little children above the bright blue sky." Indeed there is something rather off-putting about Jesus ascending vertically and the straining eyes of the disciples following him, a Cape Canaveral scenario. I take the view that the writer was doing his best with something that was quite indescribable, like the Transfiguration or Pentecost.

So what are we to make of it? What is there in it for us? I think we can get round to it by seeing the effect it had on those who were there. Luke says "They returned to Jerusalem with great joy." From what we are told I think we can see three reasons why they were so happy,

They knew now that he was going to be around always. Of course they had been elated when they had seen the risen Lord but it was unthinkable that the appearances of Jesus should go on being limited by time and space, now with a few folk in an upper room, now with a group of disciples on the shore of a lake; and what about generations to come? There had to be a time when Jesus would be available for everyone everywhere for ever. This is what he had promised, "Lo I am with you always."

They had caught a glimpse of heaven. For three thrilling years they had been with him, walked with him, talked with him, seen his love in action. They had been through exciting times which lifted them to mountain top heights. Now they had a vision of him as the cosmic Christ. He had not gone into celestial retreat. He sits at the right hand of God as Victor and Ruler. It was not an abdication; it was a coronation. They would be in for hard and dangerous times. This would make them ready for all that the world could throw at them.

They knew now that they had got to continue his mission.. He had given them their marching orders. They had had their glimpse of heaven, now it was out into the world to proclaim the faith that was in them. They were to wait in Jerusalem until power was given them, until Pentecost and then "You shall be my witnesses......to the ends of the earth."

That is what there is in the Ascension for us too – the joy of knowing that Jesus is there for us all the time....the joy of knowing Christ reigns victorious....the joy of knowing that we have a great job to do.

MWiB Conference at Belsey Bridge near Bungay March 2015

On Saturday 21st March three of us set off on a cool day really looking forward to hearing Rev Nicola Jones speak and joining our fellow women from across the District in fellowship food and fun at our Methodist Women's Conference. Many of you will remember Rev Dick Jones, Nicola's father, who served as Chair of our District in the 1980's.

After merry greetings and meeting friends from Downham, we were given a warm welcome by Rev Heather Sorrell our acting District President who took over earlier than planned from Mrs. Angela Macquibban. Nicola led the first of two morning sessions on the theme of the day "Who cares?"

Nicola's starting point was getting us to think about who we are, who we care for and who will care for us. We discussed with our neighbours and looked briefly at the Bible passages - Ecclesiastes 3 1 -8, Matthew 16 v 13 and Psalm 139 which Nicola used during her talks.

Then we were given an impassioned insight into the lives of refugees and those who have disabilities in the Land of the Holy One. Nicola referred to Israel and the West Bank area of the Palestinians with this name. She told us of the huge compassionate work done by the small communities of Christians in the Land of the Holy One and how they often feel forgotten by Christians in the West. Nicola told us of the Four Homes of Mercy especially the one in Bethany that she has visited once or twice a year for many years. Many older and not so old people are cared for in the Bethany home that have incontinence issues, and the need is for about £2000 for incontinence pads a week! In a weak moment Nicola offered to bring money each time for what she'd heard as £200! But so far she has managed to raise £2000 to take each time she goes there!

It was emotional for Nicola to talk about and describe the conditions the Palestinians live in, in the Refugee Camps and how there is no freedom to move across to the other side of the Wall on the West Bank. She recounted how many have lost sons and daughters through the fighting and as a result of restrictions to passage, even when emergency treatment is needed at the hospital! She told us of a mother and baby who lost their lives through this delay. There is heartbreak of course on both sides though, when the suicide bombers kill innocent Israelis and the Israelis shoot Palestinians. Nicola recounted a meeting with Israeli and Palestinian mothers, a distraught Palestinian mother begging forgiveness at the feet of an Israeli mother.

So we were given much to think about through Rev. Nicola's two inspirational sessions and were asked especially to remember the Christians who show they

care for all in the Land of the Holy One. All they ask for and want is the prayerful support and visits from us, whenever we are able to do so.

There was time for a short workshop before lunch. We had been given a choice between bead craft, creative prayer, discussion and creative writing, drama or singing. Several of our Circuit made beautiful creations from beads, Mary went to the Prayer group and Linda and I went to do some drama based on the Parable of the sheep and the goats. But this script based on Matthew 25 verses 31-40 was very humorous and several of us spoke the sheep views! We also dressed up with anything woolly! It was very well received with hilarity at the Worship.

After lunch we had anther hour of workshop in preparation for the Worship with Communion in which women in the drama and singing and prayer groups enhanced a meaningful service led by Rev. Heather and Rev. Nicola.

Do come and join in the Spring District day at Chapel Field Road, Norwich on 30th April when the speaker will be Linda Crossley President of Methodist Women. The Autumn District day will be at Diss on 8th October when rev. Heather Sorrell will be Inducted as our President. More about this at a later date.
