Festival Fringe Event

The members of London Road Methodist Church who raised £30,000 to restore their Bishop organ were rewarded by a brilliant display of the instrument's capabilities at the hands of Adrian Richards, Director of Music at King's Lynn Minster. Adrian's programme varied from a major work, "Bach's Prelude and Fugue in B Minor BWV 588" to his final piece "Jazzman Swing" written by Adalberto Guzzine for electronic organs.

The range of the organ was highlighted in many of the descriptive pieces Adrian played, Elfes by Joseph Bonnet", "Holsworthy Church Bells by Samuel Sebastian Wesley and 6 of the 32 "Mechanical Clock" pieces by Haydn. Also Bach's "Air on a G string" and Pachebel's "Chaconne in F minor."

He also featured music by his predecessor Charles Burney "Cornet piece VI in B flat" and ended the first half with a light hearted "Festmusick from Vag a leve" (Dare to Live) by Takie.

The small audience was very appreciative of this eclectic programme that Adrian had put together, which demonstrated the capabilities of this magnificent organ.

London Road Methodist Church is very grateful to Adrian for so readily accepting the offer to give the recital.

What better than to listen to beautiful music, played by The Ringstead Quartet, in the beautiful surroundings of London Road on a Sunday afternoon in Festival Week.

St Faith's

Septemberthe season of mists and mellow fruitfulnessHarvest Festival is to be celebrated at St Faith's with a special service at 10.30am on 28th September followed by a bring-and-share lunch in the nearby Gaywood Church Rooms. There will be a retiring collection for WaterAid. Everyone is welcome and there will be an opportunity to sing some popular harvest season hymns.

A once annual tradition to celebrate Harvest Festival amid the ruins of ancient Bawsey Church, just outside King's Lynn, is being revived this year thanks to the Gayton Group of Parishes. A service will be held in the ruined remains on Saturday, 13th September starting at 2pm. The service will be followed by a bring-your-own picnic tea. Everyone is welcome and car parking is available close to the site. Further information about this event is available by contacting St Faith's Church Office on 01553 4916 between 9am and 12 noon weekdays. The next Messy Church session is being held on 12th September in Gaywood Church Rooms. The session of family friendly fun and fellowship including craft activities, runs from 4.30pm through to 6.30pm ending with a shared meal. Everyone is welcome, but adults must be accompanied by a child.

This year Messy Church is celebrating its 10th anniversary. There are now more than two thousand Messy Church groups operating across twenty countries with new groups being launched every week. On August 4th St Faith's staged a successful day-long vigil to commemorate the outbreak of World War One. Readings were delivered by church members on each half-hour and a muffled peal of bells was rung at 11am for an hour. The vigil attracted a steady stream of people who came into the church and listened to the readings and said prayers before they left. St Faith's World War 1 Project team said the vigil had been very worthwhile. "People came into the church and listened to the readings and sat quietly reflecting on the conflict and the massive loss of young lives. It was a thought-provoking and emotional day for many people,|" The day also saw the opening of a major new exhibition which shows the results of research into the names of some of those soldiers from Gaywood (it was a small rural village in 1914) who served at The Front , many of them never to return. Neil Leggett and Barbara Wasgstaff have been heavily involved in this work. The exhibition has been put together with cash awarded from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Sincere thanks must go to the Cambridge office of the HLF for its generous grant award. The cash has meant that we have been able to create a really professional and high quality display, which is only what these soldiers, who made the ultimate sacrifice, deserve. The exhibition, which is open to the public each weekday morning between 9am and 12 noon, is well worth a visit. It will continue until mid-November. Admission is free.

As part of the events being arranged by St Faith's, there is to be a World War 1 commemorative evening in November featuring a programme of music and readings. More details of this special evening will be announced later.

As people may have read in the Lynn News, St Faith's Anglican and Methodist Church celebrated its 40th anniversary of sharing the church for worship and mission.

Former clergy and ministers returned to join in the celebrations and the day included two special services, a lunch. screening of old film reel about the parish and a traditional-English style afternoon tea. It was generally felt that the anniversary had been a great success. There was a wonderful atmosphere of thanksgiving to God for all that has been achieved in sharing at St Faith's down the decades. Looking ahead to October, St Faith's is to stage a Gift Day on October 4th. On that day the church will be open and people are being invited to call in and offer their monetary donations. All the cash raised will go to the upkeep of the historic building. More details about the Gift Day, and how you can help support it, are available by contacting the Church Office.

Plans are well underway for St Faith's second Christmas Tree Festival in December when the church will take on a sparkling winterwonderland look with around 30 illuminated and decorated trees on display. This year's tree festival will be open from December 12th to the 15th and there is to be a special invite-only preview evening on December 11th. The festival will be officially opened during this evening. (By?)

Local Primary schools and church organisations have all been invited to take part and already there has been a positive response. Volunteers will be needed to help with stewarding and for other roles while the Tree Festival is on. Terrington St. Clement 200th Anniversary of Methodism

This year in Terrington St. Clement we are celebrating 200 years of Methodist worship in the village.

An old Deed dated 16th December 1813 declares that a group of Methodist Trustees was established with the legal right to build a chapel on land "in Terrington Saint Clements in Perkin Field". The Methodist Minister appointed by the Methodist Conference at this time, also mentioned on the trust deed, was Maximilian Wilson. It is thought that the land in question was on the opposite side of the road to the current chapel building.

However, with deeper research it was found that the Bishop of Lynn had granted a licence for Methodist worship in two farm labourers' cottages in 1809! It is thought that a chapel must have been built on the land referred to in the deed of 1813, but as yet historic evidence hasn't come to light as to when it was built.

The Sunday School rooms were built on the other side of Wesley Road from the present Chapel apparently on the site of the original chapel building. The School rooms celebrated their Centenary in 1985.

Many people in the village and further afield were married in the Chapel building of 1844 and gang shows, sales and many events that took place in the Sunday School rooms across the road are remembered with great affection over the years by many people in the area and our Circuit. The Sunday school rooms closed in 2004 to help fund the building of the present Chapel.

The present modern, dual purpose Chapel, was opened in 2005, and built on the site of the second Chapel, founded in 1844. Rev. Graham Thompson preached at the Dedication of the Chapel in June 2005.

So in Terrington St. Clement we began celebrating our rich and varied history during the weekend of 14th and 15th June this year. The Chapel was open for coffee, lunch and tea on the Saturday, when there were various fund raising stalls and a large display of memorabilia, Wedding albums and photos depicting the Chapel's history. Some very early photos that had been given by the Terrington History group led by Mr. Bryan Howling were also on the display.

At lunchtime, on Saturday 14th June the occasion was blessed by the presence of three previous Ministers, the Rev. David Blacklock (who also led the special Bicentenary service the next day 15th June), Rev. Barabara Savage, Rev. David Howarth and also our Superintendent Minister Rev. Andrew Maguire. Their spouses were also there and a good number from our Circuit also came for lunch, which was a really good time of fellowship and reminiscing on times past.

Bicentenary celebrations continued on Saturday 28th June with an afternoon concert given by a local group called 'The Halcyon Singers' followed by afternoon tea. Songs from 'The King and I' and 'South Pacific' were sung, along with the theme music of 'Vicar of Dibley' 'The Lord is my Shepherd', and some folk songs. Everyone there, including another past Minister Rev. David Caink (1961 – 1966)

and his wife Rosemary, enjoyed the variety of songs and a delicious tea of sandwiches, scones and cakes.

Celebrations will culminate in a Flower Festival with the theme 'All Good Gifts Around Us' on Saturday 4th October. You will be very welcome to join us for coffee or lunch on the Saturday from 10 a.m to 4 p.m and enjoy the floral displays, some fundraising stalls and raffle, as well as reading the history of 200 years of Methodism in the village.

Harvest Festival service will be at 10.30 a.m on Sunday 5th October led by Rev. Andrew Maguire. The floral displays can be viewed afterwards from 1p.m until 4p.m when tea and cakes will also be served.

SEPTEMBER THE THIRD

At St Faith`s, with moving services, an all day vigil and a splendid exhibition we commemorated the centenary of the outbreak of the Great War. The day ended with a call to extinguish all lights, just leaving a candle burning as a symbol of hope. As the Dean of Westminster Abbey wrote in his foreword: "Tonight we catch glimpses of people's anticipations of what was to come. But we also have an opportunity to reflect on the attitudes of those preparing for war." As we listened to readings from the diaries and letters of long ago we wondered what it must have been like.

Some of us who are older were to find out for ourselves just 25 years later, for September the 3rd marks the 75th anniversary of the outbreak of World War II. This is what I wrote in my Wartime Diary:

"3rd September 1939

`This morning the British Ambassador in Berlin handed the German Government a final note stating that unless we heard from them by 11 o'clock that they were prepared at once to withdraw their troops from Poland a state of war would exist between us. I have to tell you now that no such undertaking has been received and that consequently this country is at war with Germany.`

We hurried home from Chapel on that fateful Sunday morning to switch on the wireless for the expected announcement. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's voice came over firm but full of emotion. The word 'adrenalin' was not in our vocabulary in those days but all these years later it could well be used to describe the surge of excitement and dread with which we listened to his measured words. For so long we had lived in suspense and uncertainty, wondering whether all the feverish war preparations had been undertaken to reinforce diplomacy or whether they would really be wanted. The construction of shelters for protection against air raids; -sandbags, sometimes even filled by children, piled up against important buildings; the issue of gas masks in square cardboard boxes to all; searchlights probing the night sky; the balloon barrage, impressive and reassuring, sent up; Conscription was introduced and on the Saturday evening we learned that full mobilisation had been ordered. Now we knew and we wondered what effect this announcement was going to have on our lives. It was to change the course of history. Nothing would ever be the same again"

I knew that for me it would mean a most difficult decision when my turn came. Was it right for a Christian to go to war? Could I opt out and let others go to the rescue of a ravaged nation and, if it came to it, protect my homeland? This was the terrible dilemma which faced the church as a whole and wisely. I believe, our leaders did not pronounce on either side but equally supported those who came to opposing conclusions. I think for me what tipped the balance was our Lord's very sympathetic tone towards a Roman centurion. Anyway I decided that I would have to go. Actually I volunteered, not because of any patriotic sentiments but for the pragmatic reason that I would have more choice. So it was that I went to Grantham for an interview and medical and came home with the proverbial King's Shilling in my pocket. That is how it came about that for the next 8 months and 23 days I found myself in the Royal Army Service Corps, in London during the Blitz, for 4 ½ years without a break in Cyprus, Egypt, Libya, Italy. It changed my life and influenced the whole pattern of my ministry, but that is another story.
