Dear Friends,

Christmas is a time of celebration, but also a time of great contrasts. As we prepare to celebrate many of us feel moved to give a little more generously to charity than we normally do. We may well find groups like Round Table and Rotary out and about celebrating but also collecting. If we are fortunate enough to enjoy "plenty" at Christmas then we may be moved to give to support those who do not enjoy such good fortune. This year that sense of contrast may be all the greater as we remember refugees fleeing from Syria and other war-torn countries.

It could be said that Christmas has been a time of contrasts right from the beginning. At its heart Christmas is about Jesus coming from unutterable glory and immersing himself in the complex and untidy life of humanity in the form of a tiny, vulnerable baby. This contrast, this great mystery and wonder has been the source of astonishment and amazement from the earliest days.

The opening chapter of the Gospel of John has those memorable words: The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory.

A sermon probably preached in the fourth century says:

For the miracle strikes me senseless. The Ancient of days has become a child, He who sits on a high and lofty throne is placed in a manger,and is embraced by human hands. He who tore the bonds of sin asunder is entwined in swaddling-clothes.

A Pope from the fifth century wrote:

He whom nothing could contain was content to be contained. The humility of manhood and the loftiness of the Godhead both meet there. The infancy of a babe is shown in the lowly nature of the cradle: the greatness of the Most High is proclaimed by the angels' voices. The one whom Herod treacherously tries to kill is like us when we were small babies; but the one whom the Magi delight to worship on their knees is the Lord of all.

Charles Wesley, the great eighteenth century hymn writer so loved by Methodist people, has these words in one of his hymns:

Our God contracted to a span incomprehensibly made man.

It sounds utterly amazing and incredible, so much so that some people are tempted to think it is all nonsense. But, utterly amazing and incredible as it may be, it has fascinated and inspired people for over 2,000 years, and millions live by the faith that it is true. So what does it mean if it is true? Just two thoughts from so many that could be shared.

First, we rejoice that humanity has been touched with the glory of God. If the Magi found God in a baby in a manger in Bethlehem then perhaps we too will sometimes find God In the most unlikely, unexpected and humble of places. May we have eyes to see.

Second, If God in his great love crossed apparently impossible boundaries in such an incredible way then maybe we too should be ready to reach out the hand of love in surprising ways and across boundaries which at first sight we would not dream of crossing.

What a contrast there is between a drab and colourless world where everybody looks in on themselves and a world touched with the glory of God where the hand of love reaches out across boundaries.

Thank God that in the baby Jesus He crossed the boundary between heaven and earth and filled the earth with his glory.

A joyful Christmas to you all.

Pastoral Day at London Road

A time to keep silence and a time to speak.....

More than 40 people attended the day which was led by Jackie Smith, a textile artist and MIND supporter. The day was devoted to mental health issues. Jackie has a great knowledge and interest in mental health as her daughter Caroline, now in her 30s, has had mental health problems since childhood.

Jackie told us about her daughter; she is a lovely girl, the nicest, kindest person, with a degree in sociology and psychology, yet suffers most dreadfully.

Jackie said her aim was to raise the profile of mental illness. She wanted to help people understand the best way of dignifying those with mental health problems. There is still a stigma attached to mental illness. People don't like to say they are mentally ill because they are afraid of a negative reaction.

During the day there was group work, role play and discussion about the best way to handle various situations.

Jackie is a great supporter of MIND, which she considers does excellent work. She thinks mental health is the poor relation and needs more money spent on it.

She had her impressive textiles on display. The most striking was a vast, threatening, black monster, in the middle of which was a mother gently cradling a child with its head down. Jackie had made the monster for Caroline, who had told her she felt she had a great black beast pressing on her and around her from which there seemed to be no escape. Until Caroline feels able to hold up her head Jackie is there to support her. The symbolism was very moving. The textiles hanging round the room were all very moving in their beauty.

Telling her audience how best to support people with mental health problems and help them feel more positive about them, Jackie said, "Listen. Don't talk too much."

The important lesson was in Ecclesiastes.....a time to keep silent and a time to speak.

Some comments;

Jackie wasn't trying to make us into mental health workers but instead give us an improved understanding of mental well being.

I was moved by the expression of such deeply personal spiritual reflections in the beautiful works of art.

This was an excellent day with a very good speaker. I admired her vision in saying such things.

All attending came away with a greater empathy and urge to help others towards more understanding of mental illness and the fellowship obtained by meeting others from around the Circuit.

Chicken Foot

Following a request by the editor to know more about this event which takes place at Dersingham every two months Rene Hayward has written the following instructions:

Chicken Foot is played with 91 coloured dominoes. The object of the game is to get rid of all your dominoes, but beware as the double blank counts as 50. Every player takes 7 dominoes. The player with the lowest double goes first laying the first domino in the centre of the grid, and that player may lay up to 6 dominoes around the grid providing that each one has the same number as the centre grid one (the double blank does not count as the lowest). When they have laid as many as they can the person on the left can move. Providing that the 6 dominoes around the grid have been laid, that person can go anywhere but if the 6 have not been laid then they may only go if they can match the centre one. If they cannot go then they have to pick one up but may lay it down if it has one of the numbers on the centre grid. Continue around the table until all 6 dominoes have been laid, and then vou play normal dominoes until someone lays a double. All play stops on the other dominoes until 3 dominoes have been laid off the double (this is the foot). This sounds complicated but it is not and is very easy to learn. It is guite hilarious, creates a lot of laughter and, of course, fellowship, and also raises funds for our Chapel and various charities. Churches Together in Downham Market Carol Singing for Christmas Hampers At Tesco Fridays 4th and 11th December Starting at 7pm

HAPPY NEW (LITURGICAL) YEAR!

No, it's not January 1st just yet but Advent Sunday does mark a new beginning in the Bible readings we shall listen to in our services for the year to come. Following the Christian calendar they will tell the story of Jesus from the anticipation of his coming during Advent to Christmas and Epiphany; his life and teaching through to Lent, Passiontide and Easter; Ascension and the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost; then the story of apostles and martyrs who spread the Christian faith. It is lovely to remember that the same readings are shared by all the major Christian denominations. The lectionary follows a three year cycle with the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke given a year each, with St John interspersed in all three. This year will be devoted to St Luke, which has been described as the most beautiful book in the world.

Luke, who also wrote the Acts of the Apostles, was probably born at Antioch and writes as a non-Jew. His one desire was to offer the gospel as good news for all the world. When the new born Jesus is brought to the temple Simeon sees him as a "light to lighten the Gentiles." He dedicates

both his Gospel and Acts to "Most excellent Theophilus" (meaning 'lover of God'). who could have been a high ranking Roman officer. Note how very carefully he dates the census and the emergence of John the Baptist as he wants to give the gospel story its proper place in world history. Luke accompanied Paul on his second and third journeys and was with him during his final imprisonment at Rome. He obviously caught the spirit of Paul that the gospel is meant for all. Luke emphasises Christ's friendship with publicans and sinners, Zaccheus, the prodigal son. He speaks well of Samaritans (the good Samaritan), of Gentiles (a Roman centurion who had such faith as Christ had not found in Israel). Luke ends with the command that the gospel is to be preached to all nations.

Other things to look out for are that this is:

The gospel of women. Elizabeth, the Virgin Mary, Anna, Mary Magdalene, Martha and Mary, Susanna, Joanna, women are given a prominent place. Luke was a doctor. I wonder if he may not have heard the story of the birth of Jesus from Mary herself; she would feel more free to speak of these things to an understanding doctor

A gospel marked by special tenderness. He omits the ambitious request of James and John and the murmuring at the cost of Mary's precious ointment.

A gospel of the poor. "Blessed are you poor, for yours is the kingdom of God." The story of Dives and Lazarus is told only in Luke and Christ's warning against riches is emphasised.

A gospel of Praise. It contains the Magnificat, Benedictus, Gloria in Excelsis, Nunc Dimittis, which have been part of the church's worship ever since

A gospel of Prayer. Seven occasions when Jesus prayed are mentioned. Two parables on prayer are mentioned only in Luke, The Unrighteous Judge and The Friend at Midnight.

A gospel of the Holy Spirit. Luke gives prominence to the working of the Holy Spirit, who is mentioned 54 times, (Matthew 5 times, Mark 4).


In Mark, Jesus is an austere, mysterious figure; in Matthew Jesus is the giver of the law; in Luke he is seen in social intercourse with men and

women, revealing in his own attitude to Samaritans, women, sinners, Gentiles the love of God for all.

...... I was on the 110th floor in a smoke filled room, with a man who called his wife to say Goodbye. I held his fingers steady as he dialled. I gave him peace to say "Honey, I'm not going to make it, but it's OK."

..... I was with his wife when he telephoned. She was making breakfast for their children. I held her up as she tried to understand his words and as she realised he wasn't coming home that night.

......I was in the stairwell of the 23rd floor when a woman cried out to me for help. "I have been knocking on the door of your heart for fifty years, of course I will show you the way home."

......I was at the foot of the building with the priest ministering to the injured. I took him home to tend his flock in heaven. He heard my voice and answered.

......I was on all four of those planes, in every seat, with every prayer. I was with the crew as they were overtaken. I was in the very hearts of the believers there, comforting and assuring.

......I was in Texas, Kansas, London and Birmingham. I was standing next to you when you heard the terrible news.

Did you feel my presence?

I want you to know that I saw every face, I knew every name though they did not all know me. Some met me for the first time on the 100th floor. Some sought me out in their last breath. Some couldn't hear me calling them through the smoke and flames and some chose for the final time to ignore me. But I was there.

I did not place you in the Towers that day; you may not know why but I do. However, if you were there in that moment in time, would you have reached out for me?

11th September 2001 was not the end of the journey for you, but some day your journey will end and I will be there for you as well. I will be in the stairwell of your final moments.

The source of these words is not known. There is so much in them for us to think about, great sadness but such reassurance, knowing of God's presence whenever and wherever.
