Dear Friends,

Take a deep breath...

I found myself saying these words to a lovely couple, their eyes shining with tears of joy, as they stood before me at the start of their wedding a few weeks ago. When we know we are about to do something new, something big, something exciting, we take a deep breath and plunge in.

Sometimes it is like that in the church year. There are busy times. September is a 'deep breath' moment as the Methodist year begins and brings with it a whole host of meetings as we begin the journey into the new year. This year Easter came very early, so we had barey had a chance to recover from Advent and Christmas before we were drawing another deep breath for the journey through Lent, to Passiontide and Easter, and beyond to Ascension and Pentecost.

Ordinary time gives us a chance to deepen and develop our understanding of what that means, to grow into maturity in our relationship with God, to take time to listen and discern the Spirit at work in us. And having had this 'time out' from celebrating, how much greater will our rejoicing be when the great festivals of the church come round again, and we breathe in once more, and plunge into them, with a renewed sense of engagement, and, in the words of Charles Wesley, are 'lost in wonder, love and praise'.

As we journey through Ordinary Time, may it be an extraordinary time of blessing and enrichment for us all.

As many will remember in April 2015, a major Earthquake hit Nepal, homes were destroyed and lives changed. For many, already disabled by leprosy, life became desperately hard. Although families were given temporary shelter, it could not protect them from the weather, be it rain or shine. For those affected by Leprosy the focus was to help them rebuild homes and lives.

In particular £5 could buy a set of new clothes for someone devastated by the earthquake

£10 will provide a toilet and sink for a new home and £55 could help buy a pallet of bricks to help start construction of a new, earthquake-proof house.

After we closed the appeal we were delighted to find we had collected £120 and this was sent immediately.

Back came a lovely letter of thanks from the local representative in Nepal and a poster to display.

Whilst the Leprosy Mission is a worldwide organisation aiding people with leprosy in a variety of ways, their Nepal Earthquake Appeal is targeted at the specific needs of leprosy sufferers in the areas of Nepal affected by the earthquake. The congregation had received regular information about life after the earthquake and we were able to watch a short video as well.

Otherwise we have enjoyed a busy springtime at our regular activities and now look forward to playing a part in the 'Celebrate King's Lynn' on June 11^{th} in The Walks.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY FROM HER MAJESTY

About two months before my birthday I was surprised to receive a letter from the Department of Work and Pensions. Apparently they wanted to send someone round to talk to me. I wondered what that could be all about. In due course their representative came and it was all very informal and friendly. The first thing he asked was whether I would like to receive a birthday greeting from the Queen. I suppose republicans might not want to. He wanted to make sure they had got the right date and fortunately I was able to produce a copy of my birth certificate. He also needed to confirm that I was a British citizen; Commonwealth citizens have their cards signed by the Secretary of State. We then arranged a day when it would be convenient for the card to arrive, which could be up to five days beforehand. They used to be Greetings Telegrams but these were discontinued by the GPO in 1982 so nowadays they come by courier.

Apparently there has been such a dramatic increase in the number of people reaching 100 years, 70% in the last decade, that they have had to take on extra staff for the Centenarian Team. There are a staggering 104,900 First World War babies still alive and about 3,500 cards are sent each year.

The cards are laser printed with a picture of a smiling Queen, taken at Sandringham and bear the message:

"I am pleased to know that you are celebrating your 100th birthday. I send my congratulations and best wishes to you on such a special occasion."

So now you know when you get to be a hundred.

The George Edwards Memorial Lectures – 25th June 2016

Church and Union - responses to rural deprivation 'then and now'

Every year the East Anglia District of the **Methodist Church** joins with the Norfolk Branch of the Rural Section of **UNITE** to commemorate the life and work of **Sir George Edwards O.B.E.**, the Methodist founder of the **National Union of Agricultural Workers**. The 2016 event will be held on Saturday **25th June** (2.00 - 4.00 p.m.), in the workhouse chapel at the **Gressenhall Farm and Workhouse Museum of Norfolk Life** near Dereham. This year the focus will be on past and present church responses to the problems of rural deprivation and the exploitation of agricultural workers. The speakers will be Canon **Graham Hedger**, Anglican minister and member of Unite, and Canon **Alan Robson**, ecumenical Agricultural Chaplain in Lincolnshire.

Speaking to the title "*Religion and Power*" Graham will compare the attitudes of the Anglican and Nonconformist churches to the growth of rural trades unions in Norfolk and Suffolk during the 19th and early 20th centuries.

Alan's biblical title, **"You shall not stand idly by ..."** (Leviticus 19 v. 16), is a challenge to us not to ignore the poverty and exploitation which, particularly amongst migrant workers, can still be encountered in the countryside of today. "George Edwards," he says, "didn't 'stand idly by' - so what about us?"

The meeting will be chaired by **Margaret Holmes** of Unite. There will be an exhibit by the Wesley Historical Society, and a *Traidcraft* stall will offer fairly traded goods from Third World producers.

The museum's normal entrance fee will cover attendance of the meeting. For those attending the event only, a fee of £2.50 will allow admission to site after 12.00 noon.

Additional information

Born in 1850, George Edwards was the youngest child of a Norfolk farm worker. Obliged by his family's poverty to start work (scaring crows) at the age of six, he was deprived of any formal education.

When he was first accepted as a Primitive Methodist preacher he could neither read nor write and his young wife had to teach him the scripture lessons by rote. He nevertheless went on to achieve national acclaim as a union leader. He was twice elected to Parliament as Labour M.P for South Norfolk.

When he was four years old George, with his mother and siblings, had to spend the winter in a workhouse when his father was imprisoned for stealing turnips from his employer's field. It is fitting, therefore that the annual events to commemorate him are always held in the chapel of Gressenhall Farm and Workhouse Museum of Norfolk Life. The events seek to provide an historical context for issues affecting land workers in the rapidly changing agricultural industry of the $21^{\rm st}$ century.
