Just a thought.....

I will begin this thought with questions. What does Advent mean to you? Does the thought of Advent excite you or does the thought of Christmas looming with all that it entails turn you off.? Have you thought what impact Advent can make in your faith journey? These are questions I believe we ought to be asking ourselves right now.

"ADVENT is the consecration of waiting in our lives," writes Maria Boulding in *The Coming of God* (Canterbury Press, 2001). "Some things cannot be skimped or hurried.... Faith can demand long, patient waiting, when nothing seems to be happening."

The Advent meditations familiar to us speak of the darkness before dawn, the hidden germination of the seed in the earth, the hope for things not seen, a profound engagement with the need to walk by faith and not by sight. The trouble is that all around us Christmas has already arrived. We see Christmas well before its arrival. Decorations going up, mince pies being sold, cards and presents waiting in shops for us to buy; the din of Christmas is already beginning to shut out the Advent story. Even Advent Calendars with any kind of Christian meaning are few and far between.

In this merry go round of Christmas we need to keep Advent stillness within ourselves; to take stock of the amazing gift that is being offered to us in the coming birth of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I know you will hear this many times over the next few weeks, but it is a most wonderful passage of scripture, a piece of poetry by the pregnant Mary that surely must inspire us all in making more of the advent story:-

#### "My soul magnifies the Lord, <sup>47</sup>and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour, <sup>48</sup>for he has looked with favour on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; <sup>49</sup>for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name." (Luke 1: 46 – 49)

Ponder awhile on these words; be uplifted and be prepared for the coming of the one who has, who does and who will continue to bless you and will do great things for you.

So take time, sit still, feel the anticipation of what is to come and prepare yourselves for the birth of the Son of God.

O come, O come Emmanuel, Redeem thy captive Israel O come, O come, thou Dayspring bright! Pour on our souls thy healing light; Dispel the long night's lingering gloom and pierce the shadows of the tomb.

As you can see I remain in Downham Market so I hope to see you as and when I can. I hope there will soon be days when I can get to a service, or a coffee morning or other event. (*Although the weather is turning very quickly isn't it?*) Brrrr...

Becca Rogers is "enjoying a new dimension to Parish Work" as she meets members of the local community, joins in our activities whilst being the associate minister in King's Lynn Minster and Vicar of St. John's in the Walks King's Lynn. #### St Faith's

As regular readers of Rejoice! will recall, I wrote in the October edition that the St Faith's Church Council had still to meet on 22<sup>nd</sup> September when it was expected to take its all-important vote on whether the parish wanted to go ahead with major proposals to join Gaywood with The Woottons to create a combined Benefice with three churches (St Faith's and two churches in The Woottons) . The proposals were put forward by the Archdeacon of Lynn, the Venerable John Ashe, and the Rector of The Church in The Woottons, the Rev Canon James Nash.

Church members have discussed and debated the proposals widely since the plan was revealed to them on August  $17^{th}$  by Archdeacon Ashe.

The vote was taken at the Church Council meeting and the result was unanimously against the proposals. Members have indicated that they are willing to explore links with the Church in The Woottons on an informal basis once a new Rector of Gaywood has been appointed. .

The Woottons PCC (Parochial Church Council) had voted in favour of taking the proposals forward..Obviously, for the proposals to go forward in their present form, both church communities would have to be in agreement.

A small team of St Faiths Church members continue to meet to compile the new Parish Profile which is the document sent to parish priests who may be considering applying for the post of Rector of Gaywood. The document explains in detail all about the Parish and what would be expected from a new Rector. The Parish Profile is due to be presented to the November meeting of Church Council for comment and adoption.

November 1<sup>st</sup> sees the annual Service of Resurrection Hope at St Faith's Church starting at 6.30pm. At this special service, the names of all those people with connections to Gaywood, past and present, who have died during the past year and whose funerals have been held at St Faith's or the Mintlyn Crematorium will be remembered by name. Prayers will be said for the repose of their souls and for their immediate families and friends. This is always a most moving, while at the same time, uplifting service with the focus being on the fact that these people we no longer see physically are now at rest in God's care. The love for these individuals by their families and friends is eternal. People who have lost someone close to them in past years are also very welcome to the service. Candles can be lit by those present in memory of their loved ones.

"At the going down of the Sun and in the morning, we will remember them......".the annual service of Remembrance for those from Gaywood who gave their lives for our freedom in two world wars and for those who continue to do so in more recent conflicts around the world, will be held at St Faith's Church on November 8<sup>th</sup> starting at 10am (please note the time) in church. The church is usually full for this important service at the end of which the Standards of the Royal British Legion (Gaywood branch) and the uniformed organisations (Scouts, Cubs Guides and Brownies) will join the clergy, civic dignitaries and congregation members to parade to the Gaywood Clock War Memorial for the observation of the National two minutes silence at 11am and the laying of poppy wreaths at the Clock tower memorial.

One of the biggest fund-raising and social events during Autumn is St Faith's Christmas Fair. People who serve on the fund-raising committee, under the chairmanship of Ann Ess, have met and discussed their plans for the popular event .

This year the Fair will be held on 21<sup>st</sup> November in the Gaywood Church Rooms and there will be the usual colourful variety of stalls and games of chance to tempt visitors to part with their cash. All proceeds go towards the general running costs of the Church.

Please make a note of the Christmas Fair date in your diary and do come along to meet up with old friends and enjoy some bargain Chritmas shopping. The Fair opens at 2pm.

"Come Thou Long Expected Jesus......" the first Sunday of Advent will be observed at services on November 29<sup>th</sup> at St Faith's Church (9.45am and 6.30pm).Special Taize services will be held at The Holy Family Church in Field Lane, Gaywood, each Sunday during Advent starting at 5pm. Everyone is welcome to these services of prayer, devotion, music and periods of silence, as we prepare for the birth of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

The sessions of the recently formed Art group are being held fortnightly on a Wednesday afternoon, beginning at 2pm. Sessions in November will be on the 11<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>. The sessions are open to everyone, whether experienced at painting or a novice. Those attending are asked to bring along their own art materials. There will be a small nominal charge to contribute to the cost of the church heating.

There is an opportunity to spend a few hours browsing around the stalls at the wonderful Christmas Market in Bury St Edmunds. Betty Guy has organised a coach to the Suffolk town on Saturday,  $28^{th}$  November. It should be a lovely day out in the company of friends and the opportunity of looking at more than 300 festive stalls selling a colourful variety of goods and foods. #### For all the Saints

November can be a dull month but it begins with one of the brightest days in the Christian calendar, All Saints, "A festival I dearly love" wrote John Wesley. I have two little pamphlets written by the same person, the famous Methodist minister Dr Edwin Sangster. They cost 6d each (old money). Both have a brightly covered cover and the same number of pages. If I offered to lend you one which would vou choose? One is entitled "You can be a saint" the other "You can be a millionaire." Judging by the queues for lottery tickets and the popularity of TV programmes with big handouts I have little doubt which one most people would go for, though to be fair the other one is also about being rich in a different way, a better way too. For the moment I am concerned with "You can be a saint." But I don't want to be a saint!. In Romans 7 Paul wrote "To all that be in Rome...called to be saints" and many people will be glad this message is not addressed to them. Saintliness is not a popular vocation today, unless it is the 007 sort of saint who is anything but. They think it is to be a holy Joe, a spoilsport. It is not for them. Some people's idea of saints is of rarified beings with haloes. In St Faith's we have no less that 21 of them in glorious stained glass windows and splendid wood carvings. Even in the Roman and Orthodox Churches, who go in for saints in a big way, they reserve the word for men and women of the most exalted virtue. They canonise no more than a dozen or so a year and only these qualify to be called saints. A little girl being taken into a cathedral for the first time got nearer the truth. She gazed with wonder at the beautiful glass windows "Auntie, who are those people in the windows?" ....."Ssh, not so loud. They are saints." After a few moments gazing at the windows this time an awed whisper came from Jane. "Now I know what saints are, they are people who let the light through." It is as good a definition as any! The fact of the matter is that in the New Testament to be a saint is the calling of all God's people. The word is used some 60 times. They were not people who lived sheltered lives in special places apart from the world, spending all their time in prayer and praise. They were very much in the world. At Rome there were saints in Caesar's household, a little Christian group perhaps in the emperor's servants` quarters, living out their faith there or Christians faithfully bearing their witness in high court circles. There were saints at Corinth, a city that was a sink of iniquity. It was no easy matter being a Christian there. There

were saints at Philippi where Paul was flogged and imprisoned....humble, poor ordinary people for the most part, not by any means perfect but many of them showed what they were made of. Paul, though he didn't know it at the time, was referring to some of the bravest folk of his day. They were just ordinary people but they were mighty in moral and spiritual courage. In days of appalling persecution they dared the unspeakable cruelties of the emperor Nero. One of the most moving things is to see that plain wooden cross in the Colosseum at Rome where so many endured to the end.

Paul just would not have understood anyone not wanting to be a saint, or to limiting this to a special few. All Christians are called to be saints; people who will not necessarily do great things but will do little things in a great way; people who are great in heart, great in mind, ready to build others up and make the world around them a better place. The composer Rossini had such faith in his musical ability that he once laughingly declared "Give me a laundry list (we don't have them any longer, do we?) and I will set it to music." The need and the challenge is for those who will make life a song, bringing the beauty and grace and harmony of heaven into a laundry list, or if you prefer a shopping list, into the everyday circumstances of daily living.

All saints! There's a thrill in these words for the Christian. And you too can be a saint. To be a saint is to go all out for all that God gives.

To go back to Dr Sangster. I once had the immense privilege of hearing him preach. In his sermon he asked the question "What is the church <u>for?</u>" The answer he gave was "To make good men and women." Then he went on: "And how the world needs good men and women"

It still does
