Dear Friends,

What were the Aims of Jesus? What did he intend to do? It is good to ask stretching questions such as this. A good starting place is Mark's opening remarks, "The Kingdom of God is at hand, repent and trust in the good news." Those who heard his message were expecting something. Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel had all spoken of God coming to rule in power (Isa 40:10) or beginning a new covenant (Jer 31: 31) or giving them a new heart (Ezek 36:26), but that had not taken place. The promises were as yet unfulfilled. The people of God returning to their land found that they were part of the Persian Empire and then conquered by Alexander the Great and now the Romans. For the Kingdom to come, surely meant deliverance from puppet kings like Herod, and Roman governors like Pilate and freedom from the Roman Emperor. We know from Acts 5 that Theudas and Judas had tried to bring the kingdom in through violence. Joesphus records others who tried after the time of Jesus.

But the kingdom Jesus brings does not deliver in this way; instead it is far more revolutionary. One book on my shelves refers to it as the upside down kingdom. Imagine people listening to Jesus preaching the Sermon on the Mount and being astonished as they heard "Blessed are the poor, meek etc Surely not". Then they hear "Whoever wants to save their lives will lose it and whoever loses it will save it." When James and John ask for positions of power they are told that Jesus came to serve. Later he takes a towel and bowl and washes their feet. The list is endless. Imagine the scandal as they read that the traitor Zaccheus has a place in this kingdom and so too do deviants like the Samaritan people, all sorts of marginalised outcasts and sinners. No wonder they plotted to kill him.

If Jesus had got rid of Pilate or Herod another greedy oppressive ruler would have taken their place. Instead God in Jesus goes to the heart of the matter and roots out self-centredness and greed and the abuse of power. Those who planned a coup are largely forgotten but the revolution Jesus started goes on and on in changed lives and hearts.

Every time we pray the Lord's Prayer we say "Thy Kingdom come". Perhaps it is all a bit routine, but it ought to challenge us to be open to the Kingdom and its radical character that Jesus still brings in today. If we did I believe our church life would change and our world would change.

Downham Market Churches Together

At the last meeting of Churches Together it was reported that the Christmas hamper fund was not sufficient to provide the thirty-five hampers costing approximately £30 each which we usually distribute. It was decided to ask each Church to fund raise to contribute £80 to make up the deficit, but it was hoped the larger Churches could contribute nearer £100 to help out the smaller Churches.

The report on the Social Centre included the fact that helpers are needed . The centre is open every morning for refreshments and a cooked lunch. We have paid cooks to do the actual cooking but need others to help serve the food and chat to the people who come in, many of whom live on their own and appreciate a time of fellowship. The cooked lunches are over by 1.30 but some stay to make use of the many games we have. We aim to provide good fresh food and companionable fellowship. So if you enjoy talking to people or are good at listening, pop into the social centre one morning and volunteer your time.

There will be a service for World Peace at Eternity Church (Downham Market Christian Fellowship) on 18th October at 6.30 p.m. All are welcome. Churches Together is hoping to have a slot in the Christmas lighting up ceremony and we shall be singing carols at one of the supermarkets to raise funds for the food bank again this year, so watch this space.

Janet and John also run a Fair Trade stall fortnightly in the function rooms after the morning service which is not very well patronised. We could do better. John also has the new Fair Trade catalogue to help you with your Christmas shopping. It's so much better to support charities than the commercial shops.

In October on 5^{th} 12^{th} , 19^{th} and 26^{th} at 2.00 p.m. repeated at 7.00p.m. there is to be a series of meetings on Methodism, learning more about our roots and our identity. All are welcome.

Messy Church continues to thrive and the theme of September's session was 'Love God' featuring the story of the prodigal son. Children were invited, among other things, to put their hands in our version of pig's swill (coloured porridge) with the reward of a sweet or decorate a biscuit to look like a pig . We enjoyed singing 'Our God is a great big God' and the meal followed the celebration. Thanks to all who enable Messy Church to happen whether by help of various kinds, gifts or encouraging support and prayers.

We have had some very uplifting and challenging services over the past month, especially the morning when the fellowship service took the theme of the refugee problem. There have been three baptisms and two people received into membership. Quite an eventful month. I have one little whinge however, It would be good to sing the Lord' Prayer more often. I cannot pray 'Thy will be done' if I am unwilling or resentful of having it in my life.

I cannot pray 'On earth as it is in Heaven' unless I am truly ready to give myself to God's service here and now.

I cannot pray 'give us this day our daily bread' without expending honest effort for it, or if I would withhold from my neighbour the bread that I receive.

I cannot pray 'forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us' if I continue to harbour a grudge against anyone.

I cannot pray 'lead us not into temptation' if I deliberately choose to remain in a situation where I am likely to be tempted.

I cannot pray 'deliver us from evil' if I am not prepared to fight evil with my life and prayer.

I cannot pray 'Thine is the Kingdom' if I am unwilling to obey the King. I cannot pray 'Thine is the power and the glory' if I am seeking power for myself and my own glory first.

I cannot pray 'for ever and ever' if I am too anxious about each day's affairs. I cannot pray 'Amen' unless I honestly say "cost what it may, this is my prayer". There is a lot to think about as we say the Lord's Prayer each week in a church service and I am sure the slower pace with music will help us in our thinking. Whinge over. I pray we shall all have more uplifting challenging services in the coming months to strengthen our faith and our fellowship.

St Faith's

At the time of writing this article, St Faith's Church Council have still to meet on 22nd September when it is expected that the all-important vote on whether the parish wanted to go ahead with proposals to join Gaywood with The Woottons to create a combined Benefice with three churches (St Faith's, and two churches in The Woottons) will be taken. The proposals were put forward by the Archdeacon of Lynn, the Venerable John Ashe, and the Rector of The Church in The Woottons, the Rev Canon James Nash.

Church members have discussed and debated on the proposals since the plan was revealed to them on August 17th by Archdeacon Ashe.

If the proposals are taken forward and become a reality it would mean the most significant change in the large urban Gaywood parish to take place for centuries.

The Woottons PCC (Parochial Church Council) have already taken a vote with the result being in favour of the proposals. Obviously, for the proposals to go forward in their present form, both church communities would have to be in agreement.

On 6th October a new Autumn course starts at St Faith's aimed at giving a new insight into some of our well-known as well as lesser known Saints.

For All the Saints will be held in Church starting at 7.30pm until 9pm and there will be time for tea and chat.

The first session will focus on St Faith and Saints Perpetua and Felicity.

The second session, on 13th October, will look at the life of St Ignatius of Loyola. October 20th those attending will look at St John Chrysastom with the final session on 27th October looking at St Francis.

Do put these dates in your diaries and come along and be inspired. Everyone is welcome to all or some of the evenings.

Looking ahead, on 1st November, will be the annual Service of Resurrection Hope at St Faiths Church starting at 6.30pm.

At this special service, the names of all those people with connections to Gaywood past and present who have died during the past year and whose funerals have been held at St Faith's or the Mintlyn Crematorium will be remembered by name. Prayers will be said for the repose of their souls and for their immediate families and friends.

This is always a moving and uplifting service with the focus being on the fact that these people we no longer see physically are now at rest in God's care. The love for these individuals by their families and friends is eternal. People

who have lost someone close to them in past years are also very welcome to the service. Candles can be lit by those present in memory of their loved ones.

Although you are probably reading this article at the beginning of October, thoughts of some church members have already been looking at preparations for the 2015 St Faith's Christmas Fair. These people are those who serve on the fund-raising committee under the chairmanship of Ann Ess.

This year the Fair will be held on 21st November in the Gaywood Church Rooms and, as always, there will be the usual colourful variety of stalls and games of chance to tempt visitors to part with their cash. All proceeds go towards the general running costs of the Church on Gayton Road.

Please make a note of the Christmas Fair date in your diary and do come along for some bargain Christmas shopping. The Fair opens at 2pm.

One of the positive things to emerge from the week-long Artist-in-Residency, staged under the direction of Church member Mary-Rose Upton in August, is the formation of a new Art Group at St Faith's Church.

The first session was being held on 16th September and then it is due to meet each fortnight on a Wednesday afternoon, beginning at 2pm. It is open to everyone, whether experienced at painting or a novice. Those attending are asked to bring along their own art materials. There will be a small nominal charge to contribute to the cost of the Church heating.

It is stressed that the group will be run on an informal basis with no rules or regulations to worry about.

Church member, John Woodford, has made a wooden bench from sections of oak in memory of his wife, Margaret, who died suddenly on 2nd February 2013 after returning to their Gaywood home from a holiday with John in Cyprus.

Margaret was a very creative lady, particularly in the specialist area of flower arranging.

It is currently on show at its temporary location, outside the Church Bungalow in the church driveway, and people have been invited to take a look at John's fine workmanship and make their views known about it. The bench is due to be discussed by members at the meeting of the Church Council on 22^{nd} September.

Anyone who had a heart

15,000 people lined the streets and threw roses on to the bonnet of the hearse. Cliff came along to sing. Not everyone has a celebrity packed funeral but this was Cilla. Inevitably they had "Anyone who had a heart,"

Who ever loved could look at me and know that I love you

Anyone who ever dreamed could look at me and know that I dream of you

But it is unrequited love. I looked up the lyrics and this is how it ended:

Anyone who had a heart would surely take me in his arms and always love me.

Why won't you?

There was a hymn too, one which in my working days people who didn't know the hymn book very well often chose, perhaps as a reminder of childhood days:

All things bright and beautiful All creatures great and small All things wise and wonderful The Lord God made them all.

This is unconditional, unlimited love from the one who makes his sun to rise on the evil and the good and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. As another hymn says it is "Love to the loveless shown." I had the privilege of preaching the gospel for 73 years. If there is one thing more than any other that I hope I got across it is this love of God for everyone. We are all his children and he loves each one as if there were only one to love. I think of someone who has had a crippling illness for years yet she

is so cheerful and is like that all the time. It is because she knows God loves her. It was like that with George Matheson; struck blind at the outset of a promising career as a minister, he could write "O love that wilt not let me go"

As I write the news is of thousands of migrants desperately fleeing the maelstrom of life in the Middle East and parts of Africa, at the mercy of unscrupulous traffickers, setting to sea in crowded unseaworthy boats. On land some have been confronted by riot police and tear gas. How different if only we look upon them, talk about them, act towards them remembering that each one is equally precious to and loved by God, like one lady who took a family into her home. "It seemed the natural thing to do" she said.

One Sunday Songs of Praise came from the migrant camp at Calais. Some of us were perhaps surprised to learn that they had built a makeshift church. An Ethiopian Christian has given up the idea of trying to get through the barriers and get to England. He has decided to stay there and run the church. He knows that their deepest need is to know the love of God which is for all.

It is up to us all to respond to that love. Advent will soon be here with an opportunity to do so when the minister says in the Communion Service (Methodist Worship Book page 117 or similar in Common Worship):

"Our Lord Jesus Christ said: The first commandment is, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength" The second is this: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself."
