Dear friends,

It has fallen to me to speak about the month that leads to Christmas Day. Speaking personally, there are several things that I wish did not happen this month.

Firstly, that we begin celebrating Christmas far too early. After all, should we have Christmas events in November? Just because our biggest centres launch displays in September does not mean we are to copy them. However, it does put pressure on us to bring Christmas forward. The commercial and secular world does not recognise Advent and unless we are careful Advent will be squeezed out altogether. As Catherine, has indicated already Advent is a vibrant time of watching and waiting and rediscovering some rich Old Testament themes that point us to what is ahead. But instead we can be so caught up in busyness that we have no 'pondering time' at the mystery that draws near.

Secondly, the commercial and economic drown out the spiritual and devotional. Christmas is effectively hi-jacked and marketed as a spending bonanza. But that is not why Christ came. So many people are caught up in buying 'stuff' that isn't wanted or needed and giving it to folk who do not need it either. All this is exhausting and dulling whereas Christmas should be liberating.

Despite these unfortunate bi-products of Christmas something still draws me to the event of the birth of Christ. In the Downham section, baptisms are like buses – you do not see them for a while then many come along!! Just recently we have seen quite a few babies as well as older children and adults being baptised. To think that this one child, born in difficult circumstances (in a manger, swaddling clothes etc.) will go on to change hearts and minds like no other. The world Jesus was born into had the Roman Empire and many powerful people, but where are they today but swept aside. Yet the message Jesus brought is relevant to every generation.

As the hymn writer puts it – "Who is he in yonder stall at whose feet the shepherds fall".

This babe of Bethlehem is later the itinerant Galilean preacher and he is also the man who dies on the cross, but more – "tis the Lord, O wondrous story, tis the Lord, O crown of glory."

As St Paul puts it; "For in him the fullness of the Godhead was pleased to dwell and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all

things." (Colossians 1:20). This one child makes the difference .... is the difference. This is God's way of revealing his love and his purposes to the world.

I sincerely hope and pray that as we celebrate again this time of the year that it will be a rediscovery for each one of us of the mystery of God revealing himself through his Son Jesus.

#### JOSEPH THE HUSBAND OF MARY

One of the things I miss attending a church where there are very few young people is the annual Nativity Play. I have such memories of them from the days when we had crowds of children in Sunday School and they all wanted to take part. I think my record was 16 shepherds, 5 wise men (Who said that there were only three anyway?) and a veritable host of angels. One little girl unfortunately broke her arm a few days beforehand but bravely carried on. Perhaps angels sometimes need to have their wings in plaster. Mary, as always, stole the show. In her dress of blue curtain material she looked positively radiant. A guick wave to her mum and smiling sweetly at the shepherds she got down to her task, cradling the child in a protective and motherly way. But poor Joseph, he just stood there, awkward and shy, looking quite out of things. I wondered afterwards, isn't that just the picture we get of Joseph in the Christmas story? In Christmas carols and in the Nativity scenes of the great artists he seems to be given about as much importance as ox and ass, but Joseph too had an Annunciation. The New Testament begins with the genealogy of Jesus, showing him to have been descended from the royal line of King David, and this was Joseph's family tree, not Mary's. So perhaps it is worth looking at the Christmas story again from Joseph's point of view and seeing the important part he played in the life of Jesus.

Joseph's story begins with an embarrassing dilemma. The one to whom he was betrothed was to have a child. What was he to think? What would people say? In Jewish marriage procedure there were three steps. There was the engagement, an arrangement often made by their families when they were children and may not even have met. At this point the engagement could be broken off but the next step was the betrothal which was absolutely binding. It lasted for a year during which they were known as man and wife but did not live together. A betrothal could only be ended by divorce. So this is what Joseph was understandably bound to contemplate in the circumstances. Typical of him that he was going to do it quietly. Everything we know about Joseph was that he was a kind man. When the angel told him the truth about Mary he was most kind to her. On being summoned to Bethlehem to fill in census forms he would not

leave her at home to face prying eyes and gossiping tongues but took her with him and treated her very gently in her time of need, going round to find accommodation, however limited, for her to have the baby. He showed his tenderness too in the treatment of the child entrusted to his care, taking him to his heart, making the long and perilous journey to Egypt to protect the life of the infant Jesus from Herod's soldiers. He well deserves to be called in the gospel his father.

Joseph never appears in the gospels after the visit to Jerusalem when Jesus attained the age of twelve and became a son of the law. Thereafter Mary appears on her own in the Bible story and it is usually inferred that Joseph died at a young age but Jesus owed a lot to Joseph and so do we. He was a pious Israelite faithful in his observance of Jewish customs and feasts. When we read that Jesus entered the synagogue on the Sabbath day as was his custom that was the way he had been brought up. Again, Joseph taught Jesus his trade and what a lot it has meant to Christians ever since that Jesus was involved as we all are in the world of daily work, lending dignity and worth to the humblest tasks.

So when we have a special Sunday for Mary in the Church's calendar perhaps we might also gratefully remember Joseph and the part that he played in the Christmas story.

#### Hunstanton

'The last outpost before Siberia', or so my cousin calls it: which is perhaps why Hunstanton news takes so long to reach the pages of 'Rejoice!'

'Coffee with God' is an intentional prayer meeting for the life of the church that we have started when restructuring midweek meetings. This takes place over a cuppa at the foot of the cross, reminding us that God is present and interested in every aspect of our lives. Here we pray the Scriptures, taking a different topic each week and allowing time for personal prayer. As an example, we prayed Acts 2:42-47 as we focussed on our church being devoted to one another in building relationships, learning together from the Scripture, and working for growth and renewal. Here we have already witnessed God-given courage and peace enfolding someone facing major health challenges; another finding God present as they wrestled with an unprecedented domestic issue and another finding Christ for the first time during a time of crisis and knowing with certainty his past is forgiven.

Over the last Connexional year we shared the love of Jesus locally in supporting the East Anglian Children's Hospice by funding two families for two weeks end of life care. Internationally, we have provided finance for a year's education for 12 dalit children (they are members of the lowest Indian caste) in a Christian School in Raichur through the charity Crossroads for Human Development (CRHD). This charity was started by Methodist minister in this country who himself was a dalit child helped by Christian missionaries. The charity has built a school, provides primary education and is developing secondary education as the children get older.

We continue to work with other churches in the town and surrounding villages to run the local Foodbank, and this month are together launching a debt counselling service in conjunction with Christians Against Poverty (CAP).

For the coming year we are supporting MHA as our home mission, and working in partnership with Mission Aviation Fellowship to support their overseas work with prayer and finance, as they support us reaching our community for Christ. Watch out for details of future events which include "a plane in the church car park" on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> February.
