I like watching television – I do really; the Vicar of Dibley, Midsommer Murders, 'Allo 'Allo (oh! yes I can find them on the box if I try hard enough), but then the serious stuff, the news, panorama, week in week out, bring me back to more worldly matters, and I wonder, and sometimes despair where they are all leading us. Whether it is war, violence, intolerance, abuse, fraud, environment etc. etc. there is always something; sometimes the world seems to have gone mad and bent on its own destruction. Then on a Sunday I worship God and tell him I am thankful for all that he does for us. Ummm! Is there something wrong here? Can we be thankful always; well be honest can we?

Paul tells us to "rejoice always, pray without ceasing and give thanks in all circumstances for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the spirit. Do not despise the words of prophets, but test everything; hold fast to what is good."

It may seem a long way from all the needs of the world, but in its own way it enables us to communicate our deepest concerns and make a difference, not only to those for whom we pray but also in our own lives as we pray.

In prayer we can change things, but to do so it takes action and it is your action that can change things – that's the circle, there is the challenge.

Into the New Year and still not much sign of Winter. We have got away lightly so far with just a few patches of fog but the forecast is for cold, wind and possibly snow and ice. Christmas festivities are over for another year but hopefully the true Christmas spirit will live on for a bit longer. There was such a lot of kindness and thought for others to be found amid all the commercialism. At the January meeting of Churches Together in Downham it was reported that 31 Christmas hampers had been distributed through Churches and Health Visitors, containing all the food for a Christmas meal including crackers, chocolates and a bottle of Shloer, at an approximate cost of £32 each (hampers varied according to size of family). A London banker involved his office in donating good new toys, lego etc. so children were also given presents and with many hands making lighter work the hampers were delivered as the turkey crowns were thawing out in time to be cooked. A special thanks to Alex Coates of Eternity Church who masterminded the scheme in conjunction with Churches Together and all who helped or donated in any way. Our two evenings carol singing at Tesco raised just under £250 towards next year's hampers (so beneficial; money raised; singing enjoyed and Christmas spirit spread all in one go) and with an appeal to all Churches for donations later in the year, we should be able to fund the scheme for the next Christmas. As the hampers were almost ready to be delivered Social Service appealed for 5 more, but this was not possible. So the need is always there.

Churches Together had arranged for Sally Beadle (Crazy Bananas) to do our 4 minute spot at the lighting up ceremony in the town square. She managed to

erect a Nativity scene with 4 foot high figures all made of balloons while telling the Christmas story and afterwards the scene was transferred to the stage in our hall where children was able to see it and talk about it, a good counteraction to the commercialisation of Christmas.

Christmas cheer was also spread by our Christmas lunch in the social centre when nearly 50 people, who would otherwise have been on their own for Christmas day, enjoyed their meal followed by carol singing and thanks to Downham Rotary Club's donation a present of a gift voucher. The numbers at the social centre lunches have picked up over the last 6 months making the financial situation more stable. Refreshments are served from 9.30 from Monday to Friday with lunch from 12.00 to 12.30. Our cooks and dedicated volunteer helpers produce a freshly cooked meal from fresh ingredients for an amazing £4.50 so do avail yourself of this facility when in Downham .......and there are plenty of board games to play if you want a bit of company and brain exercise.

Our Christmas Fair in November also brought a lot of cheer. Whilst we were a little disappointed that we did not quite reach the total raised last year, we were very happy at the result of a lot of hard work by all members and friends. We had many new games for the youngsters and young in heart to play and 90 sheets of 5 tickets were sold entitling play on 5 games. With Father Christmas and the craft room there was plenty for the young folk to do. Our own young people also waded in with the Brownies and Guides in charge of the craft room as well as their own fund raising projects; our Boys' Brigade and my grandson's Scout troop from Runcton Holme were also fund raising and adding to the fun. We had quite a few charity stalls spreading the benefit of the shoppers we had attracted. The lunches and other refreshments were very tasty and well organised by our efficient catering team and with Christmas music in every room a very happy atmosphere prevailed to start our season of Advent. My daughter Anne, who has organised the fair for some years now, was very pleased with the numbers of families who came. From the beginning, apart from fund raising, her aim was to provide something to attract children into our premises and this year we did it. Thanks also go to Charlie Peacock who made some of the games for us.

Now we are back with the usual routine of our daily lives having had (well they say a change if as good as a rest) time to recharge our batteries. We have started up our Saturday coffee mornings again and folk arrive to enjoy home made cakes, having digested all the over eating at Christmas, to browse the bric a brac and book stall to buy some indoor plants and enjoy fellowship with their friends after the Christmas break. We also enjoyed a lot of fellowship when Joyce Dent invited over 100 people to her 90th birthday lunch. Our splendid catering team, under the leadership of Jan and Meg, sprang into action, following Joyce and her family's meticulous planning and produced a

delicious sit down lunch. The logistics of it all were mind boggling but they did it so efficiently and it all ran so smoothly that there was no break in the chat or laughter. The Church family presented Joyce, wearing her tiara with aplomb, with flowers and a very lifelike portrait painted by one of our very talented artists, Heinz Heisler. A very happy occasion for Joyce to treasure and for all of us to remember.

Now back to everyday matters as we face a few months of Winter before we can enjoy the miracle of Spring. Already choirs are beginning to practise the music we look forward to at Easter. So far we have had a great many sunny days when it has been a joy to go out and walk while admiring the landscape with the silhouette of the trees without their leaves. #### Wimbotsham

Our Chapel was bursting with music on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> December when we had the great pleasure of The Bowman Ensemble accompanying our hearty singing of Christmas carols. Lessons were read by congregation members, festive decorations were admired and the service was followed by mince pies and coffee.

We welcomed the New Year with the annual "Covenant Service for Village Churches Together" and Holy Communion. This was led by Rev. Maurice Stafford. Whilst the tendency is to make New Year Resolutions, he bade us to look back on things we already do and to progress with those particularly relating to our worship, prayers and bible reading.

Very recently I discovered *The Primitive Methodist Ancestry* website which included more fascinating historic facts about our Chapel, a selection of which I have written below. Thanks to God, our lovely little Chapel is still thriving well over a hundred years later. How happy would be those who had the faith and vision to found the Chapel in 1874! As we now enter 2017, we wish all our fellow worshippers in the Circuit bright and richly blessed years ahead.

The website includes two Preachers' Plans for the Downham Market Circuit for January-March 1904 and April–July 1905. There were thirteen Chapels in the Circuit at the time. At Wimbotsham afternoon and evening Sunday services in 1904 were held at "2  $\frac{1}{2}$  and 6  $\frac{1}{2}$ ", this format being changed in 1905 to "2 30 and 6 30"!

Curiously, in 1904 instead of the names of the preachers each week, there was a number. This had to be matched with a list in an adjacent column of individual named preachers numbered 1-58(seven lived in Wimbotsham). An additional list named and numbered thirty-five "Others" of those On Trial, Exhorters, Mission Hands, Evangelists and Helpers. By 1905 the preachers' names were written in the columns as we see them today.

In a list headed "Church Stewards and Income" for Wimbotsham on the Plans, Income was £1.9s.0d in 1904, increased to £1.13.4 in 1905. The charge for a Baptism Certificate was sixpence.

The 1905 Plan advertises "The Primitive Methodist World" established 1883, a weekly Connexional Paper published every Thursday, price One Penny. It states that "No Primitive Methodist can be up to date on Connexional Questions without this Paper. It may be obtained from any local Newsagent in town on Thursdays, in the country on Friday morning, or direct from the office, free of post, for 1s/9dper quarter, or 6s/8d per year prepaid".

Advent at London Road

The service commenced with the lighting of the first Advent Candle. During the service we had the added bonus of the Sunday Club singing their special Star Carol. What a difference a year makes in the confidence of these young singers.

During the following week the church was packed for the special celebration service for the life of Maisie Spoor, the love she spread at London Road and Dersingham was very apparent.

Rev Steve was very succinct in summing up Maisie, especially the feeling of being in the presence of a Headmistress.

Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> saw the now traditional 21<sup>st</sup> Kings Lynn Scouts Christmas Restaurant. We are very fortunate to have among our parent helpers a qualified chef who with his charges produced an excellent meal of Winter soup (with bread rolls the Scouts had made), chicken thighs in mushroom sauce with potatoes, broccoli and carrots, followed by apple and berry fruits crumble with custard or ice cream and ending with tea/coffee and After Eight Mints. This year there was an "honesty" payment system to donate the worth of the

meal for Scout funds.

The training of waiters, hosts, drinks waiter and kitchen staff reflect highly on the leadership of John and Ros Rospopa, who must have been very proud of the Scouts' efforts.

#### **CHRISMONS**

I'm sure that you have heard on Christingle Services – but how many of you have been to or heard of a CHRISMONS service.

Well London Road held a CHRISMONS Service on the morning of December 18<sup>th</sup> 2016.

#### What's a CHRISMON?

Chrismons are a type of Christmas tree decoration used in many churches and often the homes of Christians. The symbols used represent a variety of Biblical and Theological concepts that are well known among believers, often, if the ornaments on a Christmas tree are comprised mostly of Christian symbols, the tree is known as a Chrismon Tree". Chrismons are white with gold decorations of beads, ribbon, glitter etc

It is common however, to see these ancient Christian designs in other colours than white and gold. These would not be Chrismons but simply Christian symbols- and there is nothing wrong with that.

During the service Lesley Evans assisted by members of the Sunday Club transformed an ordinary Christmas tree into a Chrismons tree.

Rev. Catherine added her Chrismon to the tree when she conducted the late service on Christmas Eve (a Lamb with a Cross), starting at 9.30pm the Centre candle of the Advent ring was lit at 10.00pm, to coincide with midnight in Bethlehem.

#### North Lynn

And so to a New Year. Our activities took a well-earned break before starting again. One activity, new towards the end of the year, we are delighted to report has a sound initial take up and we look forward to reporting further

activity during the coming year Rev. Becca was approached by the King's Lynn Hanseatic group with a view to them using the church on a Friday morning. Since October we have enjoyed getting to know the group, which has local members from the UK and from all parts of the EU, particularly Lithuania. The Hanseatic group runs English classes and trips, so that families moving here can settle in and make friends. On a Friday morning, in the church, we now host a craft group. The sight of 8 ladies, and a few children, making crafts together and chatting might seem nothing remarkable. However, we were all saddened earlier in the year by the rise in racial tension in our communities. So in a time of division, the fact that these ladies, made up of locals and those from other countries, were all working together, makes it a precious group indeed. We also have some very gifted crafters! If you or others, particularly those from other Hanseatic countries, would like to come along, you would be more than welcome. So with this new initiative and all our regular activities, North Lynn faces this New Year with continued hope that we can be a beacon of Christian Outreach in the community.

We were able with this excellent result to purchase these Extraordinary gifts: build the pig farm for a vulnerable widow £267; Girl power - sanitary products for a girls' school in rural Nepal £50; Fired Up – to train and supply bricks for 50 households to build fuel-efficient stoves - £50; for the emergency fund for refugees fleeing Syria providing whatever is needed £121.39. We give thanks for the generosity of all those who gave.

In 2017 we have several dates already in the diary, starting with our coffee mornings on 28<sup>th</sup> January and 25<sup>th</sup> February. Financially it was also a success with a profit of £1,892, which is a wonderful

result the money being used for the on-going running costs of St Faith's Church.

Now we are into a New Year the various groups and committees start to meet again and the latest meeting of the Building Projects group was to look at the way forward in terms of how we can best make use of our main buildings to try to meet the needs of the way our Church life and ministry will move forward. No decisions have yet been made and all suggestions will need to be approved by the full Church Council.

It hardly seems possible but the fund-raising committee has already met to consider the 2017 Spring Fair which will be held on the third Saturday in March. For the first time there is to be an Easter family activity afternoon on Easter Day in the "Messy Church" style and an evening service of Prayer. So lots to look forward to at Easter as we come together to mark the drama of Christ's Crucifixion on Good Friday and Glorious Resurrection on Easter Day.

#### Joy to the world, the Lord is come

February brings....at any rate as far as King's Lynn is concerned,... the Mart, an ancient fair going back to a Charter granted by Henry VIII in 1537. It opens on Valentine Day with a ceremony performed by the mayor, preceded by a blessing of the show people for whom this marks the beginning of the travelling season. In the 19th century it was notable because Frederick Savage, the inventor who came from Lynn, displayed his roundabouts and other attractions for the first time. I used to come to the Mart as a boy. Everything was much gentler in those days; remember the cakewalks and swings? There used to be lots of side shows, from flea circus to boxing booth. Nowadays the rides have to be faster and scarier every year. Then there were those marvellous fairground organs, now replaced by recorded music at such a decibel level that we can hear it from where I live two miles away.

I remember one year the showpeople chose 'Joy' as their trade mark. When they arrived the front of the opening wagon displayed the caption "Joy has come to town." When they left a week or so later the last truck announced "Joy will be back again next year." Fortunately we need not wait so long as that!

The gospel message begins with glad tidings of great joy. I have seen that joy in people whose lives have been changed by this good news. Charles had a funny habit; he would never be the first to let go when shaking hands. I tried him out lots of times but never succeeded, "I lost all my old friends when I stopped going to the pub" he said, pumping my arm up and down, then with joy written all over his face "but 1've found a lot of new ones" he declared when I released him to go shaking hands all round the congregation.

The joy that Jesus gives doesn't depend on things going well. When I was a hospital chaplain some years ago a cataract operation, which now takes less than ten minutes, involved keeping the patient perfectly still with eyes bandaged for twelve days. I visited David during this anxious period. Sadly when they removed the bandages he was completely blind. The following Sunday I was surprised to see him being led into church. "They can't put out the light within" he said.

We live in anxious and fearful days but we can sing:

Joy to the world, the Lord is come Let earth receive her King Let every heart prepare him room And heaven and nature sing.
