Dear Friends.

Every seven years after the first ten years in ministry the Methodist Church gives its ministers the opportunity for a sabbatical, which we are expected to take. The idea is to have a bit of a break from the regular work of ministry, but also to focus on something which might enrich one's ministry.

I am due for a sabbatical this year which I will be taking from the beginning of August until the end of October. I have decided to focus on two things. Firstly I will be endeavouring to translate into modern English four of the homilies of John Chrysostom on St Matthew's Gospel. They are in Greek. I have always found it fascinating to read Christian texts from the early centuries. Of course we look to the Bible as our foundation text, but is it not wonderful that we have other texts also from generations ago which testify to how Christians were faithful in their time? John Chrysostom, 4th century, actually preached on umpteen books of the Bible. A large collection of his work has come down to us. His sermons tell us not just about his own faith but also about life in the Christian world of his time. I am working with others from different parts of the world on the translation and we are hoping that eventually the translations of all ninety homilies will be published.

I will also be doing a little genealogical research into some of the mysteries and missing links in my father's family line. It is amazing what can be discovered these days through online genealogy records and also through DNA tests - where it is possible to have a relatively inexpensive test through which one can then see "matches" in an online database. I have already started on this and there can be some remarkable coincidences. The most remarkable one so far was that a "match" (a woman living in Australia) for my father, possibly going back five or six generations, is descended from a family of Moles where one, a Richard Richardson Mole (1795-1840), was a Wesleyan Methodist Minister. Two of his sons were also Wesleyan Methodist Ministers. We have found conclusive evidence that these Moles originated from nearby in the Fens, at Outwell and Walsoken. What a coincidence! The Australian lady had no idea of where Richard Richardson Mole was brought up, so her knowledge of her family background has developed hugely. I can't be certain whether the "match" with my father comes through the Moles (there are so many possible family lines once you go back a few generations), but what a strange possibility that just maybe some eager Methodists in the early 1900s were linked with my ancestors. No doubt there will be more surprises.

So hopefully I will be enriched through exploring our Christian roots from the early centuries and also my own family roots.

North Lynn

There was life!

So ended the words from North Lynn in the June 'Rejoice' But what of the remainder of the story of the Mustard and Cress that grew in our Easter Garden?

Well the seedlings grew and grew and grew. The whole table on which the garden stood was a swathe of green heading skywards. We turned the garden regularly so the growth was even. At that point we wondered about harvesting the crop and offering it to go in egg sandwiches, but refrained.

So a living illustration of new life appearing from desolation. A true example of the Christian message. We tended the garden and sustained it until Whitsun. But would it last until Pentecost? Well indeed it just did! Looking in need of the Holy Spirit to lift the bending stalks we were reminded that it wasn't the plants that needed a revival - it was us. The messages of Easter, Whitsun and Pentecost come afresh to us each year and enable spiritual growth to be carried into our church life. As a visual reminder we were given a 'Prayer Candle' as part of the world wide Anglican 'Thy Kingdom Come' initiative, encouraging prayers for church growth between Ascension and Pentecost and we lit ours on many occasions during that time. And did that happen? Well through prayer, praise and participation in the community, our regular activities have continued to prosper. In addition we now have a working party coming regularly on a Friday to tidy the patio and garden area at the back of church. Hopefully we can then have a few outdoor events during the summer. (Possibly to rival the wonderful 'Celebrate' in the Walks)!

We have met to consider the next stage of our redevelopment and are to meet two prospective architects in the near future to brief them as to our vision and then see who can offer (and at what price) the concept we favour most.

Rev. Becca advised us of the next steps towards building of the new vicarage next to our church – she still has a hope to be moved in by Christmas! Two giant trenches were dug near the proposed foundations to see what was under the surface. Just as well they were dug! One site revealed a 415volt electric cable (not a good place for foundations) the other revealed fascinating archaeological history. At about 2 metres down they found sand and at 3 metres peat, evidence

that this area was both on the seashore and earlier covered in marshy forest. Indeed a sample of a tree branch was thought to be 100,000 years old. The foundations will be laid accordingly.

Finally we held our annual meeting at the beginning of June. We reviewed the work done and talked of the work still to do – prayer groups, faith explanation groups, extending hospitality into the community.

Sadly however there was another task to do. Heather and I are to retire (properly) to Lincoln in the near future. We were wished every happiness and thanked for our work in North Lynn. As is 'normal' we ended with a delicious lunch and were joined by St. John's, the Minster and 'Filling Station' congregations – thanks to all who provided and set up the hall so beautifully.

So in the spirit of post Easter renewal, and the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, North Lynn looks outwards to the community as we offer a blend of sacred, social and learning opportunities.

St Faith's Gaywood

The first sermon preached by St Faith's new Team Vicar, the Rev. Karlene Kerr, was on Sunday, June 4 - Pentecost.

She began her sermon by telling the congregation that she was half hoping a "gust of wind" would have carried her from her home in Jermyn Road to the church but admitted that, no, what had happened on that first Pentecost thousands of years ago, was a "once and for all time" event.

"Today we celebrate the birthday of the church - so Happy Birthday one and all," she said.

We were told by the Rev. Kerr that Luke, the writer of Acts, marks the arrival of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost as a key event in "Salvation" history.

Pentecost, which means 50 - was so named because 50 days after the Passover, the law was given to Moses at Mount Sinai. It was also when people celebrated the first crops of the Promised Land. Jews came together at Pentecost to celebrate both the harvest and receiving God's law. As Christians, we, of course, celebrate Pentecost 50 days after Easter.

We were told by the Rev. Kerr that the 12 Apostles, other Disciples and Jesus' family were all together in one place when suddenly God makes his appearance in "sound and light".

"The sound is from heaven and is like the blowing of a violent wind which fills the whole house." she said.

The divided tongues that appeared seemed to be flames of fire, which rests on each person.

"This outward sign gives them an inner experience - they were filled with the Holy Spirit, which leads to an external expression of God's presence".

The Spirit inspires their speech and they all began to speak in different human languages other than their own native tongues".

Here is a further sign that something extraordinary has happened.

The ultimate cause of what they were experiencing is found in God, as the prophet Joel had foretold.

"God promised in the last days - to pour out his Spirit on all people" we were told..

Joel had used the imagery of a torrential downpour on parched earth to represent the coming of the Spirit.

The Rev. Karlene says it is a wonderful picture of God's generosity, it suggests abundance - God's Spirit raining down on a parched earth is saying that God is literally pouring himself out liberally - not in "bits and drabs".

John, the Gospel writer says that Jesus gives the Disciples their mission: "As the Father sent me, so I am sending you".

The Disciples are given the authority to bring people back to God, to reconcile those who have become separated from God.

This is ultimately the mission of today's Church - to work with God in building up His Kingdom.

We were told that the coming of the Spirit at Pentecost enables and equips us to do just that.

At any age we should expect to find a church filled with the Holy Spirit, enabling us to bear witness to Christ and his Gospel

The Rev Kerr said: "The coming of the Spirit, in such a spectacular way, may have been a once for all event, but God's spirit is constantly at work for each of us today"."

"We just need to be open to the reality of his presence in ways we may not be expecting", she told us.

In conclusion, the Rev Kerr said: "We need to pray continually for the Spirit to lead us and guide us, we need to listen to the Spirit and we need to be ready to boldly seize the moment".

We look forward to listening to many more sermons from the Rev. Kerr and to getting to know her much better over the coming months. We wish her every success and happiness in her new ministry among us at St Faith's.

Thanks to be God.

I am pleased to say that at the first meeting of the Church Council Trustees' New Year, I was elected to serve as a deputy warden serving alongside my friend and fellow deputy warden, Gill Hiles.

Over the past few years the St Faith's Coffee morning, held on the first Saturday of each month in Gaywood Church Rooms, has proved very popular. Church members and people from the wider community would drop in, enjoy a coffee (or tea) and a piece of cake or a scone and sit for a while and chat with their friends. *All proceeds go towards then on-going running costs of St Faith's Church.*

10am until 12 noon. Refillable coffees and tea will be available for 50p and cakes will be £1 each.

For the first time ,local traders have been invited to become involved and set up their stalls and two of these will include Bowers the Butchers, of Gaywood, and Smith's the Bakers, of Lynn.

Entry is free to the event and the Outreach committee hopes that lots of people from within the church, as well as from the wider Gaywood community, will come along and support the new look event.

The August 5th Coffee Morning also marks the start of the Norwich Diocese annual Open Churches Week. During the next week (from August 6th) the church will be open for people to call in for private prayer or just to enjoy the peace and quiet of the beautiful church building.

- Anyone working in activities targeted at adults who are vulnerable

- Worship Leaders



THREE SCORE YEARS AND TEN

With all the excitement of my 100th birthday last year another very important occasion got overlooked, the 70th anniversary of my ordination on 18th July 1946 at Wesley's Chapel, City Road, London. I am so pleased that the preacher was the Rev. Dr WJ Noble who seven years before had first suggested that I should be a Methodist minister. Ordination is very important to us in the Methodist Church, but since the services are only held once a year and in connection with the Conference in one of our major cities, many good Methodists never have the opportunity of attending one, so perhaps I may explain what happens.

During the afternoon, at the Conference itself, the ordinands are "received into full connexion" i.e. formally recognised as Methodist ministers by a standing vote resolving that they be ordained by prayer and the imposition of hands. The ordination service is conducted by the President, or an ex-President, who solemnly reminds them of their high calling: (I quote from the modern service) "You are called to the ordained ministry within the ministry of the whole Church. It will be your task as ambassadors on behalf of Christ to preach the gospel by word and deed, to declare God's forgiveness to penitent sinners, to baptize, to confirm, to preside at the celebration of the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood, to lead God's people in worship and prayer, to care for them in sickness and health, to teach them and equip them for their service. You must set the Good Shepherd before you as your pattern."

Ordination vows are made relating to the Scriptures, the doctrine and discipline of the Church, faithfulness in prayer and study. Each one chooses a minister friend to stand alongside him (or her). They go forward in groups of five. The President and others taking part, as well as the assisting ministers, all place their hand on the head of each one, with the prayer "Father, send the Holy Spirit upon (name) for the office and work of a minister in the Church of Christ." An Ordination Bible is then given to each one with the words "I declare that you have authority to preach the word of God and to administer the holy sacraments as a Minister in the Church of God . Be shepherds to the flock of Christ. Hold up the weak; bind up the broken; bring again the outcasts; seek the lost. So be merciful

that you are not remiss; so minister discipline that you forget not mercy" A tall order!

Normally before this the ordinands will have had three years in theological college and two in Circuit but I had spent all those years of probation as a wartime soldier in the British army with no access to books or opportunity for study. I suppose I learnt quite a lot in the university of life, how to get on with all sorts of people, see the best in everyone, four and a half years in the Middle East and Italy. Being chief clerk of my unit was not a bad preparation for becoming a synod secretary and living under discipline is something I have never got out of my system. But I blush to recall my greenness when, a few weeks later, we put just seventeen boxes, a pram, a sewing machine and a bicycle (the one I rode up my 90s) on the back of an open truck — no removal van in those days — and drove in a borrowed car to our first manse.

So to my first Sunday in Circuit. I forgot the Lord's Prayer. I missed out a lesson and two of the hymns. At the close of the service the steward came forward and said "We usually have a collection, Sir" I took as my text "I can do all things through him that strengtheneth me." Those good folk soon found that there were lots of things their young minister couldn't do but they were very kind, as people have been to me for all of the seventy years.
