We all know that churches needs to be safe places. Many of us have attended a **Creating Safer Space** training session in the past. Things have moved on since that training module was introduced. There is a fresh understanding of some of the areas of abuse and the needs of survivors. The Methodist Church has decided that those people who were trained previously now need to attend a **Foundation Module Refresher** to ensure that they are up to date.

There are many people who need to attend. They include:

- Pastoral visitors
- Anyone working with 0 18 year olds in the name of the church
- Anyone working in activities targeted at adults who are vulnerable
- Church stewards
- Local preachers
- Worship Leaders
- Presbyters and Deacons

The sessions will be held on several occasions and in different places across the Circuit. Please note these sessions are for people who have already attended the original Foundation Training. If you are in one of the above posts and have not already attended the Foundation Training, a different session will be arranged for you. There will be more information about this later.

A Brand Plucked from the Burning

In view of the news of a disastrous care home fire, I was very reassured when at King's Lynn Residential Home they had a regular fire alarm drill. Patients were advised beforehand that it was not the real thing. When the alarm sounded, all the doors closed automatically; the staff rushed to assemble in the dining hall and it was made sure they knew exactly what to do.

There was a very famous fire in Methodist history. On 9th February 1709 the Rectory in Epworth, Lincolnshire, caught fire. It was probably caused deliberately by parishioners who had a grudge against their rector, Samuel Wesley. It was started in the corn barn and quickly spread along the rectory's thatched roof. There was just enough time for Samuel to gather together his family and lead them to safety outside.

Then it was realised that 7 year old Jack Wesley was missing. He had evidently been fast asleep in the nursery when the others escaped. His father attempted twice to rescue him but was beaten back by the flames. Thinking that Jack was dead, he knelt down outside in prayer for his soul.

Just then, a pale white face appeared at an upper window. The child had woken up but the stairs were already on fire and about to collapse and flames were licking across his bedroom ceiling. He had the presence of mind to rush to the window. A famous painting by Henry Perlee Parker in 1840 shows neighbours reaching up to pluck little Jack from his bedroom window to safety.

Samuel's wife Susanna paid special attention to the education of her children according to the latest ideas. Each had a special day of the week when she would give them one to one attention. After little Jack's miraculous rescue, she was convinced that he had been saved for some special purpose. She called him "a brand plucked from the burning" (quoting Zechariah 3:2 in the Old Testament) and paid special attention to his education.

When we think of all that John Wesley achieved, we can see that Susanna was right. Methodism today has 80 million followers in the world. His

brother Charles Wesley takes up this theme in the Wesleys' Conversion Hymn in May 1738:

Where shall my wondering soul begin? How shall I all to heaven aspire? A slave redeemed from death and sin, A brand plucked from eternal fire, How shall I equal triumphs raise, Or sing my great redeemer's praise?

One of Karlene's area's of responsibility in her new role will be covering the large Fairstead and King's Reach housing estates. The proposal is that Karlene will eventually re-locate from her current clergy home in Jermyn Road to live on either Fairstead or King's Reach. It will be the first time in almost 30 years that St Faith's clergy will be actually living there.

Karlene has an adult daughter and originally comes from Jamaica but has lived in London for most of her life, coming to this country aged 12.

She has a varied career background working for the health service, in sales, finance and including a period as a building society manager.

She said she believes her extensive and rich experience in working with and relating to people in all manner of situations has prepared her for her new role at Gaywood to which she is looking forward so much.

Moving in with her are her two elderly cats.

In her leisure times she says she is a huge film fan and enjoys watching quality dramas on TV. She enjoys reading, writing, dancing, music, walking and eating anything sweet!!!

June at St Faith's is always Summer Fete time and the fund-raising team, under the direction of Ann Ess, has been working hard to ensure that the event is another success.

The Fete will be on June 17^{th} from 2pm to 4pm in the Gaywood Church Rooms. All the usual variety of stalls and sideshows will be set up including one or two new ones. If the weather allows there will be games for children staged in the nearby garden in front of the church. Admission is free and everyone is welcome.

Seventy years of singing God's praises in St Faith's Church.....now that is a remarkable achievement worth celebrating.

We certainly did just that with our own wonderfully uplifting "Songs of Praise" service in honour of Olwyn Barber's seven decades as a member of our choir. I first came to know Olwyn when i joined the choir in April 1963, as an eight-year-old schoolboy.

It is my view, for a number of reasons, that we are unlikely to see the like of such long service again. It was a real one-off celebration, which we not only marked within our own church community in Gaywood, but with the entire British nation through the service being filmed for the popular BBC Songs of Praise programme and screened into the nation's rooms at teatime on Sunday 14th May.

I have always felt that one of the things about our celebration of Olwyn's amazing service to her God and his church at St Faith's, was not only that it has spanned 70 years, but also that Olwyn has been an almost 100 per cent presence in the choir stalls every Sunday come rain or shine. In her earlier days, Olwyn tells me, she would attend three services on Sundays. She has been such an enthusiastic and regular attender that you could almost set your watch by her.

There is also an affectionate joke among some of our church members that Olwyn has been such a major part of the fixtures and fittings in St Faith's over seven decades that we would need to apply for an official Faculty if we ever wanted to remove her!!

As many people have commented, we at St Faith's have been richly blessed to have someone like Olwyn in our choir, someone who has shown such faithfulness and dedication since joining the choir as a girl of 12 together with her friend, the late Pearl Grummett.

Of course, as a result of the publicity surrounding Olwyn's fascinating story many, many more people, including from outside church circles, are aware of her amazing record.

When our Rector, the Rev. Julie Boyd, welcomed those in the congregation at the start of Olwyn's special anniversary service on Sunday 30th April, she told them that it was a day of celebration for Olwyn......"a day to give thanks for the gift of music and voice".

As Rev. Julie said "you cannot be in a parish choir for 70 years without building knowledge of music and hymnody" and Olwyn chose some of her favourite hymns for her service.

The choir was directed by choir master, Roger Darbishire and the organist was Jonathan Chaddock. The bells were rung before the service by St Faith's ringers under the direction of tower captain Iaon Russell.

Olwyn's first hymn choice was Christ is Made the Sure Foundation, in its fifth verse the hymns speaks of the unity in which we live at St Faith's, the unity of Anglicans and Methodists together. something very important to Olwyn.

The second choice, Loving Shepherd of thy Sheep, reminded Olwyn of her time attending Sunday school.

The first anthem sung by the choir, Day by Day, reflects our aim to grow daily closer to God, "to see him more clearly, love him more dearly and follow him more nearly".

The second anthem was Ave Verum Corpus meaning "Hail, true body". It is a Eucharistic hymn that has been set to music by various composers and dates from the 14^{th} century.

The next hymn chosen by Olwyn was Hark my Soul it is the Lord. This hymn, Olwyn sees as a conversation. In the first five verses God speaks to us and assures us of his love for us. In verse six, we make our response, professing our love for God. The love of God and how we look to him to help us through our daily lives is reflected in the words of the hymn, Glorious things of Thee are spoken.

The final hymn, Olwyn's favourite, was the rousing Thine be the Glory, which says what we believe in, the hope that God holds out to us. It is a hymn of Resurrection hope.

At the end of her sermon Rev. Julie told the congregation that what she sees in Olwyn is someone who "inwardly faces the sunshine and knows the joy of new beginnings."

The joy of the Easter season is the joy of resurrection hope, when we turn to face the sunrise and give thanks.

"So today, let us do that, let us sing our songs of praise with thankful hearts" Among the presentations made to Olwyn during the service was a wonderful letter of warm congratulations and tribute from the Bishop of Lynn, the Rt Rev. Jonathan Meyrick, which Rev Julie read to the congregation. There was also a certificate from the Royal School of Church Music recognising Olwyn's long service. Later Olwyn cut a special anniversary cake made for her by fellow Choir member, Sue Benstead.

The Rev. Julie said: "Olwyn, today we celebrate with you 70 years of choir membership. It is so very important to use the gifts that we are given in the service and in the worship of God. This is something that you continue to do and I am sure find great pleasure in as well".

May God continue to bless Olwyn and long may she continue to be a very real vocal presence in the choir stalls of St Faith's Church.
