Dear Friends,

As I write this towards the end of the second week in September I have just returned from a couple of days at the University of Birmingham for a conference for people interested in knowing more about the first five centuries of the life of the church.

You might think that a trip to the university campus could be a little bit interesting – Birmingham campus has a fascinating mixture of older and very modern buildings – but that the subject matter does not sound that exciting!

Well, there are lots of interesting things to learn from those early centuries and every now and then there are some remarkable surprises. From time to time a book turns up (or rather a manuscript, papyrus, codex or whatever) which was thought to be lost. You might have heard about such lost works turning up in the sands of the Egyptian desert. From time to time they turn up unexpectedly in other places - and every now and then they are found in something that we have known about for a long time but not recognised.

Well it seems that a "lost work" has been found in Cologne Cathedral. I think I have written about Cologne before and its claim to have the "relics" of the Three Kings. I have taken a greater interest in Cologne since our older son married a German girl whose family live not far from the city. I was very interested, then, to discover that a "lost" work has been discovered among some of the old books it possesses - this particular book dating, I believe, from the ninth century. I don't know the full story but every now and then an old book is found to contain a text which actually dates from several centuries earlier. So it has now been discovered and confirmed (in so far as such things can ever be definitively confirmed) that the manuscript contains a lost commentary on the gospels written in Latin by Fortunatianus, bishop of Aquileia in Italy during the mid-fourth century. It is apparently the oldest commentary on the gospels we have written in the Latin West which is still extant. So it is a rather special, precious and exciting document. I understand that an English translation will be freely available online when the Latin text is published next year, so we will all be able to read it. Very interesting it sounds too from the snippets we heard at the Conference.

I reflected that the cathedral in Cologne must have had this manuscript quite a long time, but not realised what it was they actually had in their possession – an unrecognised and unacknowledged treasure. It is pretty unlikely that we will find such an ancient and precious document in our basements or lofts, but I did also reflect that sometimes we too can fail to recognise the precious things we have among us – special things or people which or who have much to offer, but can be ignored or overlooked.

I was reminded that Jesus spoke of the importance of having eyes that see and ears that hear. It is all too easy to miss things around us that may be obvious. So let us always be ready to notice, to acknowledge and to celebrate the precious things and the precious people we have around us to bless us each day.

ARE YOU BEING SERVED?

Some of you may remember Jermyn's Department Store, now Debenhams, which was run on very similar lines to the store in the television series, complete with shop-walker in morning dress enquiring "Are you being served" and conducting you to the right counter. Here the obliging assistant would take down article after article to show you. They would then screw the money and bill into a small container and it would be whisked on a series of overhead wires to the cashier and be returned with your receipt and change. Or am I going back a bit?

Sir Alfred Jermyn was a remarkable man. Born at Wymondham and brought up on a farm, at fifteen years of age he was apprenticed to Robert Sayle of Cambridge under whose influence he became associated with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

After a time he left Cambridge for a London house of business and attached himself to Hinde Street and its Young Men's Mutual Improvement Society. He then entered business in Bedford. Unfortunately owing to Mrs Jermyn's health he was compelled to give up a prosperous business and came to Lynn. He believed this move was providential guidance. His own words are worth quoting as he describes how our District came into being:

"I well remember the advent of the Rev John Gould to the Norwich and Lynn District as it marked an epoch in its history. Mr Gould almost immediately set about a much needed advance in connection with our Church. He called together a number of us laymen and discussed the necessity of a great forward movement. This met with the support of the late Dr Moulton and very soon an earnest appeal was made to the Cambridge and Ipswich Circuits to sever their connection with London and join our District. I was one of a deputation of three that waited upon the two Quarterly meetings concerned, the result being a hearty cooperation on their part. The District of East Anglia was thus formed"

Coming to King's Lynn he founded his own business in partnership with CW Perry, which went from strength to strength. You could do that in Victorian and Edwardian times if you were motivated by the nonconformist work ethic of hard work and thrift. As a Methodist he was very much associated with the founding of the East Anglian School, Bury St Edmunds, now Culford, and with the beginning of the Hunstanton Circuit,

now amalgamated with us in West Norfolk. In 1897 he became Mayor of King's Lynn and was the first to break away from the old custom of going to the Established Church for the mayoral service. Instead it was held in his own church, the old Tower Street. As a total abstainer he insisted on no intoxicants being served at his official receptions. He founded a charity for the poor, which I believe still carries his name. A special concern of his was the creation of small holdings, whereby large estates were purchased by local authorities for renting to small farmers and he served as honorary secretary of the Norfolk Small Holdings Association.. In 1919 he was knighted "for public and local services."

Jesus said "The Son of man came not to be served but to serve" and this is how he wants it to be with his followers. Archbishop William Temple said "The Church is the only organisation in the world that exists primarily for the benefit of its non-members" We are called to serve. Some Methodist Churches have a Wesley Guild, rather similar to our ACE meetings, but with a fourfold theme pattern, devotional, literary, social and service.

In Hymns and Psalms one of the sections is headed "Witness and Service" It begins with "A charge to keep I have" (785) which goes on:

To serve the present age
My calling to fulfil
O may it all my powers engage
To do my Master's will
"Are you being served?" went

"Are you being served?" went out with the Captain Peacocks of long ago. Perhaps we should ask "Am I serving?"

The season of mists and mellow fruitfulness.....yes the beginning of October sees us at St Faith's joining together to celebrate Harvest Festival.

This year the service will form part of the All-Age service on Sunday, 2nd
October starting at 10.30am (please note the different start time).

With St Faith's Church decorated with Autumn flowers and produce, it promises to be a busy and enjoyable service. As in past years, harvest gifts will be gratefully accepted for the King's Lynn Foodbank. Fresh produce gifts donated will go the Purfleet Trust in Lynn which exists to help the homeless. Retiring collections will go to the international WaterAid charity.

During this special seasonal service, prayers of thanksgiving will be offered for the harvest, not just for food, but of the sea and the world's raw materials.

Following the service at just after 12 noon everyone is invited to attend a Harvest Festival lunch in the Gaywood Church Rooms.

Tickets for the lunch are £5 but free for Primary School children and half-price for secondary school pupils.

St Faith's Rector, the Rev Julie Boyd, has suggested that church members may like to purchase an extra ticket and give it as a gift to someone they know who may find it difficult to spend £5.

As I mentioned in my article in the September edition of Rejoice! magazine, church members attended an AwayDay held on 13th August at Hunstanton Methodist Church.

Everyone really enjoyed the time spent away from our usual environment at Gaywood when there was an opportunity to talk, listen and pray for the life of St Faith's Church and where we see our work and Mission in God's name taking us in the future.

Around 35 members took part and there was a real sense of enthusiasm among people as they put forward their own ideas about our Anglican/Methodist shared life and how it could be taken forward and hopefully embrace a large number of people from the wider community.

There was a real buzz in the lovely church and phases like "dream the dream" and "blue sky thinking" and one of Rev Boyd's favourite words "exciting" were banded about in conversation.

It was great to see people so engaged and energised in their love of God and how this could be reflected in our everyday life and worship in our community. The day, between 10am and 4pm, was spent in prayer, singing God's praises and in discussion. The day was in two parts. Firstly we took time to consider how "healthy" we are as a church community. It was good to be self-reflective and to celebrate all that has brought our two churches together for more than 40 years and the many ways in which we offer service to our God.

The Rev Boyd reminded us that it was also important to be honest about those things we feel we could do better and to consider what it is that holds us back. The second part of the day was spent in small discussion groups as we took on board the opportunities that we have with regard to our church buildings and "dream the dream" about what we could do in the future to best serve God in mission and ministry.

To assist everyone in thinking about how "healthy" we at St Faith's are as a church community, we used the Healthy Churches material from Robert Warren that was devised in the late 1990s.

Warren presents to us that there are seven core values that are common to churches that are considered as being "healthy" and that have experienced growth in numbers of attendees and in faith.

For each of these seven separate marks of a healthy church those at the AwayDay were invited to anonymously write down their responses to the questions. The Rev Boyd has spent time looking through all the responses from the whole day and has produced these in table form so that we can see what were some of the most popular responses and the areas where we need further work.

These will form the basis for further discussions in the coming months. As the Rev Boyd would say: These are indeed "exciting times" for all of us in our shared worship and Mission in Gaywood. Watch this space for further updates about all of this.

We would like to sincerely thank the stewards of Hunstanton Methodist Church and our own Betty Guy for kindly arranging for us to use the church and its excellent facilities.. Everyone thought it was a wonderful, peaceful and comfortable venue

We are now into October and preparation is going ahead at a pace for the third St Faith's Christmas Tree Festival which opens on 1st December.. From the start when we were asked to don our Christmas jumpers, hats or scarves, (yes, we were wished Happy Christmas! and were rather hot at times) we were expertly guided through a wonderful time of uplifting, mass carol and hymn singing and entertainment by guest artists.

It was lovely to see and hear Aled Jones sing as he hosted the Christmas Day programme and amazing to experience the slick, professional way he told us when to clap etc. He had some very good witty asides, and at the same time had to listen to his Producer through an ear piece, before he said link sentences or welcome guests. We had excellent views from the front of the Circle, where we could see the whole of the stage, massed
