'As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease.' **Genesis 8:22, NRSV**

Harvest has never been an individual celebration. Deuteronomy shows us the whole community coming together to celebrate. Slaves took their place alongside landowners. Everyone was invited because everyone had reason to give thanks for the harvest. None of them would go hungry through the coming year.

These days for many people, harvest thanksgiving services are a throw-back to the past; no more it seems are seasons begun and ended by the food cycle; after all there is not much now about our food or indeed our lifestyle that is seasonal. So-called seasonal vegetables and plants are with us all year round.

We no longer get up with the light and go to bed when it gets dark. We can work and play, go shopping and enjoy ourselves more or less any time we want all year round. And some celebrations begin long before it seems appropriate: shops are already beginning to stock Christmas items.

But while we may have lost sight of natural endings and natural beginnings harvest can still be a time for shared celebration. I am perhaps a little old fashioned in my view of nature and the seasons but I believe they need to be celebrated because we must not lose sight of the gifts given to us by God as described in Genesis. There is a danger in our modern society of forgetting how important the changing of the seasons is. I wish we took more time to look at the moon and realise its impact on this earth; or see the sun for its importance to our lives rather than the changing colour of our bodies; or feel the rain on our skin and be thankful for its life giving goodness. God gave us all of this and more, so now is the time to celebrate it and value it. The more we are thankful the more we are likely to understand that we need to care for this world in all its amazing God given wonder.

If we do not get back to truly celebrating the seasons how on earth are we ever going to understand the importance of their changing? I don't know about you but I get a fantastic feeling of anticipation as winter turns to spring, spring to summer, summer to autumn and autumn to winter. You only have to read "The Wind in the Willows" (which is one of my favourite books) to begin to feel what each change means to the land and its inhabitants.

The changing seasons are precious, so may our coming Harvest Festivals reflect this wonderful generosity of God

Thoughts from Conference

There are two sorts of people in the Methodist church. Those for whom the thought of sitting in a Conference hall for a week discussing the business of the church brings joy and excitement, and those for whom, well, it doesn't. I suspect that many of you will fall into the latter camp. But there are at least three of us in the former camp, and this year Hazel Miles and myself attended the Conference at Westminster Central Hall, London at the end of June as district representatives, and Andrew Maguire joined us at the last minute as part of his role of Acting District Chair. For the lay representatives Conference began on Saturday lunchtime. For the presbyters it was Thursday lunchtime, so we clocked up a full 8 days of Conference. It was exhausting, but also a great privilege to be part of the decision making body of our church, and to feel part of the 'bigger picture', meeting and conferring with Methodists from around the Connexion, and the world (some of you will remember Deacon Angleena Keizer from her time in West Norfolk; she was a world church representative from Sri Lanka where she is now serving).

So what did we get up to for all that time? Well, there was a lot of business. One of the big discussions centred on the theology and ecclesiology underpinning the diaconate, and the role of deacons within the church. We talked about the difference between God's worthship and our worship, and whether the two correspond in our churches. Do our churches focus on the worthship of God? The initial report of the marriage and relationships task group was received, and a new statement about marriage and relationships is to be brought to a future conference. A report about homophobia was welcomed by the conference, which states that homophobic attitudes, words and behaviours are inconsistent with the nature of Christian conduct and a violation of the dignity of all people. There was a conversation about how we can improve our safeguarding in the light of the past cases review. The Mission Alongside the Poor Programme (MAPP) has been relaunched as Methodist Action on Poverty and Justice (MAPJ), and there was a report from the Joint Advisory Committee on the Ethics of Investment. 3Generate, the Methodist Youth Conference, presented their manifesto "Wonderfully Made" and challenged the Methodist Church to reflect on what it means to be Wonderfully: Me, Church, World, Prophetic. The Bishop of Liverpool addressed us about the joint Anglican-Methodist covenant. He graciously apologised for any

"bruises the people called Methodist have known because of the Church of England", and suggested the aims of our ecumenical endeavours should be more people knowing Jesus and more justice in the world.

There is so much more to Conference than just business. We worshipped together – at the start and end of every day, in the Wednesday morning Communion service and the Conference service on the Sunday. We were led in a Bible study by Prof Judith Lieu, and the President and Vice-President facilitated a session about the refugee crisis, and our response. The Secretary of the Conference, Gareth Powell, gave an excellent reflection on his first year in office – it can be downloaded here: http://www.methodist.org.uk/conference/conference-2016/london-2016/2016-07-07/0945-am/reflections-from-the-secretary-of-the-conference

It is not long, and well worth a read. And, one of the highlights of the week, we received the Rev. Dr Roger Walton as President, and Ms Rachel Lampard as Vice-President. They led the Conference with great skill, wisdom and humour. St Faith's

In her first sermon as Team Rector of St Faith's Church, Gaywood, on 10th July, the Rev. Julie Boyd, let the congregation into a secret.

She revealed to them one of the questions she was asked when interviewed for the role, namely, why had she applied for the post?

As well as being a response to the advertised post and the detailed information about the Parish contained within the Parish Profile document, Julie told us she applied because of the time she had spent on a month-long placement in Gaywood in November 2014.

Of that time Julie said: "It is true that you (the people of St Faith's) made a significant impression on me".

Julie told the congregation that she spent a lot of her time during those four weeks "observing, watching, listening and asking questions".

"I wanted to know more about your life as an LEP (Local Ecumenical Project), Methodists and Anglicans worshipping and working together. What a great witness that is and I wanted to discover more about the shape of ministry in an urban setting.

Ever since my placement, Gaywood has been on my heart and mind. I didn't realise it at first that I was being called to come closer."

"But there is something about the life of this community that excited me".

To much laughter from the congregation, Julie said: "Did you know or realise that you are exciting?"

She continued: "It wasn't just about St Faith's, it was about your neighbourhood, what an extraordinary place".

Julie said she had experienced people of the different estates within the parish and saw such diversity within the communities that exist in Gaywood.

She said she took in all the information about the many schools (nine), the care homes and sheltered accommodation complexes, the businesses, the library, Gayton Road Health Centre and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

Julie confessed that she gasped at the size of the Parish (quoted as around 22,000 people), aware that there are a good many people living in the parish for whom poverty and hardship is a daily reality.

Julie said she was humbled by the ways in which so many people in the community (while recognising they are not all regular churchgoers) still look upon St Faith's as "their church".

"It is a very important place to them and so it is important to recognise that we have all been given a very special responsibility of stewardship and hospitality in making this House of Prayer open, welcoming and sacred", she said.

She continued: "And so it was your neighbourhood that made me apply for the Team Rector's post.".

"I feel called to be here and care more about who our neighbours are. My hope is that we will all learn together what that means and understand more fully just what it is that God purposes for us to do here together".

She said she felt compassion for the people in these communities as they faced their challenges and longed to be able to celebrate with them in all their joys and hopes for the future.

Julie posed the question: What does it mean to be a neighbour and to have neighbours?

She referred to that morning's reading during which Jesus challenged people to re-evaluate their understanding of their neighbourhood.

The teacher of law we are introduced to asks the question: "Who is my neighbour?

Jesus' response to this question is to tell the parable about the far wider-reaching love and grace of God and of the kingdom neighbourhood that is growing.

As we are aware, the third passer-by in the story, the Samaritan, who stopped, felt compassion and carried the wounded man to an inn to provide him with shelter and care.

Julie went on to say that this parable teaches us that God in Jesus was breaking down the neighbourhood boundaries that had been built using the law. He was not just the God of Israel but also the God of grace for the whole world.

Julie reminded us that a neighbour isn't just the person living down our road, but rather, the person, any person you are meeting with now, sharing a space

with now, the person you have the opportunity to make a difference to now or who might make a difference to you.

Julie ended her first sermon as Rector of St Faith's with these words: "May the God of mercy open our hearts and minds to see more fully the scope of our neighbourhood here in Gaywood and to reach out as Christ's Church, knowing that we are doing so in Him and for Him."

A large group of St Faith's Church members will have attended an Away Day held in Hunstanton Methodist Church on 13th August.

Our new Rector was keen for church members to spend a day together in a different location from their familiar church to look at the future Mission of St Faith's and particularly how best we can make most effective use of its set of buildings....the church itself, the nearby Church Rooms, the Church Bungalow (formerly the home of the Team Vicar the Rev Dale Gingrich) and the current Church Office.

Those taking part will split into smaller groups and discuss their ideas and hopes for the future. I am writing this before the actual event, so cannot give any details of the outcome of their discussions. I hope to do this in my article for October's Rejoice!

St Faith's Harvest Festival this year will be observed on October 2^{nd} when there will be an All Age worship service starting at 10.30am (please note the start time) .

During this special service, there may be a chance once again to sing those old favourite harvest hymns, including We Plough the Fields and Scatter and Come Ye Thankful People Come.

During the service people will be able to offer "harvest gifts" which will be donated to the King's Lynn Food Bank.

Following the service everyone is warmly invited to join in the Harvest lunch in the Church Rooms.

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
