As far back as I can remember *Doctor Who* has always been a part of my life, and I eagerly look forward to each new series. It's always a moment of great sadness and some anxiety when one incarnation of the Doctor comes to an end (there was great drama in our house when it was time for David Tennant to regenerate). And then there are the questions. What will the new Doctor be like? Will I like them? How will things change? Will it still be as good? This year has brought the biggest change yet. Even if you don't watch *Doctor Who* it can't have escaped your notice that this time the Doctor is to be played by a female actor for the first time. Lots of Doctor Who fans were very cross – it was simply a change too far, they thought. And yet, the new series began recently to great acclaim. Yes, there were changes. A new costume, a new sonic screwdriver, new friends (formerly known as "companions" or "assistants" – (another change there). But with this change comes a new excitement. There are new adventures, new worlds to explore and new aliens to encounter. Yes, things are different, but the story of the Doctor continues, and those of us who are loyal viewers remain a part of that story.

Change can be hard, it can raise all kinds of questions and worries, but it can be exciting too. In Methodism we regularly face change through stationing, by which ministers move around the Connexion. It is a process that is fraught with all kinds of questions and worries for ministers and Circuits alike. Ministers are left wondering where they will be sent, and what that place will be like, what the expectations of the churches and people will be, and how they will fit in. Circuits find themselves asking whether they will be successfully matched with someone, what they will be like, and how things will change after they arrive.

This year, as a Circuit, we are seeking a new minister to come to West Norfolk as Superintendent, as Andrew sits down (the Methodist parlance for retiring) next summer, and as I move on. As a Circuit we are exploring new patterns of leadership and ministry from September 2019. So this is an unsettling time for many of us as we wonder what the future has in

store. But it is also a time of great potential and excitement as we seek to discern the ways God is ever calling us on, to *serve the present age, our calling to fulfil.* There are new friends to be made and new adventures to be had as we continue to engage in the work of the Gospel both here and wherever we are sent.

The stationing matching group meets during the week beginning 5<sup>th</sup> November. Please do keep their work in your prayers as they seek to meet the needs of ministers and circuits across the whole Connexion. It's a great responsibility and not an easy task. Please also continue to pray for the life of our Circuit, that we may be open to change, and to embrace the possibilities that God opens us for us. Please, also, pray for me. I am so very sad to be leaving the Circuit and am (as I must practice what I preach) trying to embrace the excitement of change as I go through the stationing process.

We may not have a Time Lord like the Doctor travelling with us, but we do have **the** Lord, the God of all time and space, the beginning and the end of all things. Whatever change may come, we remain a part of the story of God's people, and can trust that God's love for creation is one thing that never changes.

To be channels of blessing, helping others come to you.



The service will be followed by the traditional parade from church to the Gaywood Clock tower war memorial and the

observance of the national two minutes silence in remembrance of all those who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.

The day before, Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> November, there is to be a vigil in church, from 2pm until 8pm, featuring Bible readings, poetry and prose in a reflection on the First World War and thinking and praying about peace, reconciliation and thanksgiving. The vigil is part of the First World War centenary exhibition that has been on show in church for the previous month.

Preparations for the St Faith's Church fourth Christmas Tree Festival are moving into their final detailed stage ready for the opening day on Friday, 7<sup>th</sup> December at 9am.

The Festival, which will continue for four days, will feature around 30 real and artificial Christmas trees that will have all been beautifully and imaginatively decorated by local school pupils, church groups and charity groups.

The church takes on a magical winter-wonderland atmosphere when all the trees are illuminated, particularly in the late afternoon as the natural light begins to fade..

As well as the trees on show, there will be two concerts. The first on the Friday evening will take the form of a Christmas variety concert arranged by local impresario and good friend of St Faith's Church, Stephen Hayter. The performance will include songs and sketches by local talented actors, singers and dancers.

The following evening, Saturday, 8th December, will see the Big Heart and Soul Community Choir perform in concert. Refreshments will be served at the interval and there will be a raffle.

#### Dersingham

We have just celebrated our Harvest Festival with some rousing hymns including "Bringing in the sheaves" and "Jesus wants me for a sunbeam", a splendid roast lunch and fruit pies, and a wealth of contributions for the King's Lynn Food Bank. The Harvest Coffee morning the previous weekend raised £260.05 which will be shared between the Farming Community Network and church funds.

A record 54 people attended the Chicken Foot evening, including children who thoroughly enjoyed the fun (and practicing their mental arithmetic without probably realising it!). £248 was raised which will be shared between the Hunstanton Stroke Association and church funds.

The workmen from C. D. Allflatt have been busy in the corridor and vestry and they managed to reinstate the majority of the corridor floor in time for the

coffee morning and monthly community lunch so disruption to our activities has been kept to a minimum. The floor boards of the former church room. which were over 100 years old, had finally succumbed to dampness and begun to rot. Before a replacement floor could be laid the pieces of floor board beneath the blockwork partition walls forming the corridor and other rooms had to be removed in stages and the gaps filled with a special cement mortar. This has been installed above a new damp proof course and the new flooring in the corridor and vestry has been laid over a thin insulation board and a double damp proof membrane to prevent any further dampness problems. Since starting work further rot in the timber supporting the partition walls at either side of the gents' toilets has been discovered which will also need repairing and a bracing system at the top of the corridor walls will also be installed to try to prevent any further movement of this area. The nature of the work means that it will be some time before it is all completed. although we are taking the opportunity it presents to carry out some additional improvements. We are grateful to all church users and hirers of our hall for their understanding and co-operation while work is taking place.

With our hard earned takings we have been able to pay for the social centre kitchen floor to be relaid at a cost of over £2,000, thus fending off the risk of Health and Safety closing the kitchen down. We have also covered the cost of the new pew cushions, which make the pews more comfortable and warm in the cold weather. As our buildings and furnishings are now fifty years old we must expect more expense to keep the fabric in good condition and our fund raising is more vital but what fellowship we enjoy when we all work together.


#### THE ARMISTICE OF 11 NOVEMBER 1918

At the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918 the guns on the Western front grew silent. On 29th September the German Supreme Army command informed Kaiser Wilhelm II and the Imperial Chancellor that the military position facing Germany was hopeless and demanded that a request be made for an immediate ceasefire. When terms were agreed leaders of the two sides met to sign an armistice in the forest of Compiegne in a railway carriage which was part of Marshall Foch's train. The terms included an immediate cessation of hostilities on land, sea and air, the surrender of warships, aircraft and military material. the release of Allied prisoners of war and interned civilians, but there was to be no release of German prisoners. A few years later I saw parties of them working on land reclamation on the marshes near my home. I was two years old at the time so it was another two or three years before I understood the meaning of the annual commemoration of Armistice Day. In days before radio, let alone television, this was announced by the sounding of our local sawmill's buzzer, when everything would come to a complete standstill for the two minutes silence. For the first minute we were to think of the millions of people who had made the supreme sacrifice or the wounded. My father was a baker and I often went with him into customers' homes on his rounds and saw on the wall a sepia portrait of a mere boy in army uniform who would never come home. The second minute was for those left behind on the home front, generally understood to be wives, children and families who had been deeply affected by the conflict, facing bereavement, hardships, shortages and anxieties. My family's chief worry was for my Uncle Hugh. He was a happy-go-lucky sort who gave a false age so that he could join Kitchener's army. He became a machine gunner and so was in an exposed position. Three times wounded and gassed he was given an honourable discharge from active service in May 1918 on medical grounds. However he was still under military discipline and was sent to work in his regiment's headquarters in Northumberland. Typical of him, to celebrate the Armistice he jumped on a train without a ticket. Having to change at Peterborough he got out of the train on the wrong side. At his home station of Sutton Bridge the station master spotted him but Hugh just cried out "My Dad will pay!" I'm sure he would have done, for like everyone else he was delighted with this day's news. My grandfather kept a row of four shops; he called all his assistants together and gave them a holiday.

The Armistice marked a victory for the Allies and complete defeat for the Germans but it was not actually surrender; the Armistice had to be renewed three times before the Treaty of Versailles in 1920



We were bound for Norwich Cathedral (via the golden arches of a handy fast-food outlet!) We were off to spend the whole night in the cathedral, seeing it as I had never seen it before, its nave and presbytery lit with gorgeous changing colours, its spire and cloister arches flood-lit.

The night was punctuated by times of group worship, sometimes with very loud praise music, sometimes much quieter and more meditative (compline with singing and hand-held candles at 1.30am!) There was a late night Ceilidh session and 5am wake up Zumba exercises. Inside the west door was a Matterhorn style climbing-wall tower and around the east end of the cathedral, a range of activities, art, prayer and games. Our young people gravitated towards the cloisters, where at times there were giant inflatables and 2-a-side football (in a cage), and at others just a great space to play hide-and-seek and tag ('manhunt'), beneath the beautiful spire. It was a warm night and some of our group decided to 'kip' outside when we got to the 'quiet' part of the night. As I curled up against a cloister pillar I couldn't help smilling at a point made some hours earlier by the dean, who, with her dog had taken a group of us on a cathedral tour- the cloisters, the 2nd largest in England, have very good acoustics. She had got us singing but the sounds of voices and giant jenga being played on a stone floor at 3.30am also seemed magnified!

Originally I had had big doubts about an all-night event. I had missed the last one, two years ago, but been told it was very good. Having experienced it, I certainly agree. Congratulations to the diocese's Children's and Young People's team and thanks to the local Methodist Circuit who funded our minibus. Much credit is due to our young people who were a pleasure to take, good-tempered even when tired, and particularly good at looking out for and looking after each other, including two who were completely new to the group.

I hope some sense of wonder and of God's loving kindness will stay with them all.
