

As I write, anxiety about Coronovirus is growing and, by the time you read it, the situation will have moved on. We will be dealing with a new reality and that includes

within the church.

I have been challenged by a question: if we are unable to meet, are we able to continue being church? How do we fulfil Our Calling?

Like many other organisations, we might choose to wait until we are able to meet together again and see the time apart as an extended holiday. The hiatus would not be a wasted time, and we would continue to follow our individual faith journeys away from the meeting points we have, but we would have ground to recover, when we joined together again.

My brother and sister-in-law find themselves doing this, in Greece, as the school they teach in has been closed. My brother pointed out, this simply meant they would have to work for two weeks longer, when they go back!

Perhaps, in times of crisis, we look to those in leadership to keep the church alive. Pope Francis has suggested that priests should not be afraid to visit those who are ill - and whilst, on the one hand, this is a conviction of faith; on the other hand, it is possibly ill advised in the middle of a time of quarantine.

New technologies and social media can keep us connected - if we have become familiar and comfortable with them. They do, perhaps, offer suggestions for ways of worshipping over the internet and ensuring that pastoral care continues. They allow us

to remain in contact with each other - but we have a long way to go before that becomes a routine part of our church life.

Wherever we are up to by the time you read this, and whatever the short and medium future have in store, the crisis will pass and life will find a new normality.

The question will remain and it will continue to niggle me - drawing me back into Scripture to look for ways of being God's covenant people: who have responded to the gospel of God's love in Christ and strive to live out our discipleship in worship and mission. When we are unable to meet - through frailties or circumstances - we need, more than ever, to know that we belong to God's people. So, I share my 'niggle' and look forward to the conversations it generates.

Joining a 2/3 month queue for surgery I feel I want to carry on as normally as possible without taking any undue risks; patience and prayer is the answer. Meanwhile the year has started to rush past; already we are well into Lent with Easter celebrations very near. The last meeting of Churches Together in Downham finalised plans for the Good Friday Walk of Witness which will start as usual at 9.00 am from St. Edmunds and finish at our Church with refreshments before the 11.00 service. A Christian Aid service is being planned for 17<sup>th</sup> May at Ryston at 6.30 pm and there will be a Christian Aid Quiz at St. Edmunds on  $22^{nd}$  May starting at 7.00 p.m.

On the Lent theme, for some years now the emphasis has been on doing something positive rather than just trying to give up something and this certainly seems more effective in spreading the message of loving our neighbours as ourselves and obeying the command 'feed my sheep'. Recently some of us helped a member's granddaughter to show her care for others by finding paid work for her to raise the funds she needed to go to Cambodia. She has reported back:

Hello, I am Rosie Holden and in July 2019 I went to the beautiful country of Cambodia for four weeks. During this trip I endured many exciting adventures that continue to influence me today.

One of the volunteering opportunities I got to participate in was digging and making a well for a whole village to have cleaner water. I also helped teach children in a Cambodian school to learn English, built a full chicken coop for a poor family and finished building a toilet. Some of the other tasks were so large that further groups had to continue the work that we started. During this trip, we also had the opportunity to take part in some 'once in a life time' experiences. This included touring around Angkor Wat (as well as four magnificent other religious temples), a week of scuba diving where I earned my 'open

water diver' achievement, try new foods, and of course spend lots of dollars at the Cambodian Markets.

I truly believe that this opportunity changed my life because it makes me understand how fortunate and lucky I am to be living my current life. This is a positive experience due to the fact that I feel lucky enough to help people in poorer or developing countries. This is a life changing experience that my school is able to arrange every two years with the students.

I am very grateful for all the support that was offered to me during the time leading up to this trip. So, thank you to all of the people who helped me raise money by giving me jobs and work to do and the people who donated money. I am so thankful to you for making this experience a reality.

Week by week our regular activities continue alongside preparations for special events. Our social centre cooks and volunteer helpers provide an inexpensive hot meal for those who live alone and cannot cook for themselves and anyone else who comes in at the same time keeping an eye on them and looking out for any problems. Our Saturday coffee mornings continue to provide a safe space for folk to gather to enjoy homemade cakes and bargains from the bric a brac stall and our extensive library. One man brings his little dog in every week to buy him something from our varied collection of stuffed toys. I have missed not being able to get there on Saturday mornings and hope before March is out - no I daren't say it - when the weather gets warmer to start up my plant stall outside under the new gazebo, wind permitting. I have some lovely hellebores, both the white Christmas rose and the purple ones which have been in flower for some time now and some pink camellias which need good for ever homes, as they say when referring to rescue pets. I notice along the riverbank that the cowslips are appearing again to join the snowdrops which have been blooming for weeks now; no celandines though. My riverside walks have been somewhat curtailed recently with the high winds we have

been suffering, even the swans seem to spend more time roosting in the fields rather than on the river.

When the time comes to write for the June/July issue we shall be well into the holiday season with hopefully exams over and schools about to break up, if life has returned to whatever we call normal. Sit tight and pray, God bless.

#### St Faith's Gaywood

The installation of Canon Julie, together with four other honorary Canons, took place during a special service of Choral evensong. Canon Julie's new title does not affect her position as Rector of St Faith's Anglican Church which will continue, but she will have a stronger link to the Cathedral and have her own stall there. Her new title involves her becoming something of an ambassador of the fine Cathedral.

All of us at St Faith's Church, some of whom attended the service, offer Canon Julie our warmest congratulations and we will keep her in our prayers as she becomes more familiar with her new role.

This year St Faith's Church has again been arranging a series of Lent lunches. The sixth and final Lunch will be on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> April in Gaywood Church Rooms. If you would like to help in the staging of the Lunches by making/providing soup, serving the soup or washing up afterwards please contract St Faith's Church office on 01552 774916.

The Lunch starts at 12.45pm and consists of home-made soup and bread. It is followed by a short talk. All proceeds from the Lunches go to the Bishop's Lent Appeal. Thanks are expressed to all those who provided the delicious soups or helped before or after in the kitchen.

The latest in the ever-popular Saturday Coffee and More events will be on Saturday, 4<sup>th</sup> April, in the Church Rooms. All are very welcome to come along and enjoy, from 10 am friendship and fun while enjoying a cup of tea or coffee and a slice of cake or a savoury bite. There is a raffle and selection of stalls run by a baker and a butcher and a card-maker. Admission is free for the event that continues for two hours. The following day, Sunday, 5<sup>th</sup> April, will be Palm Sunday with a service at 9.45am and an evening Passiontide service starting at 6.30pm. This is a lovely, reflective service with special items by the choir.

On Wednesday, 8<sup>th</sup> April, starting at 10 am, will be the Stations of the Cross service with readings and hymns as those present move around the church. The service will be followed at 10.45am by the usual Wednesday service of Holy Communion.

Maundy Thursday sees the Chrism Eucharist service at Norwich Cathedral when all of Norfolk's clergy are invited to attend and renew their ordination vows. This offers Norfolk church-goers the rare opportunity of seeing most of the county's robed clergy process through Norwich Cathedral. It starts at 11am. In previous years some members of St Faith's Church have travelled to Norwich for this service and lifts can usually be arranged.

Back at Gaywood, in the evening starting at 7.30pm, is the Foot Washing and Stripping of the Altar service which again offers a time of reflection on Christ's passion.

Members of St Faith's Church have an opportunity to display their Faith in public in the annual Good Friday Procession of Witness, walking, following a large wooden cross, carried in turns by volunteers, from Gaywood into the town centre. The procession sets off from St Faith's Church at 10am. On its way to the Minster the Gaywood "leg" of the procession stops at Highgate Chapel and St John's Church for a Bible reading and a hymn.

Once outside the Minster, the procession makes its way through the Lynn town centre, stopping at various locations for Bible readings and hymns telling the Easter story.

The procession ends back inside the Minster for a final prayer and blessing followed by everyone sharing in home-made hot-cross buns and coffee.

"Jesus Christ is Risen Today ......Alleluia" the great and glorious celebration of the resurrection from the dead of Jesus Christ starts early at St Faith's Church with the 6am Dawn Holy Communion service which is usually (weather permitting) held outside at the east end of the church. This is a lovely service greeting Easter morning and is often followed by breakfast and fellowship afterwards in the Church Rooms.

The main Easter Sunday service at St Faith's is at 9.45am when there is an opportunity to sing some of those well-loved Easter hymns and hear again the Easter story as told to us in the Bible.

Children are invited to take part in a special Easter Egg Hunt around the church starting at 11am.

There is an evening service starting at 6.30pm.

Tuesday, 21<sup>st</sup> April is an important date in the life of St Faith's Church because, starting at 7pm, in the Gaywood Church Rooms, is the annual congregational meeting. It is at this meeting that the church's year is reviewed and churchwardens and deputy wardens and stewards, are elected and appointed. Church members are being encouraged to attend this meeting. More information about this meeting and nomination papers for the various officer posts are available from the church office.
