Hev You Got a Light?

We're thinking about darkness and light. Human nature is struggling to respond to the calling of God and rise from the darkness in which it finds itself. Darkness is self-seeking, hostile, destructive. 'Darkness is hostile to the light... but however hard the darkness tries, it cannot extinguish it. Sinning man [kind] loves the darkness and hates the light, because the light shows up too many things.' (William Barclay)

Darkness in human nature and behaviour is that which ultimately works towards the destruction of life. It comes in many forms: it could be greed, anger, or insult; it could be drug-taking or physical injury. It could lurk under the cover of ambition, pride or raking up the past.

Perhaps you remember the Singing Postman's immortal line, 'Hev yew got a light, boy?' (1965). The song referred to having a smoke but the question resonates far beyond that. It's a challenge: Is your light shining forth? **Which side are you on? Whose side?**

Do you recall that stirring hymn:

Sing we the King who is coming to reign,
Glory to Jesus, the Lamb that was slain;
Life and salvation his empire shall bring,
Joy to the nations when Jesus is King
All men shall dwell in his marvellous light,
Races long severed his love shall unite,
Justice and truth from his sceptre shall spring,
Wrong shall be ended when Jesus is King.

It's a reminder of God's purpose in sending Christ Jesus: he comes to turn our darkness into light, so that we in turn may be people of light for the world. **Is your life, however humble, a source of light for others?** Or do you keep it hidden? Are others preventing you from shining?

In Matthew 5:14-16 we read: 'You are like light for the whole world. A city on a hill cannot be hidden. No one lights a

lamp and puts it under the bowl; instead it is put on the lampstand, where it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way **your light must shine** before people, so that they will see the good things you do and praise your Father in heaven.' (GNB)

Of course, there may be some particular reason why you aren't able to shine just at the moment. Circumstances may be against you. There may be a mountain in front of you; a whole range surrounding you, even. You may have been afflicted by a health problem or injury; you may have needed an operation. There's the pandemic brooding over the world and darkening the lives of so many, preventing communications, blocking aid convoys... **Take heart!** Mountains can move! Pray about it: "Father, it seems to me that I have a light that could be shining. Perhaps the time isn't right, so give me patience. Nevertheless, I'm not giving up hope. If it's your will, this mountain can move."

It may be the negative attitudes of others: they may consider you aren't the right kind of person, or that your lights aren't what they have firmly in mind. Let God be the one who decides. "Father, you've put this light in my hands, and I have a firm belief that you want it to shine, bringing hope, encouragement and joy to others. I don't condemn those who are stopping me, but if they're getting in the way of your purpose, you can open their minds and change their hearts. May your will be done."

Of course, it could also be the "one bag of silver" syndrome (Mt 25) that's getting in the way. "They're all so much more talented than me... look at the abilities and qualities you gave them! And what have you given me? Nothing! Oh what's the use?"

"Now then!" says God. "Just look at the skill and vitality you have in your hands, the power in your voice! Just you get up from that easy chair and start using what I gave you!"

Update on Climate Matters

Giving Nature a Hand

One day in late September, I opened our front door and found a grass snake on our doorstep. Des had spotted its tail disappearing into the plants beside our drive a few days before but it was still a surprise to find it just outside our door. The snake soon slithered quickly away to find a more peaceful spot to bask in the sun.

Fast forward to November, when I had a parcel delivered from the RSPB and in it was a leaflet entitled, "Nature on your door step", which posed the question, "Did you know that one of the easiest ways to help wildlife is on your doorstep?" Perhaps the grass snake had been reading the leaflet!

The purpose of the leaflet was to tell people that even a small outdoor space, such as a balcony, patio or backyard can help provide food and shelter for wildlife. It pointed out that taken together UK gardens are almost three times bigger than all the RSPB's 200 plus nature reserves combined.



We have quite a large and varied garden but this is a photo taken from our sitting room of a very small paved area which acts as a mini wild life haven. The squirrel has come to drink from the mini pond and it is popular with the birds too. I sowed

some insect attracting seeds beside the paved area and there is some wheat sown by the birds growing too. Two fat ball holders are also "planted" amongst the flowers and attract a wide range of birds, even the shy thrush. There are some pots, which help to maintain a damp area for invertebrates and there is almost invariably a dunnock or two hopping around for food amongst them. Shelter from predators is provided by two bushes, which "sing" with sparrows at this time of year.

Getting back to the leaflet, it goes on to say that helping nature needn't be hard or expensive. It might involve allowing a little patch of to grow, keeping a shallow dish of water topped up with water or making a small wood pile. If you would like to find out about more ideas for helping nature, go to rspb.org.uk/your doorstep.

Soft plastics I was pleased to learn that our local Tesco supermarket now had a facility for collecting all kinds of soft plastics, including cling film and plastic pouches. There was even a whole page advert in the Telegraph announcing this change so I think this must be true of most, if not all Tesco stores and may well be offered by other supermarkets too. Remember that by taking lots of small steps, we can all play a part in restoring the natural balance of God's world.

We look forward to our Christmas Services, first, our Carol service, to be conducted by Rev. Rich, on 5th December at 11am as usual, and on

19th December, I shall be leading, "Morning Service with Christmas Carols". After that, we shall be closed for three weeks over the Christmas and New Year holidays.

Thoughts from Dudley Pickston

A possibly controversial statement first: "God does not demand or require our worship"

He is not like some celebrity performer who thrives on applause and adulation, or otherwise suffers acute depression. God is "the same yesterday, today and for ever" whether we worship him or not.

Jesus (so far as I know) never asked us to worship him-just to follow him – to try to be like him and follow his teaching.

Worship is a bit medieval; some people would worship the King or Queen, usually to obtain favours. God does not grant special favours to those who worship him.

That does not mean we should not worship God. Worship is for our own good, not God's. We need to acknowledge and appreciate what God is and what he has done.

When we are in church, we sometimes sing 'worship songs' – and so we should. However, when we are in church we don't just 'worship'. We give thanks, we ask forgiveness, we reflect on what it means to be a Christian. So we shouldn't just sing 'worship songs', but a range of hymns which make us think.

Perhaps 'worship' or 'service' is the wrong name for what we do in church. ('Service' is what we do in our daily lives.) I don't know what the right name would be. Any ideas?
