And from our Newbies! Hello everyone!

We are the new Kids on the Block, namely FenSong. We are a group of Children and Adults, who are part of the Congregational Church. Our aim is to give kids access to Performing Arts, and we believe profoundly that teaching performance skills helps people socialise, gain a friendship group, and allows

people to feel more confident and increases their ability to improvise and use imagination.

We teach; juggling, British Sign Language, singing, acting, Physical Theatre (This is when someone uses their body to mimic and inanimate object, or through movement, expresses an emotion), puppetry, mime, mask-making etc. We often use Bible stories and over the years have performed "The Daniel Jazz , Joseph's Dreamcoat, "The Passion", "The Alternativity". We have a keyboards section where students learn to play piano using an electronic weighted keyboard and ALL tuition is FREE. FenSong is run by a dedicated group of people, and those teaching have qualifications in Drama, Singing, Music etc. Cate Waters is the Director (and many students will have known her as Cate Markwell, when she was Head of Drama at Downham Market Academy for 25 years)

We meet at the Downham Methodist Church on Wednesdays from 5.30pm - 7pm for Young people aged 5 upwards and then the Seniors meet from 7-9pm.

On Saturday morning, we meet again, all players from 10-12 noon, and keyboards start at 12.30pm for 45 minutes for beginners, but intermediates meet from 1.15-2pm. Again, ALL tuition is free.

Juniors are currently performing "The Pied Piper of Hamelin" and we are still in need of some rats and some children, so all are welcome.



Terry Pratchett fans will be pleased to hear the Seniors are performing "Carpe Jugulum", and we are still a few characters short, so if you fancy being in a comedy, we would LOVE to hear from you.

FenSong has won three regional awards and two National awards,: we tour our productions, usually to 4 different venues, and we have outings together to the theatre or bowling, ice skating, roller blading, laser quest etc, and in the

summer we have a four day camp where the children basically camp and do lots of exciting things like hiking, attending the theatre, have lots of lovely meals together, watch a film etc, and this year we intend to visit the seaside. And remember, if you have a shyer child/ adult, we are always looking for technicians to paint scenery, run the stage show, the lights, the sound or make the costumes/Props. We train people to acquire these skills and putting on a show is always very rewarding.

In one way, it's sad to see this stop, but everything has a season. Some of our regular deaf friends have moved away, and some have stopped coming due to age or illness. Very few live locally and travelling to get to Downham Market for 10am has not been possible. However, when there is a special service, or event, if an interpreter can be arranged, we will let people know and hope to join you.

I would like to thank Rev Jan Smith, the Chaplain among Deaf people for the Ely Diocese, who has supported this interpreted service and arranged interpreters when I went back to Circuit ministry in 2020. Without her help, we would not have made it this far!

## Gaywood St Faith's

Just a week after he played a central role in the Coronation of King Charles III in Westminster Abbey, the Bishop of Norwich was at St Faith's Anglican to officially open its new Community Hub.

Before the actual dedication and blessing of the new facility, the Rt Rev Graham Usher, led a Confirmation service during which he also confirmed three candidates.

The Bishop, together with the Bishop of Hereford, had been personally invited to be Queen Camilla's "assistants" and to simply be alongside the Queen in what Bishop Graham described as that "prayerful and very spiritual moment in the Coronation service".

He chatted with people involved in the re-modelling of the old Church bungalow which was previously used for clergy housing.

Bishop Graham said: "I'm delighted to open this vital community hub that has long been the vision of those at St Faith's, Gaywood. Thanks to their sterling fund-raising efforts and determination, this wonderful facility is now available to all in the local community. I'm particularly struck, during this Mental Health Awareness Week, of the important role that will be fulfilled in these premises by Norfolk and Waveney MIND."

Bishop Graham continued: "This parish church has enabled this to happen-yet another wonderful act of service, following in the footsteps of Jesus, to offer life in all its fullness." The Mayor Leslie Bambridge and her deputy Margaret Wilkinson also attended.

Chair of the Bungalow Project and St Faith's Churchwarden, Susie Cranko-Page said that she and her small team were delighted that the plans had become a reality.

"We wish to thank all those who have supported the Project in numerous ways. It has been a joy to see the project completed and we all look forward to it playing a leading role in Gaywood and the wider community," she said. Mrs Cranko-Page said special thanks go to the various grant-making bodies for their positive interest in the scheme.

As well as several meeting rooms, (that are available for hire) the new remodelled bungalow includes a new Church office, fitted kitchen and utility area and toilets. Rev. Kyla remarked it was such a joy to see The Hub in use. "It is truly a working model of church and community working together."

The volunteer members of St Faith's fund-raising group have been hard at work planning the annual Summer Fair which is being held in Gaywood Church Rooms on Saturday, 17th June starting at 2pm and continuing until 4pm. There will be a colourful assortment of stalls and, as always, at St Faiths fairs, a chance to pick up one or two bargains.

The stalls will include the ever-popular home-made cakes, hard back and paper-back books, toys, puzzles and bric-a-brac. There will also be the main raffle with some good prizes, tombola and other games of chance.

This year there will be burgers and hot-dogs cooked by the Rector's husband, Pete on his mobile kitchen. Refreshments, including delicious cakes and pastries, will be served with tea and coffee. All proceeds from the Summer Fair are for the general upkeep and running costs of St Faith's Church..

There were many opportunities at St Faith's to mark and celebrate the great Festival of Easter with a series of services and events.

One of my personal high-lights was the Easter Day dawn (6am) service which this year was held in the Rectory garden with those attending being warmed by a blazing brazier. The moving Communion service, led by the Rector, was followed by breakfast.

On Good Friday morning a group of people gathered at St Faith's at the start of the silent Procession of Witness. At the head of the group a large wooden cross was carried by a number of volunteers.

From St Faith's, the Procession headed into the town centre with stops along the way at Highgate Chapel, and at St John's Church in The Walks.

For me, personally, I was particularly pleased to take my turn in carrying the cross from St John's Church because I was baptised by Canon Allworthy, in Its font in February 1953. I carried the cross until reaching the Minster. We then joined those gathered outside the Minster and processed through the town centre stopping at a number of locations for a Bible reading and a prayer. We completed the Procession at the Minster for final hymns and then enjoyed hot cross buns and tea and coffee.

The memorial service for the Rev. Heather Berry, who tragically died in early December 2022, soon after arriving by plane in Australia to visit relatives, was held at St Faith's Church on 10<sup>th</sup> March and was led by the Rector Rev. Kyla, , and the team vicar, the Rev Karleen.

During the service, the mourners were told about the Rev. Berry's life and times. The Rev. Berry, who was associated with St Faith's Church for several decades, retired early from her post as Head of Geography at Gaywood's Springwood High School and later became Ordained. As well as serving at St Faith's, the Rev Berry also served in the Weasenham St Peter Group, and at West Winch and Middleton. She was actively involved in many aspects of church life, including Churches Together in King's Lynn. She was involved in

the Open Book ministry (through which volunteers are invited into local schools to present dramatised Bible stories). The Rev. Berry was also well-known for her passionate and enthusiastic work for the Christian Aid charity heading up and developing a West Norfolk support group. Donations given at the funeral raised £750 for Christian Aid. Her funeral had been held in Somerset and she was laid to rest with her parents.

A special service was held on Sunday, May 7th, to mark the Coronation of King Charles and Queen Camilla. Prayers were said for the King's reign over England and the Commonwealth. The church had been decorated with some beautiful floral arrangements on the window ledges and on several pedestals. Church members, Tim and Claire Rees, designed and assembled a large striking purple royal crown which was hung above the Chancel surrounded by the circular Corona, decorated with garden greenery, gold crowns, Union flags and red, white and blue ribbons. The crown drew many admiring comments, f All of us at Faith's Church join in congratulating long-serving choir member Olwyn Barber for being named a finalist in the 2023 Your Local Paper Local Hero Awards. Olwyn, aged 88, had been nominated by deputy warden, Richard Parr, in the Lifetime Achievement category and was one of three people selected as a finalist. A packed audience in the Corn Exchange watched a large screen video of Olwyn talking about her 77 years as a member of the choir. Filmed in St Faith's Church, Olwyn said she had always loved being part of the choir since she joined as a schoolgirl with her friend, the late Pearl Grumnett.

## A report about the East Anglia District Synod (Hopefully more interesting than it sounds!)

The most recent meeting of the East Anglia Representative District Synod took place at Chapelfields Methodist Church in Norwich on Saturday, 22<sup>nd</sup> April. Over a hundred people attended in person with more people joining by Zoom. As a member of a small Methodist congregation, I value the opportunity to be part of a much larger gathering of Methodists and I would like to share some aspects of the day with the readers of *Rejoice*.

At Synod, you get the chance to catch up with old friends and acquaintances and to meet new people. This time, the new district safeguarding officer Mr Neil Holland was introduced. He was there with Jane Gay, who was in the process of handing over to him. She was warmly thanked for all she has done to establish good safeguarding practice in the district.

Graham Thompson, this year's President of the Methodist Conference was present at Synod as part of a visit to the East Anglia District. He led the opening worship and after lunch led a Bible study based on Revelation, Chapter 2, verses 1 to 7 during which he posed the question, "What is the Spirit saying to the church today?" We are all aware of the challenges we face but how can we be faithful to the message of the Gospel in the present day? After Graham Thompson had led us through the context and content of the passage from Revelation and spoke about the challenges facing the church today, we divided into discussion groups. We were asked to identify the strengths and weaknesses of churches and to ask ourselves whether we have experienced a loss of passion like that of the church in Ephesus, to help us respond to the overarching guestion "What is the Spirit saying to the church today?" Earlier in the day, Rev. Robert Roberts and I presented a proposed memorial to the Methodist Conference, which originated from David Elvidge of Hunstanton Methodist Church. The memorial had been passed by West Norfolk Circuit Meeting and now needed approval from District Synod to be forwarded to conference in June 2023. The gist of the memorial was that the term which Presidents of the Conference serve should be extended from one to five years in order to help raise the profile of the Methodist Church in the UK. After Robert and I spoke to propose the memorial, a good discussion ensued but the majority of members of the synod voted against forwarding the memorial to conference. However, I think it did raise an important point about raising the profile of the Methodist Church nationally, regionally, at circuit and at church level. Furthermore the discussion took place in the presence of the current President of the Conference. At the end of the synod, I was just about to walk past Graham Thompson, when I heard him say, "How are you Lesley?" A short conversation ensued, in which he told me it was good to hear me speak and then to my surprise, as it is several years since he had seen us at the annual District Treasurers' meetings, he asked how Des was. I think the day illustrated to me one of the strengths of the Methodist Church, that of Connexion. But it does beg the guestion do we always make best use of that gift? So if this article has sparked interest in the idea of raising the profile of the Methodist Church locally, District Mission Enabler, Dr Yasmin Finch

gave an update on resources available to churches through the Pray 2-3 initiative, including free postcards and up to three lovely posters per church. I recommend looking at East Anglia District Website under Pray 2-3. It can be accessed via www. Methodist church.org.uk where there is a link on the home page to other Methodist websites.

## **The Night Shelter**

The Night Shelter remains open until 30<sup>th</sup> June and has had a busy year. It has been full since reopening for the season in October and has consistently had an extensive waiting list of people in need of help. In addition to the 22 people accommodated to date, by the end of April a further 200 people had been given assistance "at the door" with food, hot drinks, sleeping bags, advice and referrals. The Night Shelter believes that 63 of these had nowhere to go, with the remainder "sofa surfing" or otherwise vulnerably housed.

The Night Shelter is now beginning to plan for the Autumn. This will only be possible with adequate funding. The Night Shelter has had its most difficult financial year to date as we received no Government grant and the Local Authority's contribution has been less than in previous years. We will be launching a fundraising appeal in the local media shortly for October 2023.

The Trustees are full of gratitude and admiration for the work that Julian Hallett has given the Night Shelter over the last 6 years as Treasurer and as Chair. His role as Treasurer has been taken on by Martin Green. The Charity is very keen to appoint a Trustee with links to the Lynn's Eastern European community and would be glad to hear from anyone interested.

## **PENTECOST**

**Pentecost** always comes on a Sunday. Unlike Christmas and Easter this day passes with such little fanfare that there is a good chance you will not think about it or be reminded of it. But it is the 'when' as well as the 'what' of Pentecost that shows it is a Sign. It was a remarkable allusion of the Gospel that deserves our full attention. However, to see this we need to understand its place in the Biblical story.

In fact, 'Pentecost' was a regular Old Testament festival. In the time of Moses, several annual festivals were prescribed and celebrated throughout the year. The festival of Passover was the first to be celebrated in the Jewish year. Exactly 50 days after Passover Sunday the Jews celebrated the Feast of Pentecost. And they had been doing so yearly for 1500 years by the time the events of Acts 2 happened. In fact, the reason that there were people from all languages who were in Jerusalem that day to hear Peter's message was precisely because they were there to celebrate the Old Testament Pentecost.

## Some thoughts for Pentecost

Let's have a think about the elements of Pentecost; the wind and the fire. Both of them can be felt, but only the fire can be seen and apart from that, they have many similarities.

Fire and wind can both cleanse.

Together they can warm us, or create a powerful force, as in a furnace.

They can soothe and comfort, depending on the circumstances.

They can present a beacon for all to see.

They can make a great noise.

They can be invigorating.

They can be life-giving and lifesaving.

If we accept that wind and fire in the form of The Holy Spirit, nothing can stop us as we will then have all of those properties and pass them on to others.

## John Walker Motson OBE 10 July 1945 – 23 February 2023 A Personal Reflection

I have been a football fan since the 1960's (I remain a passionate follower of my home town team, Grimsby Town FC). Earliest commentary memories are firstly Raymond Glendenning, then the great Peter Jones, but the last 50 years it has been 'Motty'.

John was very much a child of the manse, as his father was the Rev William Motson. John was born in Salford, one of the places his father was stationed in the itinerant Methodist ministry. That must have been towards William's final weeks, as he was then appointed to Centenary Methodist Church, Boston and it was there that John was baptised.

For a year or so we lived in Boston and worshipped at Centenary, long after the Motsons had moved on. I used to sit next to John's aunty and she was so proud of him. Most Sundays after worship we would talk about John and football. (I was at Centenary when a Methodist Pope preached – the Rev J Russell Pope, during his Presidential year!).

John was educated at the Methodist Culford School (a place the Society visited, when the late Rev David Caink, an art expert, took members around the travelling Methodist Art Collection). John was disappointed that soccer was not included in the sporting curriculum, something his father took up with the school. John often accompanied his father on preaching appointments, including Outwell and Upwell.

John's career began in 1967 as a newspaper reporter in Barnet. His big break came in 1968 when he joined the BBC as sports presenter on Radio 2. His breakthrough as a soccer commentator was in December 1969. In 1971 he became a BBC television commentator. John was commentating at Hillsborough in 1989 when crowds of supporters became hemmed in, with tragic loss of life. The memory remained with John and he may well have suffered what we now term 'Post Traumatic Stress Disorder'.

John commentated for 50 years covering over 2,500 matches. He was noted for his meticulous preparation; possibly a skill he learned from his father when he was writing sermons. He had an encyclopaedic knowledge. In all this time it was inevitable that there would be some gaffs. One I remember was "For those of you watching on black and white televisions, the visiting team are in the yellow strip"!

John's 'trademark' was his sheepskin coats. I understand some were made in Bungay and also by Saville Row tailors.

John was a man of faith throughout his life and in recent years worshipped at his local parish church. He was active in encouraging the emergence of the movement, Christians in Sport.

It was a couple of weeks or so before his sudden death that John featured in a 2-page centre-spread article in the *Methodist Recorder*. This prompted me to write to John, care of the *Recorder*, in which I reminisced about my time in Boston and thanked him for his outstanding commentaries. I also sounded the praises of my beloved Grimsby Town FC! Sadly, John probably never got to read my letter.

## **Circuit Twinning with Matjinge Circuit in Zimbabwe**

The Climate Justice Group, on behalf of the circuit, has been in touch with Rev. Mufaro Chuma, who is the superintendent for Matjing Circuit in Zimbabwe, where our own Rev. Richman Ncube grew up and attended the Methodist school.

He responded: "Having friends in the outside world, with whom we can share our stories, was our dream and today the dream is fulfilled."

Deacon Lynne Tonge has said: "We hope that the twinning with our brothers and sisters in Matjinge will be two-fold - that it will be the formation of a prayerful relationship which will offer mutual support and learning between our two circuits, and also an opportunity to offer financial support to specific small projects at Matjinge".

The Matijnge Circuit has only 2 completed church buildings and one manse, with 2 ministers and 37 local preachers. There are 360 church members, mostly women, spread across a large rural area with 19 societies, most of which therefore meet outdoors on Sundays. The men and many young people from the area usually work away from home, for example, in South Africa. The ministers have to walk to carry out their duties and to visit elderly church members in the rural communities. The circuit is struggling financially and is 2 months behind with payments to the central Methodist Church in Zimbabwe. The secondary school has 120 boarders: 75 girls and 45 boys. Currently, the bore hole which supplied water for the school has dried up and children have to collect water from 2 Km away. This is probably the most pressing need facing the community right now.

They have no vehicle for the ministers to use and are hoping to raise money to buy one in the future. The fence around the school is also not secure.

If you and your local church would like to send greetings to the Matjinge circuit, please send your messages via Deacon Lynne Tonge. We would also like to pray regularly for the people of Matjinge circuit and hold them in our thoughts, in these times of climate change. There is an election in Zimbabwe this year: please pray that there is no violence at the time of the election and that the whole process is free and fair.

It would be wonderful if some of our churches decided to raise money for the Matjinge circuit with special events in the next few months, while we try to get some idea of how the water supply for the school might be improved. One suggestion is a rainwater collection system and storage tank, another would be to try to find a new borehole. Practical Action have an office in Gwanda, and they have offered to assist us with this. All We Can does have a project elsewhere in the country. However, they do not accept nominations for specific projects, as they are fully committed to their programme of work elsewhere. Unfortunately, neither Water Aid nor Toilet Twinning operates in Zimbabwe. Meanwhile, we will send a copy of Rejoice!, to Rev Chuma and assure him that we are thinking about them and trying to work out a way in which we might be able to assist them, but that this will take some time. In the meantime, please send any money raised for Matjinge to our circuit treasurer.
