Rejoice, the Lord is King!

What a wonderful hymn (or song, if you prefer), first published by Charles Wesley in 1744. We know it well from many of our song or hymn books, e.g., Hymns & Psalms 243, Singing the Faith 335, Complete Mission Praise 575, and Songs of Fellowship 482, just to name a few.

Wesley's hymn embodies the Lectionary change, that is almost upon us, from <u>Year A</u> on 26th November, celebrating 'Christ the King' Sunday with words from verse 1: "Rejoice, the Lord is King!" Then following on to <u>Year B</u> with words of verse 5: "Rejoice in glorious hope" to begin our **Advent Season** on Sunday, the 3rd of December.

Every year, the Lectionary takes us full circle from the anticipation of Messiah, Jesus' birth, his ministry, his suffering and death ending with our remembering of who He was. In the 3 year Lectionary cycle [A, B, and C], we view Jesus through the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, and interspersed each year with the Gospel of John.

Yet, where are you this year, today even, with your walk with our Lord, Saviour and friend? At the moment, are you rejoicing that the Lord is king? Is Jesus your glorious hope?

There are many, many things happening in everyone's lives each and every day: sometimes it's fantastic, sometimes devastating, there are expressions of hopefulness, some sorrow, some regret, some bring us quiet assurance, some loud unbelievable alleluias. As the Body of Christ, we connect to our Lord corporately as communities of faith and also, very personally and privately as individuals. Right now, may we be individually and corporately the balm for the other, the friend and stranger, the known and unknown, as we live out Christ's command to love one another.

Gaywood St Faith's

After six-and-a-half years as Team Vicar at St Faith's Church, the Rev Canon Karlene Kerr, is leaving the parish. However, she is literally going down the road to St John's Church in The Walks - in geographical terms the next closest church to St Faith's.

Canon Karlene, who is also Rural Dean of the Lynn Deanery, will say farewell to the congregations of St Faith's on December 10th. She will be licenced as Priest-in-Charge of St John's in January.

Canon Karlene says she is looking forward to the challenges of her new role and all of us at St Faith's wish her every blessing in her new ministry. The move of Canon Karlene will mean it will be all change at St Faith's leaving only the Rector, the Rev Kyla Sorensen and Methodist Minister, the Rev Robert Roberts at the helm of the Anglican and Methodist Church. More changes are expected next year with the hoped-for arrival of a new curate at St Faith's and the move of the Rev Roberts to a new post. St Faith's has planned a series of Christmas services, including the everpopular Carols by Candlelight at 6.i30pm on December 17th. The ancient church takes on a magical appearance with the flickering candles around the church and the beautifully decorated Corona suspended over the Chancel. Favourite, traditional Carols and Lessons, telling the age-old Christmas story, and anthems sung by the choir, all combine in such a beautiful service. On Christmas Eve there will be the usual Midnight Mass service of Holy Communion (please note the starting time of 11.15pm) Other popular Christmas services include the Christingle service on 14th December at 4pm and the beautiful Crib service in church at 4pm on Christmas Eve.

On Christmas Day there is a family Holy Communion celebration at 10am. On New Year's Eve there are services at 9.45am and 6.30pm. Full details of all Christmas services at St Faith's with dates and times are available by contacting the Church Office on 01553 279687.

The popular Christmas Fair is being held on 25th November in Gaywood Church Rooms and we are delighted that Borough Mayor and Gaywood councillor and resident, Margaret Wilkinson, is to officially open the event at 2pm.

There is always a friendly family atmosphere at the event and Gaywood Church Rooms will be transformed to become a festive-style market with the chance to pick-up a festive bargain at one of its many stalls. In the refreshment area visitors can enjoy a chat with friends over a cup of tea or coffee and a slice of home-made cake or a cheese or fruit scone. The Fair starts at 2pm and admission is free.

It is a remarkable record of faithful, dedicated service to God and His church in January 2024 when Olwyn Barber turns 89 she will have sung in the choir for 78 years - a proud record in anyone's book.

Olwyn, a lifelong Gaywood residen, first joined the choir at the age of 11. In her early days in the choir Olwyn attended services three times every Sunday. Her soprano voice has also been heard at countless weddings and funerals.

Her long service in the choir stalls was recognised when she was interviewed on the BBC TV'S Songs of Praise. She has also been a finalist in the lifetime achievement category of the Local Community Heroes Awards promoted by Your Local Paper. Olwyn was seen on a large screen in King's Lynn Corn Exchange talking about her life and times as a member of St Faith's Choir.

In October it was lovely to welcome back to Gaywood St Faiths former Team Vicar, the Rev Dale Gingrich . He served in that role for eight years before moving to become a vicar of a rural group of parishes near Banbury in Oxfordshire.

However, it was a sad occasion that brought him back to Gaywood. He conducted the funeral service at Mintlyn Crematorium for Irene Rumball, who was a faithful member of St Faith's Choir from 1972 until 2009. She died peacefully at the Tapping House Hospice at Hillington on 14th September aged 99. At her own request, Irene's funeral was led by the Rev Dale and it was a "no frills, no nonsense" service as she requested.

After the service, the Rev Dale joined Irene's close family and friends for tea and cake in the church.

The annual Remembrance Day service and parade from St Faith's Church to the Gaywood Clock War memorial went ahead on 12th November following the parade's cancellation last year because of issues over the closure of roads around the Clocktower.

This year's service was very well attended and was particularly notable for the number of young people taking part with an impressive turn-out by young members of Gaywood's uniformed organisations, including cubs and guides. The moving service in church, led by St Faith's Rector, the Rev Kyla Sorensen, paid tribute to all those people from Gaywood and the wider community, who served in the First and Second World Wars and in more recent conflicts around the globe and paid the ultimate price and never returned home. At the Clock Tower all those gathered around the memorial observed the national two minutes silence and watched as the first poppy wreath was laid by Gaywood councillor, Jo Rust who represented the Borough Mayor, Margaret Wilkinson.

May I take this opportunity of wishing Christmas greetings to all readers of Rejoice magazine and wish you all a happy and healthy New Year.
